

WEEKEND WORKSHOP OBSERVATIONS: GOSNELLS

Host Club: Gosnells Wood Turning Group. Venue: Southern River Community College.

Date: Saturday June 20th, 2015.

Introduction

Before I get into my report into the 'Gosnells Wood Turning Group Weekend Workshop' I would like to advise all members of that WAWA that I have just taken over the role of 'Roving Reporter' and I look forward to providing all of you with an interesting report on each and every weekend workshop held during the year. I will endeavour to attend each one of them in person so as to capture all of the action. If for some reason I cannot attend a meeting then I will notify the host club in advance so that they can seek out someone to pass onto the details of the day to me, whereupon I will write my report.

Master of Ceremonies Peter Pickering welcomed everyone along, explained the format for the day and introduced Colin Southern of Boonadoo Laser Engraving. Colin then gave an overview of what he was able to do in terms of enhancing our work using laser engraving. Colin had a display set up alongside P Square Agencies and invited everyone to visit his stand, view his work and ask questions of him.

MC Peter Pickering then introduced the first demonstrator for the day, none other than our previous president John Gardiner. Peter informed us that John had stepped up to the plate at

the last minute after the advertised demonstrator, Chris Smith was unable to attend the workshop.

John went straight into his demonstration of 'A platter with a difference'. He produced a rounded piece of sheoak, squared it up on the lathe between centres and commenced to turn a spigot which was to be used to mount it in a scroll chuck. After shaping the base of the platter using a small bowl gouge, John went to turn the piece around and mount it onto the scroll chuck, only to find that the spigot he had made was too large to fit into the chuck. Undeterred John solved the problem, remounted the platter and changed the size of the spigot. John then squared up the front of the platter and sanded it using a power sanding method. John introduced a fine looking piece of kit which could best be described as a fancy vice mounted on the lathe, thereby allowing him to carve a series of shapes into the edge of the platter using a Dremel cutting tool. John provided information on the location of a jewellery shop in the Perth CBD where he purchases his Dremel attachments. The platter looked like half of the planet Saturn. After smoothing the edges of the holes he had carved with the Dremel, John introduced another fancy piece of equipment, that being an 'Escoulen Eccentric Chuck'. After placing a face plate onto the spigot, John then demonstrated the versatility of the Escoulen chuck, remounted the platter and again using a bowl gouge he hollowed out the platter. The hollowed out portion of the platter was off centre and unfortunately for John he had a small 'dig in' and he went a little too deep with the cut and this went through to the other side of the platter in the thinnest part of it. Again undeterred John attempted to repair this but decided it was better left as a feature of

the bowl. Clearly John gave a fine demonstration at short notice and all of you who have done demonstrations in the past know all too well how much time you spend in preparing your demonstration. John had a matter of days to prepare and under the circumstance he is to be congratulated on the effort he put in.

Next to be introduced was Colin Moth who demonstrated how to make a faceplate with a screw



thread which could then be mounted straight onto the lathe headstock system. Colin produced a faceplate made from tasmanian oak with a threaded hole in the centre. He explained a number of uses for the faceplate and then proceeded to mount a circular blank on the lathe. He also explained that it was necessary to make a small recess at the rear of the faceplate so as to allow it to lock hard against the headstock. Colin then demonstrated how to use a large tool known as a tap, which had 30mm diameter and a 3.5 pitch thread. This particular tool is available for hire from the WAWA Library. After mounting the tap into a drill chuck and then mounting it to the tail stock, Colin demonstrated the method he uses to place a thread inside the hole in the centre of the faceplate. Colin explained the necessity to take things slowly and allow the tool to do its own work. Once Colin had a completed the thread in the centre of the faceplate he squared off the face and then mounted it onto the lathe. All in all a very interesting demonstration on what appears to be a very simple method of making a faceplate with a thread in the centre.

Just prior to the lunch break members were given a guided tour of the new facilities now being used by the Gosnells Group by Kevin Cheetham. It was clear that a lot of thought has gone into the overall design of the new clubrooms and Gosnells members can consider themselves proud of their achievements in creating such a fine workshop.

The final demonstration of the day was by Rudy Goh, a man who needs no introduction and appears often in front of everyone demonstrating some new method of turning something a little different. The title in the program for his demonstration was listed as 'Trying to become a 'Top' turner'. I am sure all of you that were in attendance thought exactly as I did that Rudi was going to give us some tips on how we could all become a top wood turner, with the word top implying master turner, or at the very least being a top person in the field of wood turning. How could I have been so far wrong as of course Rudy was demonstrating the method he has perfected to



make a couple of spinning tops. He had even given a name to one of the spinning tops he was going to demonstrate how to make. He called it a hula hula top. The other spinning top was known as a tippee top. As usual Rudy had diagrams prepared along with a depth/measuring gauge and a book on how to make a vast array of spinning tops in all manner of colours. Rudi explained that he had finally found a use for all of the little off cut pieces of wood and after mounting a small piece

of timber into a scroll chuck he went about shaping the base of the top. He shaped the body of the spinning top and then using a captive ring making tool he cut two rings from the piece of timber. Rudy explained that it was necessary to ensure that the two rings were of different sizes in order to make the top spin better. Rudy also introduced a series of tops, perhaps better known as 'flop tops' which ones that he had made previously that had failed to spin or failed to hang to the hula hula hoops. The top was completed and of course spun just like it was supposed to spin. Next using another piece of small wood Rudy went about making his tippee top. This top apparently by means of the 'Laws of Physics' starts off spinning and then turns itself upside down or turns itself right way up depending on how each of you view such things. You will need to look at the pictures which are attached to the newsletter to better understand where I am coming from on this very different form of spinning top. During the shaping of this top Rudy explained how essential it was to use a template to make the highest point on the top. This high point had to be placed in such a way as to ensure that went you stood the top upright it would not being able to balance itself and would fall over. Not surprisingly Rudy completed his demonstration of this top and the top itself performed perfectly in spinning away and then flipping itself over and continue spinning. All in all another very good demonstration from a man who always seems to be looking to turn something different.

The competition theme for the weekend was a vase with three or four flowers and yet again members demonstrated a vast array of creative talents by producing a total of twenty two stunning entries. The judges were in for a hard day's work. A picture of the entries in each of the classes is shown somewhere in the article. Bruce Jackson once again did



an excellent job in coordinating the competition entries.

Bunbury Bites

The Bunbury Wood Turners have been very busy these last few months with three club competitions having been held in the months of April, May and June and there has been a marked increase in the number of entries submitted by members. Our club decided late last year that the monthly club competition would follow along the same entries as for the WAWA competition. It was felt that by giving our members the opportunity to put an item into the club competition a few weeks prior to the WAWA competition would allow them to get feedback from other club members on their particular piece. Clearly the recent results in the last two WAWA competitions have shown that we are on the right track in doing it this way. In particular Jock McFayden, Norm Hoskin and Lou Pacecca have done rather well. Jock picked up first in the novice class and first in the open class in the jewellery competition at Mandurah. Norm also picked up a first in the intermediate at Mandurah. Jock followed up on his success in Mandurah with a first in the novice at Gosnells, Norm finished second in the intermediate and Lou finished third in the novice.

The club had a good day at the Bunbury Horse Show on April 12th 2015 at the stall where a number of items were sold. A few inquiries were made regarding membership and the club actually get paid a small fee by the organisers to present a display. On July 5th, 2015 the club will be conducting a sausage sizzle at Bunning's Bunbury Store and will be looking to make a significant amount of money to put towards the purchase of additional items, which include the purchase of new audio visual camera's for use in the workshop during demonstrations. In early June, Clem Stewart gave an excellent demonstration on the turning of a square edged bowl with a difference. He used two halves of wood and a series of jigs to link the complete bowl and stand together. He will be demonstrating this same piece at our workshop in November.

Busselton members patience is likely to be rewarded by two Vicmarc VL240 lathes (with variable electronic speed to replace the ageing small Jets), and a 14" bandsaw. We look forward to these with some anticipation.

There have been regular Wednesday night demonstrations of late including Tom with a jewellery stand, Barbara's flower on a stalk, and Chas with a hollow form vase.

Two further cruise ships have arrived in Busselton and these provided members with a sales outlet. Unfortunately, the weather also arrived with one of these ships making a very wet day of it.

Some talk of alternative options to the current club site have recently arisen as the City of Busselton has plans to go ahead with an Entertainment Centre on a nearby site which may potentially require a shift of venue by the group.

The annual wood run was held in mid-June. Although the weather threatened at times nobody actually got wet, and the sun even managed to shine (however briefly). Bruce had arranged to truck she oak logs to his property as the mill site was too wet to access. This meant ready access to his shed if it rained and much easier access by our members to the site. A smaller

quantity of wood was cut, and there is some talk of another run depending on log availability, and other factors including the need for members to have chain saw certificates. This requirement very much reduced the potential availability of operators and it boiled down to Chas and Bruce. Other members fetched and carried, end sealed and tried to be generally helpful. Attached is a photo of Chas getting stuck into a log with his skip tooth chain, and also a photo of Peter deep in thought alongside some of the cut billets.

Gosnells Gossip

This month has seen our new workshop being put to good use. In addition to our normal meetings on Wednesday mornings and Thursday evenings, refresher courses have been run on Thursday morning and Friday morning for the benefit of those members wishing to improve their turning skills. John Gardiner and Chris Paplinski respectively have given the benefit of their skill and experience to act as mentors and this is very much appreciated by all participating.

Our weekend workshop on 20th June was well attended with many familiar faces to be seen. The competition attracted a wide range of entries with some very impressive work on display.



Due to family commitments Chris Smith was unable to demonstrate his "bowl with a difference" but John Gardiner very ably and at short notice provided a very interesting demonstration of "a platter with a difference" This was produced using John's specialised chuck with very impressive results. A very enjoyable demonstration much appreciated.

Colin Moth showed us how to use the thread-making gadget available through the WAWA library.

The third demonstration of the day was Rudy Goh 'trying to be a Top turner". Rudy, in his inimitable manner produced a series of spinning tops accompanied by entertaining

commentary which was enjoyed by all.

On Wed 15th May Chris Davis treated the group to a demonstration of deep hollowing in the production of a vase with lid. Chris illustrated the problems associated with deep hollowing and the use of appropriate tools to overcome them. The demonstration was of interest and appropriate to the forthcoming Swan workshop.

At show and tell on that day John Gardiner showed his unfinished offset turned figurine which illustrated how a recognisable figure could be produced by judicious juggling of centres backed up with careful planning.

On June 17th for show and tell Peter Manchee offered a nicely shaped bowl in Cape Lilac and well finished. Owen O'Neill showed a footed bowl in birds-eye She-Oak on a foot of dark She-Oak. A very nice result of salvage from an earlier project.

Joondalup-Wanneroo Journal

May: With no Short Member's Talk arranged, Viv gave a mini-demo on the use of sanding sealers, water, methylated spirits, weak shellac solution and lacquer thinners. He warned that shellac reacts with metal and when using it as a sanding sealer it should be diluted to 10% of the normal strength. Sanding while the liquid is wet helps fill cracks. Wet and Dry is useful for this as the adhesive is not soluble. Sand back to raw wood then apply normal finish – varnish, wax etc. Use of auto body steel wool 4.0 is also useful in smoothing the finish.

Tony Collins demonstrated making a vase. He hollowed from the top and bottom and glued a slightly tapered plug into the bottom. Don't forget to mark the centre before cutting off the plug. He started the hollowing using a Forstner bit followed by a hollowing tool. During the demo he showed uses for his Gorilla and Pin jaws.

The May **competition** was a jewellery stand with two items of jewellery. Mike Wickings won the Intermediate division with Bob Hammett runner up. Geoff Quesnel took 1st place in Advanced division followed by Graeme Draper. Unfortunately there were no Novice entries.

June: Barry Cobb recently assisted Georgiou consultants mark trees for harvesting in preparation for road works in the northern suburbs. After hearing nothing more from them regarding recovery of turning timber it appears that it has all been turned, not as we had intended, but turned into piles of wood chips.

Graham Skews demonstrated his method of making flowers by peeling back layers of wood using the long point of a skew. It works much better on green wood. Similar technique to making mini Christmas trees.

The June comp, a vase, was poorly supported for a simple project. Come on guys. Get your comp items in. The entries were however of a high quality. Mike Wickings took out the Intermediate with his jacaranda and sheoak vase. Graeme Draper won the Advanced division. Graham Turner critiqued all the entries.

Show & Tell:

- * Graham Turner explained how he microwaved a green Mallee burl for 4 minutes several times over several days, resulting in little distortion or cracking. He also showed examples of Carob and Acacia burls. Graham, who holds a license to harvest Goldfields burls will have some available for sale at the August workshop at Wanneroo.
- * Viv Paust showed a beautifully coloured Goldfields York Gum natural edge plate which is a work in progress.
- * Geoff Quesnel showed the footswitch made up for him by Frank Visser. The switches are available from JayCar and can be wired up by a qualified electrician.
- * Geoff Quesnel donated 100 wheels and axles to the Group. These will be used for our Christmas toy donations. Thanks to Graeme Skewes who is the main driver for this project.
- * Rod Cummings showed a cutting board made from an old South African dining room suite of 'Stinkwood' or 'Mukwa'.
- * Tony Collins showed a unique clock surround made up from a beautifully coloured jarrah burl.

Events:

- * Preparation for the August W/E Workshop at the Wanneroo showgrounds is well advanced. We are looking forward to entries in the Rockin Rabbit Challenge.
- * Tony has displays organised in Bindoon on 18th September and in Gingin later in the year, and we will be manning the WAWA display at the Royal Show on 28th September.

David Rechter: To explain to those present the background of the proposed changes to Rule 11 Sub-Rule (4) and if adapted Sub-Rule (1) of the Constitution.

Rule 11 Committee of Management

Sub-Rule (4)

Current Wording:

A President shall not hold office for more than two consecutive years.

Proposed Wording:

- a. A President shall not hold office for more than two consecutive years.
- b. If a nomination is not forthcoming for the position of President in accordance with sub-rule (5) (b), and if the current President has forwarded his or her agreement in writing, to the Returning Officer, then a majority of members present at a properly constituted Annual General Meeting may agree to extend his or her period of office for a further 12 month period.
- c. If the current President is not in agreement to extend his or her period of office, then the Association will be managed solely by the Committee of Management, as a consequence of their normal meetings throughout the year.
- d. If the management of the Association continues in accordance with Sub-Rule (4) (c), then a committee member, elected by the other members present at the general meeting or committee meeting, must preside at the relevant meeting.

Sub-Rule (1)

Current Wording:

Subject to sub-rule (9) the affairs of the Association shall be managed exclusively by a Committee of Management consisting of;

- a. The President
- b. The Immediate Past President
- c. The Vice President
- d. The Secretary (may be appointed without voting rights)
- e. The Treasurer
- f. Not less than 5 nor more than 7 other persons, all of whom shall be members of the Association. Or no more than 8 other persons, all of whom should be members of the Association should the Secretary be appointed as a non-member.

Proposed Wording:

- a. The President (If elected)
- b. The Immediate Past President
- c. The Vice President (only if a President is elected)
- d. The Secretary (may be appointed without voting rights)
- e. The Treasurer
- f. Not less than 5 nor more than 7 other persons, all of whom shall be members of the Association. Or no more than 8 other persons, all of whom should be members of the Association should the Secretary be appointed as a non-member.



A SQUARE BOWL



At a recent Bunbury Club Night, Clem Stewart demonstrated the following.



MARK &

- 1. Start with two pieces, 180mm X 90mm, and paper join together.
- 2. Turn to a

cylinder, make sure you use the centres and sand to a good finish.

3. Mark the length and pencil the centre, part off neatly and square.

4. Prepare two blocks and hot

melt glue to cylinder, care taken to align the centres and turn on this axis.


5. The piece will now look like this.

6. Now separate the two pieces.

7. The next stage is to prepare a method to hold the piece in order to turn the bowl,
