



WOODEN CANDLE STICKS.

From time to time the legality of wooden candle sticks is discussed. "Everyone" is an authority but "no one" can supply any exact details or regulations concerning the matter. In the Government Gazette on 8th February, 1985 on page 543, the following item appears:

CONSUMER AFFAIRS ACT 1971-1983. ORDER.

I, Norman Richard Fletcher, Commissioner for Consumer Affairs in and for the State of Western Australia being satisfied that a Consumer Affairs Authority, namely the Honourable Sydney Einfeld, then Minister for Consumer Affairs in and for the State of New South Wales, has by notice dated 24th December, 1976 published in the NSW Government Gazette on 24.12.76, prohibited the supply of a class of goods described in the Schedule hereto. Now I, pursuant to the powers vested in me by section 23R (3) of the Consumer Affairs Act 1971–1983 prohibit the supply of goods described in the Schedule. Dated this 31st day of January, 1985. N R FLETCHER. Commissioner for Consumer Affairs.

SCHEDULE.

Candlesticks and other candle holders which will not withstand the application of a candle flame or the heat from a candle without igniting or melting, and articles incorporating such holders.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

I read with interest the letter by Ron Ahrens in the Aug/Sept 95 newsletter and I agree entirely with his comments re the attitude of seasoned members to new members. Coming to a get-to-gether for the first time can be quite daunting and new members need to be made to feel comfortable and at ease or they will not keep returning.

I also agree with the comments of Bob Power regarding the demonstrators, although I sympathise with organisers knowing how hard it is to get new demonstrators. There could be a solution to both of the above problems, and it is to be found on Page 2 of the June issue of the English magazine "Woodturning" No. 33. Maybe we should try this idea, or parts of it:

UNUSUAL EXPERIENCE

A woodturning seminar with a difference was the Otematata experience, a very informal three day event at Otematata in the Waitaki basin, south of Christchurch, New Zealand.

Instead of the usual highly organised programme of formal demonstrations, the philosophy of this event was to keep everything as simple and relaxed as possible. Participants were encouraged to bring their own lathes and tools and all teach each other in small groups, rather than have a few professional experts doing all the demonstrating. People were also encouraged to bring their fishing gear, golf clubs, walking shoes, cameras and barbeques.

RICHARD RAFFAN enjoyed the first event so much, he returned for the second one and took along Vic Wood. Said Richard: "I have been fortunate to be at each of these highly informal gatherings, where there are no gurus or turnery idols set up on pedestals to worship. Consequently there's no stress for those of us who usually feature at these events as paid demonstrators. We are not expected to perform, but if we do, there are not the obligations or expectations to be fulfilled".

VIC WOOD reported he also enjoyed the event. "It was great to be a participant on equal terms with everyone else". This second event had more than double the numbers which attended the first one.

WEEKEND WORKSHOP MEETING COMPETITION RULES.

- 1. There will be three categories of entries in the competition: (a) Beginner. (b) Intermediate. (c) Open. The competition will be conducted in two (2) sections which will
- 2. be run conjunctionally:
 - SECTION A: An annual points accumulation competition to determine the winner of prizes awarded in December of each year.
 - SECTION B: An ongoing and continuous competition to determine members competition entry category as specified in 1 above.

COMPETITION RULES FOR SECTION A:

- The competition will be judged with points awarded as follows: A1
 - Two (2) points awarded for each entry in each category.
 - Three (3) points awarded to each entry judged as the (ii) winning entry in each category.
 - (iii) Two (2) points awarded to each entry judged to win the second place in each category.
 - (iv) One (1) point awarded to each entry judged to win the third place in each category.
- A2 The competition will be conducted monthly from January to November inclusive, in each calendar year.
- A3 Points awarded to members will accumulate progressively during the period of Section A competition.
- A4 Members moving to a higher category, either voluntarily, or by the conditions of Rule B2 of Section B, take all points already awarded in any other class/es with them for the remainder of that competition period.
- A5 The member with the highest points score in each category. upon closure of the competition, will be awarded a prize for that category.
- A6 Upon closure of the competition and determination of each category winner, all points scored by members in respect to Section A of the competition will be cancelled and all members will revert to zero (0) score for the commencement of the subsequent Section A competition.
- A7 Only one (1) competition entry per member, per monthly competition is permitted.
- A8. There shall be no minimum number of entries for each category for the competition provided votes are received for any entries in that category.

COMPETITION RULES FOR SECTION B:

- B1 This section of the competition shall be continuous and ongoing.
- B2 Upon being awarded three (3) first places in either the Beginners or Intermediate categories of the competition that member will automatically move to the next higher category for future competition entries.
- B3 Notwithstanding Rule B2 above, members entering the competition may voluntarily elect to have their entries registered in a category higher than should they accept the conditions of Rule B2 of this section. However members electing to exercise this option cannot revert to the previous category for subsequent competition entries.
- B4 Members who competed in the competition prior to 1st January, 1991, and won points in any of the previous categories, ie: Notice, Open and Advanced, cannot enter in the present Beginners category but must elect to register in either the Intermediate or Open category but are subject to Rule B3 of Section B rules as detailed above.

FINISHING TIPS.

MIROTONE 885 Lacquer as applied using AVERY SOFT ARTISTS BRUSH (or similar, about 1" wide).

- 1. Sand to remove all surface marks to pass inspection.
- 2. Apply sanding sealer Mirotone 840 FS thinned down 60/40 with lacquer thinner 126.
- Lightly sand using 400 paper, remove all irregular marks left by brush, then clean down again using 0000 steel wool.
- 4. Apply 1 coat Mirotone 885 thinned 50/50.
- Repeat step 3 above. Be sure to remove any brush marks – these are clearly highlighted when lightly sanding with 400 paper – clean again using 0000 steel wool.
- 6. Repeat steps 4 and 5.
- If satisfied that you have a good complete coverage, buff until glowing with soft clean cloth – either in the lathe or using wool buff in electric drill.

If not satisfied,

8. Using Repo or similar car polish, apply and buff off, this has never failed to bring up a clear lustre.

It is most important to remove all marks from the start, either in the sanding process or brush marks during steps 3 and 5 as these will be highlighted in the buffing procedure.

Do you still want to use this method?

If you do not have sanding sealer 840 FS, use 885 from the start. This is equally suitable.

If not put off by this lengthy procedure, a further tip

One coat of 885 on top of sanding sealer followed by Canoba Wax Mixture, Bees Wax etc. will give an excellent finish if it is well buffed.

HANDY HINT.

This is a hint I have found useful for pressure spray packs such as Estapol.

After spraying, follow instructions as on the can, then take off spraying nozzle and store in turpentine.

Since doing this, I have been able to use 100% of the contents of the can.

A SUGGESTION FOR DEMONSTRATORS.

It is customary for a demonstrator to bring and show examples of his/her work pieces, tool ideas and so on, which greatly help to explain the item under discussion. These pieces are very often passed around the audience.

I suggest that this should **NOT** be done during the course of the presentation. Why? Immediately items are passed around, the audience degenerates into numerous private and frequently very audible discussion groups. The demonstrator LOSES his/her audience.

This, I believe, is not only unfair to those who want to hear what the demonstrator is saying, free of disturbance, but most of all distracting and grossly discourteous to the demonstrator.

I suggest that whilst we continue to have the benefit of display and discussion items, they should be placed on a separate table AFTER the demonstration has been concluded. There are usually several opportunities to privately ask questions of the demonstrator – during morning/afternoon tea breaks, after lunch, between program segments and so on.

COMPETITIONS.

I would like to express my support for the ideas put forward by Viv Paust in Issue No. 58. Whilst the changes he proposes may be regarded as fairly sweeping, they are all matters which have been discussed at various President's Forums. The use of judges would overcome the "I don't feel competent to vote" comment we often hear. A private critique should encourage competitors without risk of embarrassment.

I was often asked for competitors names by people who were unable to stay for the presentations and wished to ask questions about an entry. The naming of items after judging would alleviate this problem and should encourage exchange of information which is already a strong point of our organisation.

If one judge was supplied by the host group and two drawn from other groups, we could have different judges each month so the position would not become onerous. This would also remove the possibility of competitors becoming familiar with any particular judge's likes and dislikes.

The "Popular Vote" would enable members to pit their skills against the judges, hopefully improve everybody's judging skills. I really cannot see a downside to these ideas of Viv's and give them my full support. Eric WALKER.
