



#### MANDURAH 18TH & 19TH MAY 1991.

Ivor Bridges in his instruction of a new 1" Tough cup chuck for work of 4" long x 3" dia., it is sufficient to have a spigot 1" long and 1" parallel, and for small work 3" long a spigot of 1/2" long is OK very little waste wood. Work that has not been yet parted off may be removed and replaced for additional work.

Tool sharpening Ron Goodson's large wooden blades to indicate sharpening angles in such a clear manner.

Bob Richards and audience really had a ball doing his Pot Pouri Bowl.

Laminated Bowls - Viv Paust's method certainly saves wood (much needed now) particularly such

large bowls.

Dick Morley showed how his spiral routing machine worked (eye protection needed when operating)

#### FOR THE OWNERS OF VICMARC CHUCKS.

P.J. Grainger 121 Graeme Street Kalgoorlie W.A. 6430 advises that he had much trouble with his chuck after it was 'run in' the jaws would suddenly loosen the piece of wood. The manufacturer acknowledged that this was a problem and offered to modify the fault, however, after repairs the fault persisted.

Anyway along with two other Kalgoorlie owners of Vicmarc Chucks they carried out a successful modification for a total cost of \$10 which was mostly taken up for the cost of 2 thread cutting taps. If any member has a Vicmarc Chuck he or she is urged to modify it. Send a self addressed stamped envelope to Mr. Granger at the above address and he will forward a list of tools required and a step by step description of the modification.







#### **ECONOMICAL LAMINATED BOWL:**







Method: Tilt bandsaw table to appropriate angle and cut the eight 'half rings' and two semi circles. Glue each ring separately and leave to set. Compete glueing of bowl "blank". Turn on faceplate of wood lathe.

Three advantages of this method: -

- 1. Economical use of timber
- 2. Economical use of lathe time
- 3. Strength greater than solid piece of timber

#### SANDING: Max Nicholas Sydney Woodturners Guild.

I am by no means an expert, but I would like to respond to the article on sanding in February Newsletter. I wholeheartedly agree with our Editor that the lathe should not be slowed when seasoned timber is sanded.

On the question of sanding green timber I have had great success using a hot air gun ( Wagner Power Stripper) I set the gun on high, hold it 50-75mm from the job and use it for 15-30 seconds before sanding.

This is repeated before moving on to the next grade of paper, if the paper needs to be unclogged. Unlike the author, who finds it necessary to use grades from 180 to 1200 I find that 180, 240 and 320 give a very smooth finish. A hint when paper gets clogged, brush it with a stiff toothbrush or fine wire brush, you will be surprised how well the paper is restored.

## STUNNING WEEKEND:

Whilst bowl turning at The Belmont weekend a number of members took part in hands-on turning of a 12" bowl. This bowl was held very securely by an expansion type collett chuck. The base of the bowl was turned very thin at the point where the colletts were transmitting their great pressure. What I do not know is, did the bowl I was about to turn split before the tool I was using touched it, or did it bust from a combination of centrifugal force combined with chuck pressure when the machine started up.

A few people stated they had had similar experiences.

My advice is, know what thickness the base of your bowl is, re-tighten your chuck to a lesser pressure after the roughing out has been completed. Lastly wear your face shield that you loaned to the other member, who you were supposed to be teaching a safe way to turn.

#### SAVING VARNISH

AS WE all know, it is far cheaper to buy varnish by the pint tin (600 ml) yet we usually find that long before it is half emptied it has "gone off". Well, that's what happens to me anyway. For any one else who has a similar problem, here is an answer that I have found works for me.

Almost all of us know at least one young mother with a baby about one year old. Talk to her nicely and ask her to save a couple of dozen of her baby food jars. Wash them out well, (and DRY them too), buy a pint tin (of varnish), Divide it among the small jars and screw the tops back on. Store them in a cool dark corner UPSIDE DOWN - this makes sure no air leaks in past the lid.

The small quantity in each jar will cover most items that we usually varnish - and if one jar does "go off" before more varnish is needed - the others are still okay. By the way - fill the jars 3 - 6 mm from the top.



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
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
