Manjimup Matters

Melville Mutterings

26th June - This week's demo was by Rob Snowden who showed the usefulness of his favourite tool the bowl gouge describing the significance of the bevel that would suit the comfort of the individual.

The first cut (push) is important, that is, cutting with the grain. The pull cut gives the turner a smoother finish. The scrape cut takes a little more skill but practice makes perfect according to Rob.

Rob followed by turning a vase no more than 130mm. When using a bowl gouge to cut the curve of bowl one must rotate the gouge to obtain a perfect curve. Rob proceeded to shape his bowl describing the shape he wanted.

A very informative demo especially for our new members.

S & T was critiqued by Les Small of several lolly bowls and last weekend competition items.

3rd July – This week was the quarterly business meeting.

Items discussed were:- new judging methods of members items for weekend workshops, issues of guidelines of disposing of club equipment and a decision was agreed to wait for WAWA clarification of these guidelines, chain saw licenses costs were discussed consequently referred to WAWA.

Recognition of past club officers suggestions was a display record list.

The fill in activity was a video of the "Introduction to the Bedan Tool" by Jean Francois Escoulen a renown international turner. A very interesting and informative video of which our members learned a lot using a variety of bedan chisels.

The second part was a presentation of "Boom Gel Stain" from Cass Creations. Boom Gel Stain is a non-toxic and environmentally friendly stain that can be used on nearly any surface. Members were intrigued by Cass demonstration on the application of her staining and the effect

it had on the timber samples.

S & T was presented by Phil Vinden of highly skilled turned items especially a segmented vase turned by our new member Silvio Moriconi (refer photo)

10th July – A change in programme became necessary at a late date and David Milton volunteered to fill the gap with his presentation/method of creating a small square topped thin edge and straight walled bowl – materials approximately 100 x 100 x 50/60 mm thick. Initially he mentioned that ACCURACY IN CUTTING BLOCK SQUARE saved a great deal of time later. Tools used were a small bowl gouge, bedan, parting tool, scraper ALL SHARP to avoid tear/break out of material. When the bowl was completed externally the task of hollowing the bowl




was undertaken using hot melt glue and small wooden spigot to secure the item in a standard chuck. The project was completed using a scraper for fine cuts to achieve the high finish of all of David's projects. Well done David at such short notice.

17th July – Our hands on project for this month was with lain Barclay leading the making of pens. Iain brought some slim line pen kits for those who did not have any kits or were not able to get to PSquare agencies or Mayama Gems to get kits. It was an adventurous exercise for all resulting in many different styles of pen shapes and styles. Once again a hands on enjoyed by all.

24th July – Our demonstration this week was by Graham Padget who commenced his demo by showing the ins and outs of a segmented lidded box (he referred to an internet site that gave measurements and method of cutting each segment). Graham had prepared his lidded box prior to his demonstration then proceeded to shape the lid of box and then proceeded with the knob piece that he had previously attached to the lid. Once he polished the lid he then cut it off. To hollow out the box he used a large forester that enabled him finish hollowing the box. Well done Graham for your first demonstration. Graham also gave a few tips of the trade on high quality finishes.

Roy Lundy presented our show and tell critiquing vases entered in the Gosnells' weekend workshop held last weekend as well as other members' items.

31st July - This week we had a special appearance and guest turner and our WAWA President Mr. Jim Cameron who not only turning a box but putting a lid on it. Jim explained how he was inspired to turn a box when he visited a Vietnamised wood turning factory. Jim then proceeded to describe to make sure your spigot and recess fits the chuck, he then started to turn the bottom of the box using a skew chisel. Jim then turned the lid to his design. A very informative demonstration thanks Jim.





As this is near the culmination of Jim's 2 years of tenure as WAWA President, where he has done a mighty job, our members came along and showed their appreciation to Jim for making time to do this for our group.

S & T was conducted by Bernard critiquing some members' lidded boxes and other items.

7th Aug – This week's was our AGM with the following elected to the committee, Convenor David Rechter, Deputy Convenor Bernard Boycott, Treasurer Keith Alexander, Secretary David Milton, Committee Robyn McLean, James Murray, Frank Dymond, Roy Lundy and Denis Tapley. After the meeting we had a show and tell run by Denis Tapley where an array of normal items and those items entered into the Wood Show WAWA Competition and some of the Out of

Woods Competition were exhibited. The club members were well acquitted with four second place prizes, one in each of the divisions and one in the open, congratulations to Silvio Moriconi, David Milton and Denis Tapley. This was then followed by an informative talk by Norm Gratte outlining his long and success full teaching career and wood turning subsequent to retiring.

14th Aug – Threading wood was our demonstration today conducted by David Finch (his first). David explained that the Romans were the first ones who started threading. David began his demo using an external thread cutter by turning the threader on the piece in the lathe. David continued his demo of thread chasing using a piece of plastic pipe as a practice item emphasising a lathe speed to the thread size.

Using the thread tool in a rotation scraping motion proceeded to cut a thread on outside of pipe, then the inside. Types of timber determine threading as some of our timbers are not suitable. (Refer David). David then threaded the lid of a box with a very fine touch followed by threading the bottom. A very informative demo of a rather complicated exercise.

S & T was critique by Roy Lundy.

21st Aug – This month's hands on was turning a lidded box. It was interesting to see a variety of different lidded boxes being attempted by our members. A few dig ins happen but were eliminated with instructions from our experienced turners. It was suggested that those who finished their lidded box be included for next week's show and tell.

Swan hosted a Robert Sorby demonstration in June. Successful morning for both Carbatec Perth and the Swan group. A few visitors attended who showed an interest in how we at Swan hold our meetings and were invited to attend again.

Our Swan demonstrations each week have been interesting and varied.

Lidded boxes with threads continue to be the subject for demonstrations. Noel Moyes showed us how to cut a square thread which allows the lid to sit on the box and screw on very smoothly. Nice work.

A square edged bowl, the next competition item was demonstrated by Bruce Shephard. The turning of this item was achieved so smoothly and quickly it created some murmurings from some of our members who said that it would take them a day or more to get the same result. We look forward to seeing what our members can turn out for this competition.

Off centre and off axis woodturning with the use of the groups eccentric chuck was demonstrated by Don Clarke. Well what can one say but wow and a second wow. I am not sure that there will be a rush for members to borrow this chuck.

A twenty year old kitchen spatula was handed around by Ted Stewart-Wynne when he demonstrated this classic kitchen project. You can just imagine the cooking this spatula has flipped and served in the hands of the chef over these years. A simple but great item and a great gift idea.

Our Hot Pot night was a success. A small crowd gathered but the food and the company was enjoyed by all. Four tables entered the quiz and four tables all got 11 out of 16 answers correct. So then to tie breakers. Eventually one table came out in front and enjoyed the chocolates. Warm room and warm company what more can one ask for on a winter's night.

What a fun hands on Tim Tam Competition day we had on the 5th Tuesday of July. The item was a lidded Camphor Laurel Box. Three teams consisting of three members. The attitude,

turning skills and competitive spirit was great. Many thanks to Brian Kirkby for the organisation and to the members for having a go.

Following on from our AGM, Joe Clark's presentation was on the making of a beehive box. He used a she oak blank & described how to mark out the segments using a template, which also allowed for the body & lid of the box to be delineated. The body was hollowed out using 25, 40 & 50mm Forstner bits consecutively. The lid was held in a chuck to allow its completion. The presentation was applauded by the audience.

During the news for the week Brian Mather gave Thanks from us all to lan Moss who has done such an amazing job for this club over the past years.

We then moved into a very interesting demonstration by Brian Kirkby using laminated segmented wood to make a beautiful bowl. Brian had several delightful pieces that he made in the past and it just makes you realise we are only limited by our imagination when it comes to this wonderful hobby - obsession?

Jim McDonald regaled us with times of old when the Jacobean Twist or Barley Sugar Twist was used in many areas. It was a very interesting demonstration and de-mystified a visually complex piece. Patience I feel will be a large part of completing this particular skill set.

Once again Ian Moss worked his magic with timber burls and gave us all a different way to look at turning a beautiful piece of timber. A lovely cuppa to round out the afternoon and catch up with a great group of people.

Wandi Warbles

Much has happened at Wandi in the past few months.

The long-awaited dust extraction system has been installed and is now in use. It is, I believe, the biggest around and it certainly reduces the dust in the workshop and makes clean-up easier. Thanks, of course, must go to Rod Cocks who has been working on this behind the scenes for some time to organise the project.

The extraction fan/filter unit is located outside the back of the workshop along with the dust collection bin which is put out for collection each week by the Monday group and brought in by the Wednesday Group. The unit is fenced and holds the spare bin.

The next project that is underway is installation of additional GPOs so that each lathe has a separate GPO. Additionally the plan is to significantly improve the workshop lighting levels using high power LED light fixtures. This is subject to gaining council approval for the installation.

2019 Jack de Vos Award Rod Cocks - Member No 502

Rod Cocks, member number 502, who is a founding member of the Wandi Wood turning group, has been a positive contributor since the very beginning. Over the years he has taken on many roles, including demonstrator, committee member, workshop organiser, and convenor, as well as friend and mentor, but his greatest contribution has always been in ensuring that members of the group have access to a high-quality workshop. Wandi's workshop has been in several locations on the Wandi site, each one an improvement over its predecessor. This has culminating in its present location in The Pavilion, for which Rod was the instigator. Throughout the protracted project he always strove to achieve the best outcome for the woodturners, which resulted in an excellent facility. The recent installation of a dust extraction system, the finest in the Association, is a fitting climax for Rod's strenuous efforts over the years as well as a testament to his persistence.
