FROM FOREST HILL WOODTURNERS INC. NEWSLETTER:

In a recent issue of our Newsletter, I had occasion to reprint a news item about the dangers associated with arc welding and wearing contact lenses. Since then one of our members, Wolf Gartner, himself an optometrist, sent me (from Singapore) an article which refutes this claim.

The article is culled from the March 1991 issue of 'Australian Optometry, page 6. The item almost fills the entire page, however, I have reprinted below only that part titled 'AOA Press release'

A.O.A. Press Release

Like a virulent virus, a medical myth is sweeping through Australian trade and professional work places, causing havoc in work sites.

Some factory Managers are so concerned about the 'safety' of their employees' sight that they are threatening to close down assembly lines.

The myth is an old one that surfaces regularly, particularly around April. This year it struck early. It claims that people who wear contact lenses and use welding equipment without protective eye goggles are in danger from microwaves generated by the electric arc.

The arc is supposed to fuse the contact lens to the surface of the eyeball the cornea is removed with it! Absolutely ridiculous and stupid said Joe Chakman, Executive Director of the A.O.A. It's like saying that when you remove your hat after a day in the sun your ears will come off. It is medically impossible for a sane person to pluck their own eyeball out of their head. Unless they deliberately lacerate the eyeball they cannot remove the cornea.

I cannot understand how responsible government departments such as the Department of Industry and Environment and Workcare are spreading this rumour in the workplace, said Joe. They are causing unnecessary hardship and fear in the workplace by threatening people's jobs. Together with some of the trade and professional journals, which picked up the story from the USA late last year, the Departments and their occupational health and safety managers are spreading unsubstantiated rumour of the worst kind.

The hoax has been traced back to a 1970 report in a Canadian Forests Products Ltd., Newsletter, which reprinted the story from an early edition of the 'Chicago Bridge' That paper reported a 1967 incident at the Bethlehem Steel Corporation Shipyard in Baltimore, USA, where an electrical switchbox blew up in the face of an employee, who was wearing contact lenses and safety glasses at the time, said Joe. He was treated for a corneal injury the next day and his vision returned to normal within a few days. The trade, professional and corporate media picked up the story and began publishing it in employee magazines and thats how the hoax started. Since then the US Food and Drug Administration, the American Optometric Association, the AOA Contact Lens Committee and various leading medical and research people have pointed out the ridiculous nature of the hoax.

I am really surprised that Departments, such as Workcare continue spreading it without reference to us, the Victorian College of Optometry or the Eye and Ear Hospital, even their own resident doctors, he said. This morning I was told that a Victorian Department of Industry report signed by the Chief Inspector of Mines and Quarries, Mr. F.O. Jones, was hanging on the notice board in a Kalgoorlie mine under the heading 'Significant Incident Report'. The only significant incident in this case is that sane, intelligent and educated people can be caught up in a hoax of this magnitude, Joe said.

As the days passed I thought of the answer and after several prototypes I succeeded in the development of an apparatus. After mentioning the presence of the development whilst demonstrating at last months W.A.W.A. workshop at Rockingham I have been contacted on a regular basis with queries regarding the matter.

As the registration of the Patent is now in place I can now inform the interested persons along with all members of the W.A.W.A. that the concept which has been developed by myself will be marketed by "ARBORTECH PTY.LTD" PERTH WA as the "ARBORTECH POWER GOUGE" and it will retail in the months to come at a realistic figure to suit the woodturner. I openly state that this concept will take woodturning into the 21st century and you the woodturner when you observe it in operation will be amazed as to the functions that it creates eg it will turn a 12" x 9" dry Jarrah burl into a bowl in under 15 minutes, softer timber eg. sheoak is a breeze for the unit. In fact it loves any timber presented to it.

At this stage I cannot because of obvious reasons elaborate on the construction of the gouge apart from stating it is of all steel and if treated with respect it will last you the tuner a lifetime, so please turners hang on, be patient, the answer to your turning dreams is just around the corner, till then happy turning.

HEALTH & SAFETY:

Industrial Solvents.

Solvents are the most widely used chemicals in industry. Workers in many different jobs are regularly exposed to a variety of solvents which can have serious health effects. Workers employed in the printing, paints, plastics, petrochemicals, photographic, metal-working and building industries may be especially at risk.

What are Solvents?

Industrial solvents are chemicals which can dissolve other substances. Industrial solvents are very useful because they can dissolve oil and grease, they can thin paints and resins, and are important in the manufacture of plastics, glues, inks and other chemicals. Thousands of common products used at work and at home contain solvents. Some typical products include degreasers, dry cleaning fluids, oil based paints, adhesives, typing correction fluids and pesticides.

HOW DO SOLVENTS GET INTO THE BODY?

Solvents have both long and short term effects on the body.

Short term effects are caused by single exposures, often to a large amount of solvent. A very serious health effect of solvents is their anaesthetic effect. That is, they make you sleepy. With increasing overexposure to solvents you will feel dizzy, drowsy, 'drunk' and may become unconscious. Over exposure can be fatal.

Long term effects result from frequent exposure, usually day after day, often to smaller amounts than are needed to produce short term effects. In the long term, solvents may effect:-

The brain and nervous system

The skin, causing dermatitis

The liver

The blood-forming system

The kidneys

The fertility of both men and women

The foetus

Some solvents can cause cancer, for example, benzene

Tackling the problem.

The following control methods can be used.

The elimination of the most hazardous solvents, especially those that cause cancer.

Safe handling procedures should be adopted that prevent solvent vapours reaching the air, and which ensure that solvents do not come into contact with the skin. All solvent containers should have air-tight lids, and solvents should be pumped direct from one container to another rather than poured.

The prevention of fire and explosion by stopping any work, such as welding, in areas where solvent vapours may have built up. Any potential sources of ignition, such as welding in areas where solvent vapours may have built up. Any potential sources of ignition such as electrical wiring must be insulated. Effective exhaust ventilation which removes mists or vapours from the air is a good way to prevent

Effective exhaust ventilation which removes mists or vapours from the air is a good way to prevent the inhalation of solvent vapours.

Natural Ventilation can be used to reduce exposures. Work in the open air is better than working in a closed room or semi enclosed space.

Personal protective clothing and equipment is important, but should never be used as the only method of control. Protective gear may include:-

Respirators


Specially woven and treated overalls

Gloves made from material which cannot be penetrated by solvent. This can be tested by hanging up the glove and filling it with solvent. See how long it takes for the solvent to come through. This will be the length of time you can safely wear the gloves.

Face shields with eye covering Aprons


Gum boots

Personal hygiene is also important. Ensure that food is not eaten in solvent areas. SOLVENTS SHOULD NEVER BE USED TO WASH OIL AND GREASE FROM HANDS.


Mount stock in the cup chuck and rough turn the ball with a gouge. - Set the ball turning jig so that it's pivotting axis is exactly below the middle of the ball. - Make sure the cutting edge is on centre height and take progressive cuts until the required diameter is achieved. - Sand and polish the ball before parting it off.


