Presidential Pronouncements

The Swan workshop got us off to an excellent start for the new year in spite of having to be shifted back a week due to a large public event on the nearby oval ... and in spite of a stinking hot day. It was good to see the day well-attended and an impressive line-up of competition entries. Especial congratulations to the first time novice entrants - without the signs, it would have been difficult to tell where the different classes began or ended.

Bruce Jackson announced the results of last year's WAWA Group Challenge with Avon Woodturners taking first place followed by Mandurah Woodturners. Bruce said he was very pleased with the overall competition last year with a 25% increase in entry numbers and the generally high standards. However, it was a bit disappointing that some groups were very under -represented considering their member numbers. This year's Challenge prize money will be distributed differently. Each entry will still earn one point for the member's group but the \$1500 will be divided by the total number of entries to arrive at an amount per point. This is estimated to work out at between \$4 and \$6. So, if a group's total entry count is 40 points, that group will receive between \$160 and \$240 at the 2016 AGM, remembering this year's competition runs from February to August. Get those tools sharpened!

On weekend workshops ... the CoM has received or been advised of some complaints of damage to competition items occurring while being handled by members during the popular vote examination. There are two sides to this issue. It is a given that members handling someone else's work should be treating that item with respect and care. It is also a given that members submitting entries should expect their item to be handled as part of the process of being judged by their peers. The competition is an important part of the weekend workshops and we don't want a situation developing that discourages people entering their work or prevents members from touching the competition items. Bruce and the CoM will monitor the issue but I trust that incidents will be few and far between.

Norm Gratte and David Rechter have made arrangements to deliver demonstration and judging seminars at three locations - Bunbury 2nd April, Swan 30th April and Mandurah 7th May. All interested members are encouraged to attend and the seminars are being hosted at locations to maximise access. These have been organised as a WAWA service to members and I thank Norm and David for their time and efforts in doing this for members. Thanks also to the host groups. Please refer to the notice in this newsletter.

I'm pleased to advise that negotiations are under way to arrange workshops with visiting turners later this year. The Collaboration group has contracted these turners for their event in late September in Bunbury and have graciously offered WAWA the opportunity to share the experience of these international turners. Details are still being worked out and notice will be distributed as soon arrangements have been finalised. Also, there is a possibility of engaging Irish woodturner, Liam O'Neill for workshops in early September of next year.

To the contingent of WA woodturners heading to Queensland for the TurnFest ... hope you all have a great time and come back enthused and inspired and with lots of stories, photos and reports for the newsletter to share with those of us unable to attend.



<u>Roving Reporter</u>

Swan, 27th January, 2016

Well the Swan Club have certainly set the standard for all to follow with an excellent day being had by all attendees. Members were welcomed by the MC Joe Clark and it was good to see that given the high temperatures expected for the day that the venue was air conditioned. The day was opened in the usual manner with the MC Joe Clark giving a warm welcome to all present. Joe advised all attendees to make sure that during the day they took the time to visit the other end of the building where the ladies had put on a display of numerous arts and crafts.

Joe then introduced Ian Keilly who is the Manager of the Parks, Forrest and Wildlife in the Goldfields. Ian advised that he had held this position for 37 years and he then went about delivering an excellent talk of the diversity of the timber species throughout the Goldfields Region. Ian advised that the region had huge varieties of wood which were dense, very hard and were ideal for wood turning and furniture making. He went on to explain how in the early



pioneering days of the Goldfields how wood was extremely important for industry. Huge amounts of timber had to be used to drive the steam engines which were necessary in nearly every part of the region. Ian explained how much of the timber was difficult to work with given how hard it was yet if one was prepared to work at it fantastic results could be achieved. Ian advised that at least 100 different species of Eucalypt were present in the area as well as a vast amount of Mulga. Ian used maps to divide the area into several regions and went through each region explaining the type of wood that was found in each one. He explained that the Great Victoria Desert was in fact wrongly described as a desert given the vast amount of Mallee Trees that could be found there. He reminded us that the Nullabor Plain translated to no trees however this was also not entirely correct given the large range of timbers that could be found there.

Ian brought along with him several hundred pieces of timber which were found in the Goldfields Region. He advised that much of it was regrowth area given that between 1936 and 1972 some 30 million tonnes of timber which equates to 1200 tonnes of timber a day, were brought into Kalgoorlie alone. Lastly Ian advised how his group had supported many wood turning, furniture making and musical instrument making groups with expeditions into the region to collect different species of timber. He advised how the timber parts of bag pipes were especially sought after by makers of the instruments. All in all a very interesting presentation on the timber available in the Goldfields.

Next Joe introduced Vaughan Richards and he gave a demonstration on block to bowl. He went about turning a few logs into slabs ready for turning. He explained how he went about examining the wood for faults before deciding where to cut, then using an electric chainsaw he went about demonstrating his method of slabbing. The timber he slabbed was Jacaranda. He also explained that no matter what method you used the cracking of the timber was almost inevitable. All you could do was minimise it. He advised how he kept all the wood shavings for his garden. Vaughan reminded us all about being safety conscious in wearing a face shield and ear protectors when doing this type of work. Vaughan advised that once he cut the slabs he often weighed them before storing them. He did this a lot with sheoak and jarrah. He would then weigh them again just prior to using them. What he was looking for was to see how much water content they had lost during storage. He also advised that with some pieces he would complete


a rough cut before storing the item away for later use. He also reminded us to be careful with fungicide as this could easily cause problems to the wood whilst it was in storage.

Vaughan explained how he used a series of letters to identify the quality of his slabbed pieces of wood. He used A to indicate no blemishes or faults, A – A split of something similar, B then C. Anything after that was firewood. Vaughan then marked out the centre of a slab he had cut previously and mounted this on the lathe using a faceplate. Vaughan then used a bowl gauge to shape the base of the platter he was making. The wood was still a little on the green side. Having achieved the shape he wanted he fashioned a small foot on the base of the wood. Vaughan then showed how he had created his tools with a distinctive handle shape. He knew then by holding it a certain way exactly how his bevel was lying on the wood. To change the angle he simply moved the tool around to a different grip. He placed his signature of the bottom of the platter explaining this was a good way of covering up the dot in the centre.



After lunch Andrea gave a small presentation on what was happening, then she introduced Bruce Jackson who advised the results of last year club competition. Avon came out winners followed by Mandurah, Bunbury, Gosnells, Melville, Joondalup, Swan, Collie, Busselton, Wandi, Manjimup and Mundaring bring up the rear.

Vaughan then continued on with his demonstration after lunch. He explained the methods he used for sanding his work, indicating that he started with 120 grain and went through to around 600. He then used a hot glue gun to glue the base of the platter onto a face plate. Then he went about shaping and hollowing out the centre of the platter. He explained how when applying hot glue mix to his work how he always left a breather hole to allow air to escape when he brought the pieces together. He then finished the platter of with some light sanding. Once again Vaughan gave a very interesting demonstration.



After the raffle was held with an impressive number of prizes available Joe introduced Brian Kirkby who demonstrated how to use his multi centre chuck. It could be argued that it was a jig, fitted to the chuck, but no matter, Brian went about explaining how he made the chuck using some pieces of aluminium. Brian passed around a number of pieces of his work which included numerous platters which all had off centre shapes cut into them. Brian explained the importance of using counter balancing weights to the chuck so as to assist in properly balancing the work. He then mounted a piece of timber to the chuck. He then went onto explain the need to check everything before starting up. He said you must make certain all screws are tight, the counter balance weights are secure and that the variable lathe speed is set to low. Brian explained how he used a profile gauge to ensure all the holes in the platter were cut to the same depth. Once he had cut the first hole in platter he used a power tool to sand it, then he simply changed the centre by loosening the

locking nuts and moving the work to the next position. He then explained how he had two pencil marks on his tools rest which he used to ensure all his platter cuts were the same width as well

as the same depth. After completing three holes in the face of the platter, Brian demonstrated how he used cole jaws to reverse the work and remove the spigot from the base of the platter. Brian ran out of time in which to complete his demonstration. This was caused by the long running of the raffle. However albeit a very short demonstration, it was a very good one to finish of a great day.

Lastly it was over to Bruce Jackson to go through the results of the day's competition. Yet again members in all classes had excelled themselves with the standard of entries being very high. The topic of the competition was a flying saucer bowl and congratulations to all the day's winners.

Mark offered up an ingenious bottle opener for show and tell on 10 Feb made from one of his offcuts. At this session we commenced a group project. Make something from a 100mm cube of Jarrah.

On 17 Feb George Kieliger spoke on, and illustrated the pitfalls he had encountered when turning a winged bowl. This acted as a useful warning for many of us. Kevin Cheetham showed some coasters he had made decorated with photographs. Not woodturning but of interest to all of us interested in craft work.

Mark Enright was our demonstrator on 24 Feb. Mark demonstrated the finer points of turning a natural edged bowl. Unfortunately his prepared blanks all developed fine cracks which resulted in the nearly finished bowls disintegrating in dramatic fashion. In spite of this setback Mark gave an interesting demonstration accompanied by a humorous commentary.

The results of the group project were presented on 24 Feb and were critiqued by Owen O'Neill. There was a wide variety of items ranging from a nutcracker through several boxes to a miniature funerary urn, all of a good standard although the cracks in the supplied material needed attention. Interesting & varied scope of jobs.

20 Jan – Today Rob Snowdon demonstrated his approach to creating an off-set turned salt/ pepper grinder. Time did not enable Rob to complete the project & this has been scheduled into the Group programme for the 24th February. Good tabling of items for S & T.

27 Jan - Hands on day under the control of Convenor Roy with members turning a small clock. No S & T segment.

3 Feb – A demo/presentation today by our new member, Marcello Verrecchia on an overhead CNC router for which he is the agent & which can complete a multitude of tasks following appropriate programming. An intriguing & enlightening presentation leaving members quite fascinated with its scope of capabilities.

10 Feb – Syd Harvey (acting Convenor for the day) demonstrated how to make a small turned combination safe comprising two hollowed telescopic tubes with a number of wooden rings on the outside, each with letters/numbers on the outside circumference. Wooden pins comprise the locking device but can be opened when the outside rings are rotated to release the combination & allow the the "safe" to open. S & T – a good tabling described by Les Small.

17 Feb – "Hands on" day again under the control of Norm G with the project being on off -set turned small clock holder. Being "Hands on" no S & T.

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Swan Snippets

Jan 2016 and the Swan group has gathered for their first meeting of the year. Good attendance with most of the members bringing in some very interesting Show and Tell. Our Show and Tell sessions continue to showcase the varied skills and talents of our members, the items have been many and varied. Bowls of all descriptions i.e. flying saucer, pencil wood, pedestal, natural edge burl and many others. Some of the other items were wooden chain links and items to assist in their making. Hand carvings, wine cooler, tulips, tea lights, wooden tractor, birds, lidded box, biscuit barrel, candle holder, spinning top, hammer handle, biltong cutter, nut cracker, magic wands, bike hat rack, and a miniature table with turned legs along with a pull out drawer, chopping board and rolling pin.

Apologies to Bruce Sheppard for omitting to mention in the last



Swan Snippets, that congratulations goes to Bruce who won the Eric Walker Award for the most demonstrations during 2015 and the advanced category of the competition. I know Bruce was honoured to receive both these awards for a year of effort and excellence in his wood turning. Our first demonstration for the year was conducted by Malcolm Munro who held the floor with his back-to-basics demo, tool holding, and Malcolm's way of sharpening his tools assisted by his home made items to help achieve his results.

A bowl with pedestal stand from one piece of Karri wood was Joe Clark's demonstrated item. Turning this item held our interest. Well executed demo resulting in a charming shaped bowl with natural holes of interest.

The Ferguson tractor was the topic by Des Johnson who also made and displayed a small wooden replica Ferguson tractor. During the 1956 floods, the New South Wales town of Wentworth, located on the junction of the Darling and Murray Rivers, was saved from flooding, due to 500 of these tractors which were responsible for helping to erect a levee around the town which kept floodwaters at bay for months. Interesting talk.

Flying saucer bowls are the inspiration of Ian Moss and he again delighted us with a demonstration of his technique in hollowing one out. The sharp inside undercut that follows the outside profile was again demonstrated with ease and skill. Although jarrah wood is dusty and dirty it certainly makes for a lovely bowl.

Bob Jones conducted a talk on miniature Farm Wagons. Three different wagons were displayed which had been meticulously constructed. Bob has put together a kit for one of the wagons which contains the cut timber and all the other components along with a drawing to size. These kits are available for purchase through a number of different outlets, one of which will have one of Bob's wagon on display. Very interesting.

Ian Moss demonstrated all the essential steps in the creation of a natural-edge bowl, its gently undulating, bark-edged rim, reflecting the contours of the log from which it is made. Ian showed how he gets started on making a natural-edged bowl from burl. Nicely done.

Joe Clark has put together an interesting events program for the Swan Club, which includes project demonstrations, project critique, and competitions to align with WAWA competitions. Joe is encouraging all members to become involved in demonstrating rather than relying on our more senior experienced members. Our first project item was two tool handles. A very fine pair was brought in and the critique was very favourable. Another set were not to this professional standard but also received good feedback.

Our Swan Weekend workshop was a great success on the 27th Feb and we would like to thank all members who assisted with the planning, preparation and clean up on the day. But more importantly our thanks go out to our sponsors, demonstrators, competition judges, roving reporter, very helpful partners and all who attended, resulting in making our Workshop such an enjoyable day.

DEMONSTRATION SEMINARS

Obviously, if the particular date does not suit a member, you would be more than welcome to book another venue.





At a 'Hands on' morning (in 2009), at the Melville Group, Norm Gratte had us all turning Easter Eggs boxes. The main purpose of the exercise was 'hollowing'. The second problem was the shape of an egg?


To draw the 'perfect' egg shape.


Draw a circle, say 40mm diameter, and mark the vertical & horizontal centre lines.

Draw the lines AD & BC that pass through E. Set the compass to 40mm and with centre B, draw arc AC. Repeat the process to produce arc BD.

Then with centre E and EC as radius, complete the egg.

Having completed an accurate drawing, enclose a rectangle round the shape and check for the 'Golden rectangle' !





The Easter Egg box – the big question is, where should one locate the join. I am quite happy to leave that to personal choice !
