PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

While driving home from the Toodyay weekend, I heard a lady commentator on ABC Radio, who referred to the recent popular concepts of Australia, first as "The Lucky Country" and later as "The Clever Country", both of which concepts have rather gone by the board. No amount of filling, colouring or decorating can, in the end, conceal faulty work.

But "good" doesn't necessarily mean "best". If we didn't win the competition this time, at least we know we did good work, and we can go home and try to do better.



A LAZY SUSAN DEVICE.

Recently I worked out a way to utilise two used ball bearings for a Lazy Susan which proved to work very well indeed. My method.

BASE.

- Mount base piece on a face plate with a screw centre.
 Face the base and turn two recesses one for the ball bearing and the other for the large retaining disc.
- Finish turning the base shape (as far as the face plate will allow) and sand.
- 3. Remove base from the screw centre and hold in a tight jam fit chuck then complete turning of base shape.
- 4. Turn recess for the top ball bearing.
- 5. Cut a hole through to the bottom ball bearing recess about 2mm larger than the bearing internal diameter.


STEM PIECE.

 Turn a spigot the same diameter as the bearing internal diameter and slip a washer up to the stem shoulder. The length of the spigot to equal distance between bearings plus thickness of the washer.

Assemble all parts and fix retaining discs with screws. The retaining discs I fashioned from 3mm aluminium plate, but thinner brass or steel would suffice.

IMPORTANT. The lower bearing should protrude about 1mm from its recess.

The idea worked reasonably well on the first attempt using only one bearing although a little side wobble occurred. This problem was overcome by adding a second bearing to the next project.





CHAIN SAW SAFETY.

Chainsaws improperly used can be lethal weapons. Unfortunately it is all too easy to fall into unsafe habits as familiarity breeds contempt. People who have had no proper training are the most likely to transgress.

Employer Responsibility.

The Department of Occupational Health, Safety and Welfare (DOHSWA) says employees who use chainsaws must receive adequate information, instruction, training, supervision and protective equipment. These are the responsibility of the employer. Employees and self-employed people are to take reasonable care of their own health and safety and that of others nearby.

DOHSWA says chainsaw safety training is the first line of defence against injury. CALM and timber companies do not allow employees to use a chainsaw until they have either an operator's or faller's chainsaw certificate.

In addition to compulsory training for forest operators, certificate courses have lately been presented at various country centres for non-forestry chainsaw users such as farmers and council workers.

Much prominence is given during these courses to the importance of chainsaw sharpness and the correctness of tooth cutting angles. Trainers advise chains be sharpened, if necessary in the field, after every refill with fuel and chain lubricating oil.

The logic of this is that a well-sharpened, well-oiled chain, cuts timber with little exertion by the operator. However, as the teeth become blunter through prolonged cutting, the operator must exert more pressure to maintain cutting rate. Exertion brings fatigue. Fatigue and over-exertion together contribute to mistakes that can involve that most dangerous part of every chain-saw - the upper quadrant of the blade tip.

People who are not familiar with the potentially violent forces unleashed when the upper-quadrant hits an obstruction – it may only be a green twig – soon learn when the chainsaw is flung back towards them in what is commonly known as a kick-back.

Modern chainsaws have inbuilt safety features designed to minimise injury risk from kick-back. Most significant of these are the chain brake and the inertia brake, whose functions are described in chainsaw operator manuals. Yet because kick-back can happen too fast for human reflexes, neither of these can be guaranteed to prevent serious injury.

There is now on the market a chain guard that covers the top edge of the blade and thus even further reduces kickback injury risk. However, the bottom line in chainsaw safety must always be instruction, training and proper machine maintenance.

Suggested Minimum Training.

DOHSWA says minimum training for the novice handyman should be instruction and supervision from somebody – for example a friend – who has received formal training. Together they should go through the manufacturer's manual, following the steps of starting and stopping, using the chain brake, correct safe grips and stances, correct

sharpening, and simple cutting exercises on small, clean pieces of felled timber.

An hour's instruction should be the minimum. The instructor should pay attention to such detail as correct distance between operator and chainsaw, correct positioning of the feet, and correct positioning of the operator's head and body to the left – away from the line of possible kick–back.

Two safe starting techniques are described in most manuals:

- On the ground with the right foot in the trigger guard for cold starts, and
- Trigger guard between the knees with the left arm rigid for warm starts.

These are the only two safe starts recognised by DOHSWA. Drop-starts are considered unsafe work practice.

Safety Equipment.

The following safety equipment is readily available from chainsaw dealers:

- Safety helmets with combination ear muffs and visor.
- Safety trousers or chaps. DOHSWA says safety trousers offer more protection. Chaps, which cover only the front of the leg, can be dragged to one side by the chain.
- Steel cap safety boots.

In addition to using protective clothing, proper chainsaw maintenance is most important – the better the saw is cutting, the safer it is. Field maintenance should include regular topping up with chain oil, cleaning clogged sawdust and debris from chain and guarding, tightening nuts and keeping the chain at correct tautness. And remember that tree felling is much more dangerous than horizontal cutting.
