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WEEKEND WORKSHOP MEETING COMPETITION RULES. Open.

Classes: Beginner Intermediate

- 2. First prize vouchers for monthly winners to the value of: Beginners \$10 Intermediate \$15 Open \$30
- Competition points awarded each month: З.
 - 2 points for each entry each month all classes
 - 3 points for winning each month all classes
 - 2 points for second each month all classes
 - 1 point for third each month all classes
- Points accumulated in the three classes throughout the year. The highest point score in each class winning a prize in December. 4. 5.
- Any turner, upon gaining 9 competition winning points, immediately ascends into the next category, taking all points gained by the turner. Any turner electing to enter the next category takes all points with them. A turner may not revert to a lower category. 6
- Turners qualifying from competitions prior to 1991. If you have previously won a place in past years competitions in any of the "old" classes, ie: Novice, Open or Advanced, you must now enter into either Intermediate or Open.
- 7, Open Class only entry fee is \$1.00 which goes towards the Annual prize.
- CLASS QUALIFICATION
- Open Class for the turner who feels his work is of sufficiently high standard to compete with peers in open competition. 8.
- Intermediate. For the turner who feels he is not yet competent or ready to enter open competition, but has passed the stage when he 9. can be reasonably considered a beginner.
- Beginner for the beginner turner to compete and compare his work with other new turners, and to have his work appraised by a wide 10 cross section of fellow turners.
- 11. Only one entry per member per month accepted.
- 12. No minimum entries to win a prize in any category, provided votes are received for that category.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

Reading some comments in an English publication recently, about the relative age-groups of people involved in wood-work, made me think about the situation in our own community. My impression is that our membership is becoming younger. And I mean that in two ways.

Firstly, how many times have you heard somebody say, or have you thought without saying, after one of our workshops: "There's always something new happening!" New techniques, new products, new ideas generally, concerning a really ancient craft. And our capacity and eagerness to take up these new ideas and use them is an indicator of our mental youth. Some of our oldest members, in terms of years, are among the keenest to hear about new ideas and to act on them. This must surely suggest that although the years are passing, the fellowship and stimulation of woodturning is making us younger.

But secondly, it seems to me that our membership includes more young people. Somebody with computer skills might one day undertake an analysis of the membership roll to prove me right – or wrong. But in the meantime it would be interesting to hear from people what first attracted them to woodturning. Was it – as in my case – that my father used to turn wood, and I "helped" him to pedal the lathe, or was it seeing somebody produce something useful or beautiful – or both – from a piece of rough wood? Why not write to me, we might produce a new twist to Show and Tell !

EQUIPMENT.

* Before using, read al! instructions and directions etc and understand the operations of the machine or equipment. ELECTRICITY.

LLCOTHON

- Disconnect power before making any adjustments or alterations to equipment.

 - Ensure cords are in good condition, no cuts or cracks.
- * Clear plugs (15 amp if possible).

EXPLANATION OF SATURDAY DEMONSTRATIONS.

- 9-10am Advanced Spindle Turning by Robert Mortimer. A demonstration of professional spindle turning techniques for experienced turners.
- 10.30–10.45 Card Design and Printing by Carl Pearce. A description of the process to be followed in ordering printed cards and stickers.
- 10.45–12.00 **Metal Spinning to Wood by Jim Ward.** This demonstration is an advance on the previous demo of metal spinning in showing its application in blending metal to wood.
- 1.45–3.00 Sandalwood and Goldfields Timbers by lan Kealley. Ian Kealley is the officer in charge of the CALM office in Kalgoorlie and is a world authority on sandalwood. He is an ardent proponent of the use of goldfield's timbers for craft purposes.
- 3.30-4.30 Making Musical Instruments and the Tools Used by Rita Walker. Rita Walker is a professional musical instrument maker who will describe the techniques, wood and tools used in making such instruments as lutes and violins.
- 4.30-5.30 Using the Marrison System by Kingsly Richards. The Marrison System is a ring cutting jig for producing turned vessels with a minimum of waste. Previous demos

have used MDF board, this demo will use normal timber.

NOTES ON SPEAKERS.


Lyn Pearce is the secretary to the Calligrapher's Guild of WA and teaches calligraphy at schools and privately. Her talk will cover the various scripts used in calligraphy and will explain the application of marbling. Marbling is the variegated colour effect on paper.

Jane Bealey is an aromatherapist and reflexologist. Her talk will cover the basics of aromatherapy and reflexology with practical applications. Aromatherapy is the use of naturally occurring oils of plants (essential oils) on the nervous system of the human body. Reflexology is the massage of the reflex centres of the body using the finger tips. The reflex points are energy junctions that relay and reinforce energy along meridian lines of the body, passing energy towards the organs and the nervous system.



NOTES ON DENMARK MEETING 17/18th APRIL.

The Association travelled to Denmark to be hosted by the Denmark Woodturners Club for the April meeting which was jointly organised by both bodies. It was voted a great success by all who attended. Demonstrations continued non-stop throughout the weekend with WAWA and Denmark demonstrators combining to show us some of the finer points of woodturning.

Ken Rex commenced Saturday's show with his router attachment for fluting spindles on the lathe. Graham Rhind of Denmark, also a WAWA member, showed us how to photograph work to the best advantage, backed up by a collection of photographs of his own work. Locals, Les Dean and Andrew Marshall demonstrated microwave drying and reshaping of green turned objects. Unfortunately the turnings were a little too thick and did not respond well to reshaping.

President Jon Croft gave us a lesson on inside out turning and also demonstrated his shop made threading machine, which gave a superior performance to a commercial machine recently seen. Gordon Ward, using quite a degree of care and patience, showed us how to turn a thin stem goblet or flower form, also how to decorate turnings with a power carver. Not wishing to be eclipsed in the decorative stakes, Denmark President, Andrew Marshall demonstrated his technique in turning a mirror frame and decorating it with the aid of a fret saw – a very delicate piece of work. Cabriole legs which are always an attractive feature if used on coffee tables were ably demonstrated by Tom Kettle. Sunday morning, Les Dean and Andrew Marshall again combined to demonstrate turning multiple bowls from one blank with a method I felt was superior to NSW turner/inventor Bruce Leadbeater. Keith Johnson brought along his set of vacuum chuck fittings to show how to produce those delicate bases on bowls then spent some time trying to convince the doubters. The final demonstration was by Denmark top turner Dean Malcolm with his attachments for doing ornamental work on the inside or outside of his turnings.

The weekend then concluded with a Show and Tell session jointly conducted by Dean Malcolm and Alan France, and then the announcement of the competition winners.



- Class 310 Wood Carving Walking Stick must be functional.
- Class 311 Woodturning, Four Lace Bobbins any style.
- Class 312 Woodturning, Table Lamp or Standard Lamp. Clear finish.
- Wood Carving 4 Egg Cups On a Tray, not to Class 313 exceed 180mm in diameter. Finish Optional,
- Wood Carving, figure in the round (animal, bird Class 314 or human) Max dimension 400mm Clear finish.
- Woodturning, any article of wood turning either Class 315 functional or non-functional which may incorporate other materials and techniques as well as wood turning. Finish optional.
