Presidential Ponderings

The making of New Year resolutions is a serious business. I like them because they give me a focus for the year and they reduce the amount of daydreaming that I indulge in. But they do take time to think through. I was very happy with my 2018 resolutions. I may not be a much better turner but I have developed a range of new skills that I find very useful.

What to do in 2019 has been very much on my mind for a while and now that Christmas is nearly upon us it is crunch time. A number of experiences through the year have shaped my thinking for they have reminded me very forcibly that none of us is immortal. They have also reminded me that we have obligations to those we will leave behind when we depart the scene.

I reckon a number of you are in the same boat as myself so I invite you to join with me in thinking through how we might resolve this dilemma, focusing on what we are going to have to do with the massive wood turning bits we have acquired over the years. I see series of steps that have to be worked through.

The first of these is to go to the workshop/shed, stand inside the door and look around. Take a good look! Note the lathes, the drill press, the grinder, the disc sander, thicknesser, if you've got one, and the tool racks. You should count all the tools in their racks but that may take you a long time, so just make a guess of how provide many. And don't overlook all the wood that you collected over the years.

When you've made an assessment of what you've got, you're ready for the next step which is simply to ask yourself the question: 'What's going to happen to all of this when I'm no longer here?' I know this is a question my wife asks quite regularly although she delicately skirts around the notion that I may not be here to provide the answers she might want. And it's a question that I have asked myself from time to time but not particularly seriously. But after some of the events I experienced this year I know I'm going to have to, and the sooner the better.

Where to begin? That leads to **step 3**. We have a number of options – we can talk the situation over with a friend, or with members of the club or with our partner or our children – but, at the end of all of this talking, we will probably have to prepare a list of all that we have got. If that looks like being too big a task, we should at least list all those things that are valuable and which we want disposed of appropriately and not just sent to the dump.

Wherever possible we should include details that will help with disposal – things like date of purchase, cost, probable present value, what should be done with it, whether it should be sold or donated to the club. We should also note where all the invoices, manuals, and catalogues are kept because they can help to determine prices if items are to be sold. It would be useful to if timber could be named and dated.

Step 4: Talk over what you're doing with family and friends so they are not caught flat-footed when you're gone. You will be doing them a favour by doing so.

Anyway, this is a rough idea of what I have in mind for my New Year resolution. A bit of effort is going to be required but my wife will be relieved that I've begun to sort out what to do with all my wood turning gear and I will be relieved that I've done the job now before it's too late. If you are in a similar situation, you should join me.

On another note altogether, 2019 is going to be a great year for wood turning in Western Australia and I look forward to sharing it with you and enjoying the exciting and interesting things that lie ahead.

As always, do enjoy your turning and keep safe.

Melville Mutterings

21st Sept – Melville Segmentation Group meeting – A number of Members brought in their competition pieces for critiquing that will enable them to improve if necessary. A discussion was had regarding purchasing equipment for segmenting through WAWA. Members were asked to show and discuss their pieces which was very interesting.

24th Sept – A discussion was held regarding our "Hands On" day, concern was raised to the reduced number of participants and comments were made that is an excellent opportunity to increase ones turning skills. The general consensus was to continue our monthly "Hands On" day.

Our weekly demonstration was conducted by Denis Tapley who revealed trade secrets and other details of inlaying. Denis started explaining different templates and other equipment he

uses for creating shapes and his variety of pieces. He then proceeded to turn the inside of a lidded box then sanded and applied a polish. To insert a metal inlay on the outside he used a special tool marked to required depth. A very detailed and interesting demo. S & T was conducted on a large number of member's pieces (goblets completed from previous Hands On) by WAWA president Jim Cameron.

31st Oct – At this week's meeting travel wander and scientific literate Frank Dymond delivered a talk on "Time" where the modern measurement has close links with woodturning being the development of accurate clocks was by a carpenter named John Harrison in the mid 18th century. The talk covered the first time keeping methods through to the latest photon clocks and many examples of actual methods of time measurement were shown by Frank. Show and tell of mainly the items submitted to the Joondalup footed bowl competition was conducted by Milton Rundle.

7th Oct – Today's demonstration was by the Whizz of the Skew, Russell Nash (no pressure) who began turning a finial "Cyndy Drossa style" hopefully of "trembler" proportions. Russell explained the dimensions needed to produce his final. Russell then used a curved blade skew with skill dexterity of the expert that he is. Russell emphasised that when using a skew make sure you rub the bevel. A most interesting demonstration enjoyed by all.

This was followed by a quick demo by Russell on our next hands on which will be Christmas decorations' using once again the sharp back end of a skew chisel that produced a Christmas tree with branches.

S & T was conducted by Ian Redfern.

14th Oct – Our secretary informed the members of a building discussion he recently had with the local council who recommended that we need to submit any proposal plans for extensions to the building. He asked members to submit their ideas within next few weeks.

This Week's demonstration was a triple treat on scroll saws and sawing. Members wondered whether if the demo would create a 1m scale model of the Eiffel Tower but this was well within the skills of the demonstrators Ken Thurston, Chris Ellis and Peter Neale and their wondrous

Peter began to demonstrate by explaining the history and development of scroll saws. Peter then proceeded to cut a turtle shape from his piece of wood using a adhesive drawing paper template.

Ken began by explaining the variety of different objects one can cut using a scroll saw, he then proceeded to show his artistic items.

Chris explained the methods he uses to produce his items, e.g.how to proceed to cut objects. He then proceeded to cut an ornamental piece.

Members showed their keen interest by asking a variety of questions of all the demonstrators. S & T was critiqued by Bernard Boycott

After the demo there was a design session led by Denis Tapley. The design topic is the first competition item next year the hollow form for those interested. Some members brought there drawing gear and ideas.

21st Nov – Hands On day, members were required to turning decorative Christmas tree. Norm Gratte explained how to turn a curly tree and others as per drawing. It was very interesting to witness the variety of decorative Christmas tree turned by our skilled members. Once members had finished their Tree they then had to paint and decorate them which revealed those who had artistic talent. Quite a fun day by all. There was no S & T today.

28th Nov - Today's demonstration was presented by George Kiegler. The topic of today's presentation was the process of THERMING a technique known to have been developed at least 200 years ago described by George as "eccentric turning" utilising a combination of inside/outside/spindle turning/off centre turning techniques. The technique is understood to have been developed in Japan where males did not wear trousers, had no packets, and used the turned boxes suspended from a belt to carry small items. In later years it was utilised to turn oval shaped wheel spokes which were lifter and stronger with two bolted together for increased load

bearing if required. George had a few samples to demonstrate the stages involve in the process of creating items, in this case a round box with sides being 10mm square pieces screwed to a solid round drum, equally spaced and premarked as to where cuts were required during turning to create required pattern. As each pattern was made on one side the were unscrewed and turned 90 degrees to achieve pattern continuity and repeated one each side until completed. Overall the technique required lose concentration and care when cutting/preparing materials. George is to be commended for the preparation put into making models prior to his presentation.

5th Dec – Before Today's meeting our convenor Bernard Boycott presented merit awards to George Shaw and Roy Lundy two popular, long standing and significant contributors to the group.

Our meeting today involved the presentation of Xmas toys and lolly bowls made by our members. We gave the 100 lolly bowls for Silver Chain and the 400 toys will be split between three recipients, Wanslea, Parkerville Childrens Home and Mercy Care. The representatives from these charities addressed our members, thankful for all the lolly bowls and toys.

All these charities support families with disadvantaged young children. The presentation was followed by a morning tea with scones jam and cream.

6th Dec – Our members attended the groups Xmas luncheon at East Fremantle Sailing Club which was thoroughly enjoyed by all.

Our groups first meeting in the New Year will be on the 9th January and will be a General meeting followed by various speakers.

Each turner got 15 minutes to do their bit towards producing a bowl from a Jacaranda blank. We all learned from each other and a large number of members were engaged in the process. Bruce Shephard demonstrated making patterns and inlays using a router and Design/Inlay Kit. The kit consisted of 6 different stencils and was purchased from Timbecon. The inlays and patterns certainly add a lot of interest to a piece of work and could be as simple or intricate as you want, only limited by your imagination. I'm sure a few of us will be having a go over the coming months.

It was a small but enthusiastic group who came along for an evening meeting to see Ian Moss demonstrate turning seed pods inside out, as he'd seen demonstrated some years ago by Neil Scobie. These pods were beautifully tactile. Ian had chosen to stain them in various colours and had modified the design to resemble Emperor penguins. As ever Ian made something very tricky appear very straight forward and generated much interest, with a few of us planning to tackle our own inside out turning in the future.

Lidded boxes was the theme of the day when Lindsay Ford stepped up to demonstrate. Contrast wood inlays certainly gives these box lids an extra wow factor. Great idea for gifts with Christmas just around the cover.

Mike Lees demo at Wandi on multi-axis turning obviously interested Noel Moyes and he attempted to show us how it was done. As always it is during a demo that things do not go to plan but Noel hasn't given up yet.

The turning of Olive scoops with drainage holes was demonstrated by Don Clarke. Smooth and skilful. Many members were interested in having a go at these delightful Christmas ideas.

In the last few weeks our group has been out demonstrating our art and craft at Darlington Arts Festival and Bunnings Midland. Sewing future seeds of interest.

Also elected to the committee were George Murphy, Bob Filby and Robin Campbell.

All these evenings were well attended and we learnt many tips and techniques from the demonstrators.

Resinators

Since the inception of the group we have been fortunate to have had people with a great deal of knowledge about resins come and talk to our group. As a result we have learnt that there are several types of resin and that they have all been developed with specific purposes in mind. We had an excellent day with Neil Wright and we learnt about using resin to stabilize wood ready for turning. Neil's demonstration was in depth and again we learnt a great deal about resin and its uses.

The group has played around with filling holes in wood, pouring into containers and inserting various cones, leaves, nuts etc into the container of resin. Some have put bases into bowls, whilst others have experimented with filling cracks. Others experimented with using resin as a decorative platter rim, decorative serving board, small table top and wall plaque. Other have now started to make bangles and all sorts of jewelry using moulds. Another has made moulds to make the bits for her guitar band saw boxes. The difficulties we faced were to do with pouring and then having to travel back to our respective homes, and this is an issue to be dealt with in 2019.

lan Ludford has retired as Group Leader as he is overseas for a great deal of the year, and John Quartermaine has stepped in to the position. We have agreed to hold our meetings on the first weekend of the month, in conjunction with the Embellishers.

The next meeting will be held Sunday 20th January at Wandi commencing at 9am and then again on 3rd February, and 3rd March, locations to be decided at the first meeting. These times have been decided so that attendees can do pieces for the WAWA competition if they wish or just potter with whatever project they have in mind.
