



## WEEKEND WORKSHOPS SHAVINGS FROM THE COMMITTEE:




Some people don't like the word "headquarters" perhaps the above title is more acceptable? The response to the survey was predominantly in favour of a "home" and they could see a range of uses for it. Many of those not in favour gave cost as their principal or only objection. It is clear that any proposal to establish Association Clubrooms in Perth will have to include a "cost impact statement" More on this later.

Your Association has a proud record of staging some fine exhibitions of work. The most recent, which is currently open until 30th July, is at the Swan Cottage Homes Gallery in Bentley. The next one is the "Exhibition of Excellence in Turned Wood" at Allendale Square, 77 St. George's Terrace, Perth from 9th to 22nd August. Members attending the opening at 2.30pm on the 9th are asked to assist the Association's role as host on that day by bringing a plate of savoury food. Something which can be eaten with the fingers whilst standing, possibly holding a glass, would be just right.

A partly coloured bowl will be the competition item for the October weekend. In support of this, there will be demonstrations of air brush painting at the Melville Group meeting on 23rd July and at the September weekend at Leederville. ## **CONSTITUTION CHANGES:**

The Committee of Management has recommended some changes to the Constitution and these will be considered at the Annual General Meeting in September

It is believed the amendments as proposed, will clarify the matters as described and assist in the administration of the Association. It is proposed that Clause 6 be recorded as follows:-

- 'The Committee may receive or invite applications from and admit persons to the following categories of member:-
  - (a) Ordinary Member
  - (b) Junior Member
  - (c) Associate Member
  - (d) Corporate Member
- 'Ordinary Member' means a person who is interested in the practice, promotion and fostering the art of wood turning.
- ' Junior Member' means a person having the characteristics of an ordinary member and who is under the age of 18 years
  - 'Associate Member" means the spouse of an ordinary member or a junior member.

'Corporate Member' means any organisation, association or corporation which is interested in the practice and/or promotion and/or fostering of wood turning.'

The amendment here is simply to change the sequence and amend the description of a Junior.

It is proposed that Clause 9 be amended to read as follows:-

;Persons who become members of the Association may renew that membership each year by paying within the prescribed time, the prescribed fee. The membership fee, as determined by resolution each year at the Annual General Meeting, shall be due and payable immediately following the conclusion of the meeting. Any member who has not paid the membership fee by 31 December, following the Annual General Meeting at which the fee was fixed, shall have their name expunged from the Register of Members by the Committee of Management, and immediately thereafter, membership is terminated.'

The purpose of the amendment is to make it clear that membership fees must be paid by 31 December and that membership is terminated on that date if the fee has not been paid.

It is proposed that Clause 33h be amended by adding the following passage:

'excluding matters properly required to be dealt with under Claude 32'

The purpose of the amendment is to require that matters of importance be the subject of a Notice of Motion if proposed for discussion at the Annual General Meeting.

It is proposed that Clause 38 be amended to read as follows:-

'At all general meetings only junior members, ordinary members and life members shall be entitled to vote. Voting shall be by a show of hands, save in the case of the election of officers where voting shall be by a secret ballot. In the event of equality of votes, the chairman of the meeting shall have a second or casting vote'

The purpose of this amendment is to clarify the position that only those who pay a nomination and membership fee are entitled to vote at an Annual General Meeting. While Associates may attend an Annual General Meeting, they do not have any voting rights.

After these matters have been considered at the Annual General Meeting in September, the Constitution will be reprinted and copies will be available for those interested. It is believed that any copies of the Constitution in circulation now are "originals" and do not include the amendments made in January 1992. July 1992

## DEMOS:

Woodturners, Associates and visitors were witness to a well arranged programme of demonstrations and woodturning aids at the Mandurah weekend of 16th-

Dick Morley was foremost demonstrating a shop made router crafter and assured us that it was far superior to the commercial article. Dick then proceeded to take gadgets from his bag as though it were a magicians bottomless sack. First came a spirograph followed by an expanding chuck, two sphere turning attachments, a chainsaw jib, a slow revving attachment for spray finishing, home made tool rest, longworth chuck, vacuum chucking device and grinding job, all made by woodturning members.

Gordon Ward delivered a most impressive talk on wood technology and how to cut and turn wood to the best advantage. This is a subject many of us would do well to study more closely.

Ron Goodson delivered a well explained talk on tool sharpening which is always helpful to new members.

After lunch Bob Richards entertained us to a humourous demonstration on how to turn a pepper mill, which finally finished up doll shape.

As I was absent on Sunday I can only thank those who offered their services that day.

June 20th - 21st saw us again at Leederville where that first class exponent of offset turning John Rule very ably demonstrated the intricacies of his craft, I think we should all admire his skill and dedication to this method of turning. Yours truly followed John with an explanation of the methods involved in making bowls with fretsawn rims. John Shinnick delivered a very interesting talk on tool use and form with a display of special tools he uses. Gordon Ward was again showing us how to prepare wood for the lathe and Gerald Young gave a very good demonstration of cutting dovetails with the Leigh dovetail jib.

I think the most interesting talk of the day was by Dr. Jeff Ecker micro surgeon from Royal Perth Hospital. He entralled all listeners as he explained and showed slides on micro surgery. These slides showed fingers and hand replacements after accidents and even showed the replacement of a patients thumb with his big toe complete with nail. Woodturners beware I think it best to keep your original thumb.

Ivor Bridges was Sundays demonstrator dealing mainly with cup and pin chucks.

The Association thanks all people involved, especially Dr. Ecker for the valuable time he spent enlightening our members on the finer points of his profession.

## Hints for W.A.W.A. Shopping Centre "wood" be female sales assistants by 'A Face Plate'

Prior to leaving home at dawn on day one ascertain that your woodie has the right cardboard box of articles, has his itemised list, his required tools and may be brief case - it has been reported that such articles have remained resting comfortably on the garage/workshop floor or kitchen table.
