


### VIC WOOD.

West Australian woodturners have been privileged over the past three weeks to have Vic Wood, one of Australia's premier turners and educators, demonstrating and teaching to groups.

Vic Wood was born in Melbourne and educated in Dandenong. He trained as an Art and Craft teacher doing grades 1 and 2 Woodturning and grades 1,2,3 and 4 in Cabinet Making and completed a fellowship in gold and silversmithing.

Vic taught in high schools in Victoria and was then seconded to a tertiary institution to train teachers. After a period on secondment the position was made permanent and he remained for 12 years.

In 1982 Vic went full time turning, conducting intensive woodturning courses as well as marketing his work and competing in National Craft Exhibitions. He has won several awards including the Marbut Gunnerson Wood Award, Kraft National Wood Award and 2nd and 3rd in National Woodturning Awards.

While in WA Vic has conducted a summer school in Albany for two weeks, judged and given a critique at the Denmark Woodturners exhibition. He then gave a full days demonstration at the WAWA January weekend and conducted two day workshops at both Bunbury and Perth.

Vic has found the WA groups both attentive and very interested to learn as well as totally co-operative. He finds the standard of turning here to be of a high quality but feels that there is a lot to be learned in finishing. He also believes that more attention needs to be paid to design. He suggests that turners can learn a great deal by copying designs that have worked, eg. Richard Raffan's designs. He made the point that it takes 7 to 15 years to be recognised as a professional !

We have benefited greatly from Vic's visit and all appreciated the diversity of techniques and methods which were so well demonstrated.

In April, Vic will be spending 8 weeks in USA and Canada, both demonstrating and attending various conferences to do with woodturning. This gives a measure of the standing Vic Wood has in the woodturning world.

### SHAVINGS FROM THE COMMITTEE.

### Competitions.

There were several months last year when the number of entries in the beginners category was disappointingly low with less than the required minimum number of entries to constitute a class as required by the current rules. Those who had offered an item were faced with either exclusion from the competition or temporarily moving up to the intermediate category, neither of which was a reasonable reward for making the effort to enter the competition. The committee has now amended the rule, to allow a class to be accepted even if there are only one or two entries, in an attempt to encourage more members to enter in the future, in particular in the beginners.

Our current practice is to accept entries up to 2pm on the Saturday. Many members like to examine the entries and cast their vote in the morning and therefore miss entirely the later entries. For this reason, it has been decided to close entries at 12 midday and the comittee hopes this will improve the voter response.

### Chuck Wagon.

This essential item of our equipment has grown over the years to such an extent that it is now hard to load and tow. As a consequence we have fewer volunteers to help with these tasks. One solution is to divide the load between two trailers. The second trailer should be one which is more stable, easier to load and more flexible in its capacity to take a variety of items. The committee has been looking at several four wheel trailers which could possibly meet our needs. More on this as it develops. Members ideas would be most welcome.

# Relations between The Executive and the General Membership.

Over the years the Association has grown and prospered. During this time those that have been members of the Executive have acquitted themselves honourably and well, in keeping with the high standards of the committee as a whole and the Association. ### **BROOKTON DEMONSTRATIONS.**

Members and Associates visited Brookton on the 21st and 22nd November and were well catered for with demonstrations and a view of various aids to woodturning. Dick Morley who has become our gadget man ably described the various devices presented by some of our more invention minded members. Included in the list were a router crafter, a spirograph, ball cutting machines both vertical and horizontal, a hollow centre attachment for long boring, adjustable hollowing tool from New Zealand, tools for finding centres on pieces of wood, long and heavy shop made scraping tools made from scrap steel, a chain saw mill plus Leadbeater style turning tools complete with measuring guides.

Jim Waters also helped out showing screw and cup chucks, face plates for hot melt glue, sanding table, home made ring gouges and gouges made from automobile push rods. Ron Goodson spoke on finishing methods and ways of improving the appearance of some of the plainer looking timbers. As usual Ron backed up his talk with a variety of articles finished with various mediums including polish, paint and pyrography.

Len Nichols demonstrated turning lidded boxes so grain markings in the box and lid matched up and also various methods of lid decoration. Evergreen Gordon Wilkins turned a hollow form through a small apperture and Gordon Ward turned an extra thin walled bowl. Ralph Smith showed his router attachment and went on to discuss the do's and don't's of designing such an item. Roy Lundy demonstrated Carba-tees new lathe threading attachment which should be on sale early this year.

Sunday saw John Shinnick, now turning on a professional basis, turn a pepper mill and Jim Clark turning needle cases and thimbles. The Association thanks all demonstrators also those who willingly brought along their gadgets for inspection. Keith Stout.

### CHAZUTSU

At the Brookton meeting much interest was shown in Bob Nichols entry which was modelled on the Japanese Chazutsu. The Chazutsu is a traditional tea caddy in common use throughout Japan used for the storage of leaf tea (hacha) as opposed to the powdered tea (matcha) used in the tea ceremony. Simple and practical, the outer lid is used as a measure when adding tea to the teapot. The inspiration came to Bob from his son who lived in Japan for 3 years and who gave Bob a set of dimensions.

### A NATIONAL WOODTURNING COMPETITION/EXHIBITION AND SALE. A project to further the craft of woodturning in Australia. 29TH – 30TH MAY, 1993 AT NUNAWADING ARTS CENTRE, NUNAWADING, VICTORIA.


