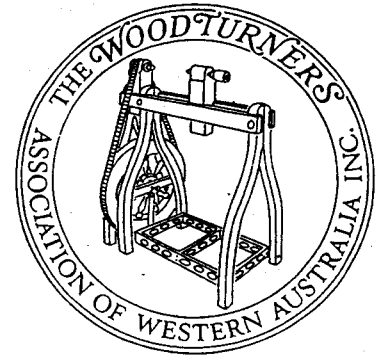

West Australian woodturners have lost one of their best loved and most supportive members. Keith, who was a wood carver before taking up turning, was introduced to turning by his good friend, Ron Goodson.

Keith had been a farmer at Dowerin all his working life but retired to live firstly at Lesmurdie and latterly at Duncraig. In the words of Ron Goodson, Keith had "outstanding hand skills". Like many farmers, he was adept at finding innovative solutions to difficult problems and had no hesitation in sharing his ideas with anyone who wished to learn.

Keith started a woodturning group which operated from his house in Lesmurdie. This eventually became the Midvale Group. Keith was a member of the Kalamunda Arts and Crafts for 15 years (it is 21 years old) and both Keith and Peg are honorary life members of this organisation.

He frequently demonstrated at weekend workshops and his quietly modest manner impressed all those who admired his many skills. He was never dogmatic in his views, but expressed what he had found worked for him.

Those who attended the Swan View meeting in July were pleased to see Peg and Keith there. It was a great shock to us all when he passed away so soon after that weekend.

His friendly manner and his warm attitude to all turners will be sadly missed especially at weekend workshops. I am sure all turners will join in expressing their deepest sympathy to his widow Peg (also a stalwart of the Association) and to his daughter Annette and son Robert. OUR OUT-GOING PRESIDENT'S THOUGHTS.

I heard a radio interview today, during which a spokesman for the wood-chip industry, defending the wood-chip export trade, said that wood-chips were made only from waste - from trees which are of no value as saw-logs. There was obviously no room in his reckoning for any value in burls, branches, crotch-wood - all the parts of a tree which are certainly of value to woodturners, craftspeople, people like the maker of that fabulous cabinet which was on display at the recent woodwork exhibition at Claremont. I suppose he gave even less thought to the effects of wood-chipping on the ecology of the forests.

As it wasn't a talk-back session, I wasn't able to phone and have a say on behalf of woodturners, but it did occur to me that this is the sort of issue which could be argued about by the Australian Woodcraft Federation, of which, as I have mentioned, we are members.

At Moora, in discussion about our projected home, a member suggested that instead of referring to a "Headquarters", we should speak of our need for a "Centre". This seems to be a particularly apt idea, since the essence of turning is the centre. Whether it be a live centre, an adjustable centre - it might even be off-centre at times - as long as it's not a dead centre. Let's aim for it and work for it.

JUST A FEW HELPFUL HINTS.

- ☺ The filtering capabilities of a dust collector bag can be improved by spraying the inside of the bag with nonstick cooking spray. This will stop the finer dust, with no loss of system efficiency. Where possible, have your extractor outside the shed.
- ☺ Chainsaw bar oil is an ideal lubricant for the bearings on your band saw, because the fine sticky non-spreading oil will not throw off as easily as normal motor oil. Keep your bearings clean by washing in diesel.
- ☺ The magnet out of a loud speaker, on the head stock of the lathe, is a good way to store chuck keys and small tools.
- ☺ Green wood can be submerged in a tub of water indefinitely, until you are ready to turn it. This method ensures it wont crack.
- ☺ Keep all steel wool stored safely in a cupboard when you are welding etc. Sparks from welders and grinders can set it on fire. Also, keep it well clear of your cordless drill battery charger.

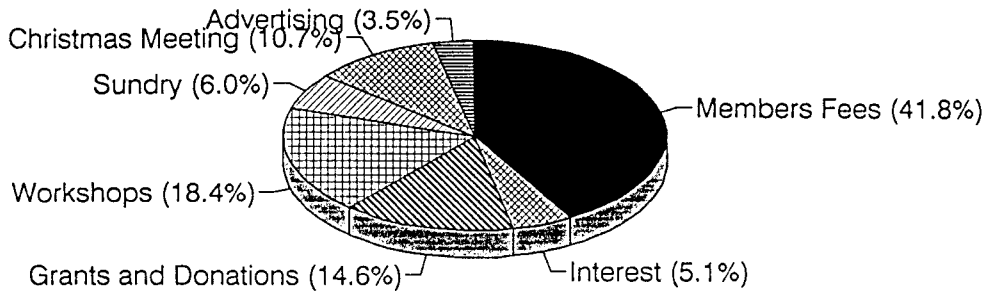

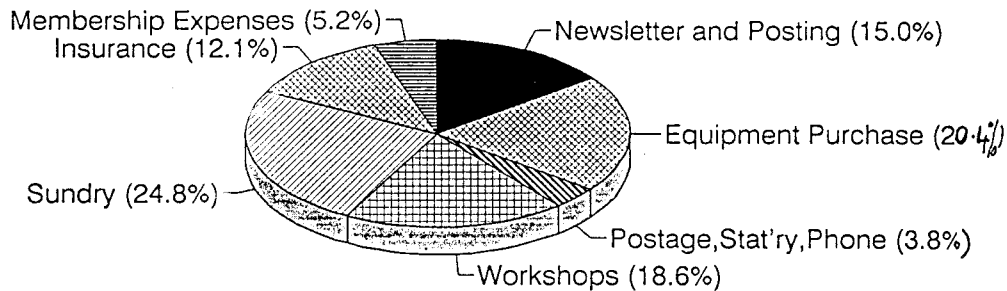
ANNUAL ACCOUNTS.

At the Annual General Meeting, the Treasurer presented the annual accounts for the Association. Rather than present these in full detail, the graphs below give a summary of the main items of income and expenditure for the year.

THE GOLDEN MEAN.

At a number of recent workshops speakers have presented their ideas on design. Opportunity has been given to have articles submitted for critique. Invariably in these discussions, someone talks about proportion and mentions the "Golden Mean".

What is the "Golden Mean". The Golden Mean rectangle was devised by the Ancient Greeks in which the ratio of the short to long sides is 1 : 1.618. If you divide the number 8, or any number above it by the number that immediately precedes it, the value is approximately that of the Golden Mean.

To draw a Golden rectangle, simply multiply the shorter side by 1.618. For example, a rectangle of 60mm on the shorter side, would be 70mm on the long side. A bowl profile developed within this rectangle, should present an acceptable proportion.

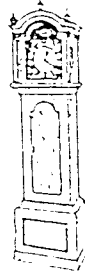

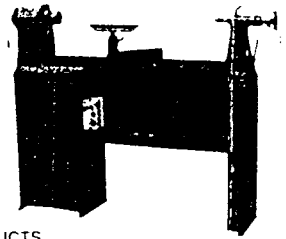
