Melville Mutterings

19th Aug - This weeks demo was the continuation of turning a three sided lidded bowl with stand and finial by David Rechter. For those who were not able to attend the "you tube" video for last week can be found using this link.

David emphasised that it is crucial that the centre is spot on to ensure the corners are correct. David then started to turn the reversed side of the bowl gouge ensuring he lined up with the 2nd mark on the tool rest thus enabling him to shape the bowl using fine cuts. He then sanded the bowl. Proceeding on, he then turned a 100ml recess that will finally take the lid using a curved parting tool that also had a groves at the end that enabled to be used for beading. Using a normal parting tool, a bowl gouge and a bandan David shaped the inside of the bowl and finished off using a curved scraper. Using a skew chisel he then proceeded to shape the underside of the bowl using very fine cuts ensuing that the edge was protected and broke the edge by sanding. Followed by establishing the inside of the of the bowl so that lid would fit perfectly. David then shaped the lid to his desired design. Finally reversed the lid into his special chuck which enabled him to shape the lid top using a skew. David removed the lid so that he could turn a finial. A very informative demonstration thanks David. For more details refer to his "You Tube" video part 2.

26th Aug - The demo today was by Roy Lundy on how he uses his favourite tool (a skew), tips, methods of use and its versatility. I am sure that the members were convinced to adopt it as their favourite tool! Roy then described and demonstrated how to use a skew. Hope our members are now convinced to use a skew. Once again Roy produced his expertise in using a skew.

2th Sept – On this day James Murray addressed the meeting on selecting and turning green timber. James described the choice of greenwood to turn. One needs to determine on the grain required for the piece to turn. For more detailed information refer to David Milton's email dated 2nd Sept which has James's attaches notes.

9th Sept – Our meeting today was by our long standing member Lindsay Toop, who until he retired has just turned to our meetings. Lindsay demonstrated items that attracted our members' attention especially when he blew his turned whistles. Lindsay continued by turning a whistle of his design, using eye detail to determine shape and size. The whistle requires a plunger to regulate the sound which he turned and fitted. As Lindsay progressed with his demonstration he frequently showed us his dry humour. Hence a very entertaining and enjoyable demo. Thanks Lindsay.

16th Sept -The meeting was opened by convenor Denis Tapley with 50 members present. David Finch announced that the 'Melville Great Top Spinning Competition' would be held on 7th October. We expect great competition between members to produce the longest spinning top. The tops will then become part of our Christmas toy donations.

Today's demonstration was by Peter Gerring who showed us how to make a three-faceted tool handle. To start he marked up the centre and the three offset points at 120° to each other and 19 mm from the centre at the end, then rounded the timber on centre point using his skew chisel. Next, he drilled the hole for the steel and marked the timber for the ferrule position and narrow points on the handle. The handle was then set up with the front held central in a chuck and the rear of the handle set up on the first of the offset points. Using a skew chisel, the first facet was created on the back part of the handle, then the next two facets were created using the other offset positions. The three facets were evened up, then back on centre the front half of the handle was turned to a comfortable shape. Peter used a jam chuck to cut a fit for the ferule and cleaned up the handle end.

conducted by Rob Snowden and featured items from Rob Shannon, Graham Padget, Bernard Boycott, Norm Gratte, Ray Woodcock, Milton Rundle, Roy Lundy, and Robyn McLean.

23rd Sept – Denis opened the meeting and then mentioned that Ian Ludford promoted from novice to intermediate and John Quartermaine moved from intermediate to advance.

This week's demo was by Denis Tapley who conveyed to us the wonders that can be achieved in practical and artistic forms using Cut and reassembled methods.

Dennis presented slides on the criteria for these competition Cut and re-assembled items. If members wish to view his slides he said to email him your request. George described his items that he brought to the meeting. Refer to photo.=>



Dennis proceeded to turn a cut and re-assemble

bowl of his design on the club's new Laguna lathe using a stepped jaw chuck. Firstly, he hollowed out the bowl, then using a template finished the hollow. Followed by shaping the bowl face and standing it flat with MDF board that had a abrasive sheet adhered to the board. Dennis then shaped the outside of the bowl with two decorative lines. He then proceeded to shape the outside of the bowl. Very intriguing demonstration.

S & T was presented by Syd Harvey of WAWA 2020 yearly awards, intermediate 1st to John Quartermaine, advance 2nd place to David Milton, 1st advance plus open, popular and to Denis

Tapley, three sided bowls, an array specialist chisels, segment items, a walking stick and two pens that had combined acrylic and wood.

MELVILLE CLUBROOMS 4th October

WELCOME

Syd welcomed all with a special mention to Joe Clark who has had 3 stints in hospital in as many months, but is on the road to recovery. He also said we were delighted to see his chauffer Don Clarke.

lan then took over in Aiton's absence using last meetings notes to keep Syd on track.

SAFETY

The group have adopted the safety procedures originally sent to Melville by Aiton. Aiton will also prepare a more comprehensive safety registration form showing member competence on machinery usage that Syd will sign off on once achieved. We were then treated to the band aided thumb of a very embarrassed Jon Braine that explained a lapse in concentration whilst cutting led to the nicking of his finger. Syd said that it was quite easy when cutting many segments to become a bit blasé about using the saw and that it was imperative to keep alert Joe Clark suggested we develop a sort of "inherent fear" of the dangers when using machinery to avoid complacency. Don Clarke added for additional safety, changing saw blades for ripping or crosscutting was desirable and no problem if you organise your ripping before switching to crosscut.

SOCIAL MEDIA

Apparently the new WAWA web page is up on the old website but Colin and Jon said it has very little content. Please send Aiton photos of any completed projects for recognition and inclusion on the new website.

SPEAKER CASE (Finalised)

This project has now been re-modified and completed and will be dropped off at WAWA in Wandi along with an invoice by Noel Moyes, who needs his ute space back. We will advise Jim Cameron to add to the COM agenda for organisation of transport as it doesn't currently have a trailer spot.

STORAGE

As Melville have retired some of their large lathes, a re-shuffle involving the bandsaw in the back room may be appropriate to facilitate storage of our equipment and wood stocks. Syd will investigate, as there may also be some expansion plans on the city agenda for the Melville club rooms.

SOFTWARE

Don Clarke was asked if he could conduct a training course for members now that we have our own licensed copies of the "Woodturner Pro" suite. Don suggested that he was willing to do a video in co-operation with Noel on the use of "Segment Pro" as an ongoing training program that could be used by all current or future members. This idea was met with great enthusiasm and we look forward to seeing the final results.

AROUND THE TABLE

Syd H - asked Colin how the Timbecon open day was received. Colin explained that the place was packed, with supplier displays and sales in the car park with up to 400 or so attendees. Timbecon are considering making this an annual event and Syd will speak with them to see if we can place a display and sales area in the next one. **All members, please let us know your thoughts**.

Noel M - mentioned that when using the "snap to" profile during designing that he usually added 6mm to the OD of ring segments and 4mm to the ID of ring segments to allow for "F - ups!" (design modifications.) The trouble is it changes his profile from the original concept when

it comes to turning and so suggests working off the original cutting list for turning thickness measurements which you can use calipers for when final turning..

Jon B – isn't pushing his supplier because he's still recovering from his injured shoulder and is still hampered with manufacturing. Aside from that, Jon's thumb is on the mend..

Ray Y - simply apologised for his lack of attendance but said Sundays were much better for him. **Trevor F** - also said that he could plan around Thursdays or Sundays now that we have settled on firm dates. He has also purchased a book press from Amazon to use as a segment stomper.





Stan N – had gap problems when assembling his rings and Ian Hamilton said he also had similar trouble with 2 of his rings. Both were cut here at the last meeting. Ian borrowed the sled to use on his home saw (identical to clubs) and had no problems with 2 rings he made. Syd suggested we may have knocked the sled out of alignment whilst cutting segments here. Lesson learned, check that alignment is correct before cutting too many segments.

Don C – offered his home made lathe drum sander for free which Colin quickly snapped up and mentioned he always had trouble with sanding Sheoak as it tended to burn. Several members conceded that this is a known problem when power sanding Sheoak. Don also stated that he used an AEG compound mitre saw which was excellent, well priced and apparently the upmarket version of Ryobi. He was also obviously chuffed about the group dobbing him in for a training video. (Because he's too nice to say no.)

Joe C - also apologised for his lack of attendance as mentioned earlier. (I didn't realise that the thought of seeing Syd could actually send people to hospital.)

lan H - asked how many of the nuts to purchase for use in assembling our Longworth chuck kits and was authorised to purchase 80 from China. Noel Moyes offered to donate the balance of his 100 box purchase of 65mm socket head cap screws to the project. Colin Truscett suggested a 100mm scroll chuck faceplate could be used as an alternative to a 75mm or 100mm M30 face plate for mounting. White rubber doorstop mounts, furniture screws, washers etc will be purchased as required later on.

Ross F - gave the group a fairly comprehensive breakdown of how our group's finances are tracking and has instituted a receipt procedure where Melville sign a receipt for attendance funds submitted by him and in return submits one of their own receipts to us. He will also submit a proper paper record for the group once completed by his boss (Marilyn) of the previous few month's transactions. Joe Clark said we need to open our own Bank Account and Ross said he (Marilyn) was already looking into it.

Our meeting on the 11th September was a bit of a disaster as it seems people either forgot, were sick or away on holidays. One person though had a one on one lesson.

The next meeting on 25th September had better attendance and we had a small show of work done over the past couple of months.

A PowerPoint presentation on "Thinking Outside the Box" had many examples of turned, cut and reassembled items from easy through to complex. Discussions followed on the best way to proceed to make these items, with several choosing items they would like to try. The demonstrations in October 9th and 23rd and November 13th and 27th will cover chip carving,

The demonstrations in October 9th and 23rd and November 13th and 27th will cover chip carving inlay work and relief carving. Dates will be advised for these demonstrators when we confirm their availability to demonstrate.

Swan Snippets

25th August 2020 - Ian Moss showed the group how he produces one of his favourite wood turned items. A UFO flying saucer bowl. The profile enables Ian to have a surface for different embellishments. Paint, Dremel work, lattice, and routing. Today he showed us how he goes about routing on these surfaces producing different segments on the item for embellishment. Ian's culture of sharing and teaching his ideas lit the spark in members as we have had a number of show and tell replicas since his demo.

1st September 2020 - As our old First Aid kit is now surplus to requirement Brian invited bids from the members. Noel Moyes gave us all a quick refresher course on how to use the Defibrillator. Three members are going to take a First Aid Course shortly.

This week's demonstration was of a little racing car, by Lindsay Ford, inspired by an item from Richard Raffan's book on Turning Toys. Once the basic car shape was cut from a piece of pine, holes drilled for the cockpit and axles, Lindsay turned the body of the car slightly offset, using a skew chisel but a roughing gouge could also be used. The wheels were then turned from a blank, the axles turned or made from a piece of dowel. The drivers, or Pegs as they're known, were made to fit the cockpit. What a great idea for Christmas presents!

A wide range of pieces were brought along this week for Show and Tell, including a bud vase, angels, flying saucer type bowls, a segmented bowl and a jarrah burl bowl.

8th September 2020 - Ian Moss demonstrated next month's competition item of something turned, cut up and reassembled. Ian passed around a "spherigon" he'd turned through the week. The dimensions had to be spot on so the pieces all fit together perfectly when the piece is cut in half and rotated. An alternative would be to halve the blank and paper glue together before turning. Ian also brought along his Norwegian drinking horn which was made from 7 pieces cut

from the square block and paper glued together then turned to the shape of a champagne flute then taken apart and reassembled. The finished item required a lot of hand sanding and embellishment but looked amazing! Ian's actual demo was of his lidded box which was turned like a doughnut, from a 25mm bowl blank, cut in half and glued together. Ian certainly gave us all some food for thought and hopefully we'll see a number of interesting items turned for the next competition.

Lucky Lisa won our raffle, again.

An array of "flying saucer" bowls, embellished bowls, a 3-cornered offset bowl, spinning tops and a wandoo pepper grinder were on display this week, as well as a very intricate 361-piece segmented vase. Bob Jones brought along one of his wooden wagons and kindly offered to run a small wheel making club, during coffee time, for those interested members.

There were four entries for this month's competition for the three-cornered lidded bowl with stand. Lindsay Ford gave a brief critique of each entry and complimented all those who had a go at a pretty tricky piece of turning. The results were as follows:

Advanced – 1st – Bruce Shephard, 2nd – Brian Mather, 3rd – Elison Corstorphan

15th September 2020 - Bruce Shephard demonstrated a natural edged bowl joined with a saucer. All from one piece of wood. Unfortunately, as sometimes happens he had a catch and the item fly out of the lathe. Bruce was unable to complete his item. Bruce also explained to the group that this misfortune happens to the best of turners and challenged members to get up the front and have a go at demonstrating as they were needed to keep the group with active demonstrators.

22nd September 2020 - Today was the first day of our two-day TimTam Challenge, organised and prepared by Brian Kirkby. The challenge for the 4 teams was to produce an inside out piece of turning of a Christmas ornament. This time around there's an all Ladies team, taking on the men's teams so the pressure was on!! Each team member had 20 minutes at the lathe and one member has taken the piece home to sand and finish, split and then reglue the other way round. It'll be interesting to see what next week holds.

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


From Edition 144: The Detail Gouge

The previous edition dealt with the Bowl Gouge, this time we have a look at the Detail Gouge, which is also known as the Spindle or Lady Finger Nose.



The Detail Gouge has a **shallow flute** and a **longer bevel**, compared to the Bowl Gouge.

The Detail gouge is used mainly on spindle work to cut beads, coves, ogees and other detail. As with the Bowl Gouge, the bevel must 'rub', hence a cutting or slicing action is used.



Historical, there were two types of small gouges – **the light type and the long & strong**. The light type produced mainly for the hobbyist, were thin in section and about 150 mm long. The long & strong made from a square section, 300 mm long, with a shallow flute on top and the bottom corners rounded.


Over time manufactures made changes/improvements in design, in this case the introduction of the round section.

A gouge made from a round section is the same as a gouge made from square section with the same flute size, only stronger. Hence most gouges available today are round in section. If both the square & round section, have the same shape & width flute, and both ground to a lady finger nose shape the cutting edge ie. **the bottom of the flute**- will be the same.

The main problem with the Detail gouge is with the **shape of the cutting edge-** here I will quote George Hadfield:

"I recommend a semi-elliptical shape for the cutting edge or as some people say, lady's finger. The semi-elliptical shape is critical when you are turning a concave shape, such as a hollow- or what you may call a cove. If the cutting edge is too full you will find it difficult to make a cut exactly on a prescribed line when cutting the edge of a hollow.

If the cutting edge shape is too pointy it will have straight sides and you will find it impossible to cut a full rounded high point for you to lead the cut. Usually the straight sides are caused by incorrect grinding techniques."
