

#### A SAFETY WARNING:

About a year ago metal sanding plates were recommended to me for sanding turnings. There are good reasons for this as they are quite effective and last well. Late one evening (about 10pm) I was sanding the inside of a shallow bowl, and what happened next was so fast that I can only speculate on the sequence of events. The result however was very clear and it was a nasty gash to my thumb requiring four stitches. There has been some nerve damage but it could have been a lot worse. I will never use these plates again on rotating wood. May I suggest that if you also sand with these plates either think again, take great care, or for the foolhardy, check your medical insurance. They are potentially very dangerous.

#### WHY FULL PROGRAMMES ARE NOT ALWAYS IN NEWSLETTERS:

Numerous complaints have reached me: some say after having missed a weekend, "Oh! I would have gone if I had known that was on" or "it is too far to go if it is just an ordinary weekend" The idea is to go and enjoy each event, seeing something new demonstrated or something old done in a different way helps us all, apart from sharing the company of a nice group of people.


#### WOODTURNERS TIPS:

Sanding the inside of a turned bowl can be more easily carried out using the following tip from Russ. Wrap sand paper around a tennis ball and use the combination as a sanding block. A squash ball is also useful on small jobs. It is comfortable and easy to control.

#### WOOD CHUCKS:

Many woodturners spend large amounts of money buying all types of fancy chucks to hold whatever their current project may be. It is not uncommon to pay \$100-\$200 for an elaborate chuck. While these chucks are excellent investments they are expensive and there are cheaper methods of holding the wood. Wood chucks are not a new idea and many woodturners have been using them for years. All you require is an ample supply of off-cuts from a friendly builder or furniture manufacturer. These scraps can then be used either on a face plate or screw chuck, both of which usually come with your lathe. Below is a method of turning a bowl using only a face plate and a cheap wood chuck. Begin by mounting your wood on a face plate and then turn the bottom of the bowl as shown in figures 1 and 2. Be sure to make the foot at right angles to the base of your bowl. The size of the foot will vary according to the size of the bowl, but you will be surprised how little wood you will waste using this method. Once the outside of the bowl has been completed remove it from the face plate and place a scrap of wood, large enough to take the foot of your bowl, on the face plate cut a

hole that will exactly match your bowl's foot as shown in figure 3. A couple of spots of PVA will ensure that your bowl stays in the wood chuck while you shape the inside of your bowl. Then all you need to do is to use a parting tool, as shown in figure 4, to separate the bowl from the chuck. It is a good idea to use a small saw to cut through the final 10mm of the foot to ensure that the bowl does not fly off the lathe.


We have been advised that W.A.W.A. member Ted Trenfield (467) passed away suddenly 8th October 1990. We express our sympathy to Kath and family.



#### **ROSE BOWL:**

Bert Simmons from Brookton submitted the following interesting project. Thank you for this Bert, we are always on the lookout for new and different projects. Bert writes 'I have made and found the design attractive and functional. I used Estapol 7008 two pot clear finish 3-4 coats depending on porosity of wood used, each mix of Estapol thinned with Estapol thinners No. 7008 equal part mix with equal part thinners which gives very good penetration and a good smooth finish when brushed on, and is water proof, follow instructions re thinning carefully. NOTE: This finish will waterproof bowl both inside and outside.

#### A 'TOUGH' MAN:

My lathe is a **TOUGH** bought about six years ago, I have no regrets about my purchase. it has served me well. It's basic features are - four speeds, three feet between centres, cast iron stepped bed which allows 16" diameter turning for three inches from the driving centre and 12" diameter over the remainder. The driving centre is hollow and threaded externally 1" by 10 T.P.I. and with a left handed thread on the outboard side of the lathe.

For the type of turning I do, often involving out of balance blocks of timber, the rigidity and weight of the TOUGH is an essential feature. My lathe is not fixed to the floor and the self weight is necessary to reduce vibration. On occasion I would like the slowest speed (RPM unknown) to be a bit slower when dealing with a particularly extravagantly piece of mallee root, but this may well impose a safety limit on what I may try.

As supplied the lathe did not have a live tailstock centre (since fitted) and the tool rest is not fitted with a cam lock. The current models do have these features but otherwise appear to be much the same (apart from the considerable increase in price)

Both the driving and the driven centres have a No 2 Morse taper internally so a suitable drill chuck may be fitted at either end if required. The travel on the tailstock is  $2^7/8^{\circ}$ . The lathe was not fitted with a motor as supplied and I fitted a half horse power motor directly below the stepped drive pulley. The motor is not mounted on a hinged platform, speed changes are made by slipping the driving belt from one pair of pulleys to the next.

I have no qualms about recommending this lathe to any user whether experienced or a novice. It will cope with a wide range of turnings. If the outboard facility is used the range becomes even greater, but in this case a separate tool rest would have to be made.



## **LEISURE ACTIVITIES WITH WOOD**






