# Weekend Workshops Observations by Peter Pickering Gosnells Weekend Workshop 19 February

Master of ceremonies Peter Povey opened the first workshop of the year and explained the order of the day and available facilities, including Bruce's wood for sale and Rod Cox with turning accessories.

Chris Sioulas took centre stage to demonstrate turning a banana bowl and a three cornered bowl. Chris first passed around several examples of banana bowls explaining the different approaches for natural edge and decorated edge bowls. With the wood held between centers Chris shaped the bottom and formed a spigot giving hints on how to obtain interesting shapes. Placing the spigot in the 4 jaw chuck Chris then hollowed the bowl leaving a small raised centre to support the tailstock. He explained the importance of using the exact centre otherwise the edges of the bowl do not match. Chris is well known for his skills and ingenuity in making his own tools and he did not disappoint his audience as he produced a long handled hollowing tool secured in a a double railed rest fastened to the bed of the lathe. Chris then showed how he needed only one hand to carry out the hollowing operation. After a break for morning tea Chris soon finished the job using bold but accurate cuts that is a trademark of his work as well as providing many practical hints.

Some time to spare and Chris proceeded to make a three corned bowl, stressing that accuracy is required to cut the blank to the exact cube shape. Mounted between centers using diagonal corners Chris rounded the bottom and cut a spigot, which he mounted in a 4 jaw chuck with a live spigot for support. Hollowing out the bowl and leaving the support till last and cutting a lip for a future lid, finish with a bit of power sanding then fit the bowl into a jam chuck to finish the corners, outside and the base to complete the job.

Alan Robert provided President's Forum stressing the need for volunteers for duties that included library, news editor, treasurer, and back up for Alan Williams.

After lunch Norm Graffe spoke of the caring attitude of the Melville Group and asked other Groups to rally to assist worthy causes such as the Carnarvon floods.

Neil Turner was next with a demo titled Something Special and it certainly was just that.

First the 3 cornered bowl that Chris Sioulas had made was passed around showing the wings had been embellished and the impact that had achieved. Neil explained that he is the strongest critic of his own work constantly challenging himself to improve his techniques, try a different way, a different shape or various combinations of embellishment in search of constant improvement. Neil then turned a bowl his way explaining the importance of how the outside shape can provide the visual impact and gave examples of embellishment that made the piece an individual type of artwork. He then hollowed out the bowl and explained how he could use pyrography to subtly follow growth lines. Neil then showed how he holds his work on his knees and cuts various drilled dot patterns. He showed examples of bowls with cut patterns plus pyrography and dot pattern work all blending together to produce his unique style, the work was passed around as well as tools and cutters. Neil stressed the importance of good photography for a turner that wishes to sell his work and showed his album to prove his point, this was also passed around. Neil then explained the 3D effect that can be obtained with flowing lines as obtained in examples of burl turning. Neil then showed examples and photographs of his FIRE series and his SEA series and demonstrated how draws fire flashes and cuts the fire tails, he also showed how he uses different size dots to enhance growth lines. Neil provided a continuous flow

of information during the demonstration as well as showing photographs and examples of his work, you really needed to be there to appreciate the imagination and technical expertise that Neil exhibited to the members fortunate to be present.

Following afternoon tea Bill Wallbank conducted Show and Tell , followed by John Mason's competition results.

Convener John Gardiner closed the very successful workshop thanking all involved particularly Chris and Neil for inspiring demonstrations delivered under extremely humid conditions

## Gosnells Gossip

The Gosnells Group commenced the New Year with the news that we will be required to vacate the Amaroo Village owned Gosnells Family Hospital, as Communicare Inc have won a Commonwealth Government tender to convert the hospital so as to provide suitable accommodation for asylum seeking illegal immigrants. As a consequence our group is urgently seeking alternative accommodation.

5 Jan John Gardener demonstrated how to make a Childs Chair. John stated that the sample chair he had made was an example only and that specifications must be strictly adhered to for a competition piece. As John had not glued his chair he was able to disassemble it to show the stages of manufacture. John explained that the majority of work was mainly spindle turning and he presented ideas for copy turning the parts. John said that he considered the drilling of the seat, back and stretchers was most critical as the holes needed to be on different angles so as to achieve the circular shape. He then showed how to drill these holes using either the lathe or drill press. John's demo provided ideas for members to make their competition item.

12 Jan Group project to make 5 identical bangles.

19 Jan George Kieliger demonstrated how to make Bookends. George explained that there are many ways to turn bookends and he was to demonstrate two ways that work for him, one faceplate and one spindle. George emphasized that these were examples only and intended to stimulate the creativity of his audience. He then laid out 15 sealed and numbered plastic bags. Bags 1 to 10 held the Faceplate project which resulted in 4 turned quadrants which can be mixed and matched to obtain 6 variations of bookends.

Bags 11 to 15 contained the spindle turning project. which resulted in 4 variations Cone, Bullet, Snowman or a traditional spindle turning. George had put in considerable work preparing for this demo and kept the members keenly anticipating what the next bag would reveal, his aim to show methods that work for him and to get his audience thinking was certainly achieved.

26 Jan Visit from Alan Roberts and Sheila Carlile who shared with the Group their concerns that our accommodation was to vacated and occupied by asylum seekers. The members appreciated them making a special effort to visit us on Australia Day.

2 & 9 Feb Group project 3 boxes to specifications

16 Feb Group project rolling pin.

23 Feb Chris Smith demonstrated Hollow Forms, first he displayed 10 different hollow forms in a variety of sizes and shapes and explained that the most important aspect of the forms is that there must be no straight lines. Before you start have a plan either a drawing or in your head Chris then drew several examples using a circle, a 6 or a 9 which can be used as a base. You can use standard tools or make your own or a combination of both. Chris mounted a pre prepared blank on the lathe and proceeded to shape the outside. The blank had been drilled and Chris then proceeded to hollow using a variety of hollowing tools, some for the deep hollowing and some

for undercutting the lip as he worked Chris described the advantages and disadvantages of each, after parting off Chris wrapped the work in glad wrap explaining that as the wood was wet the wrap would keep the moisture inside and minimize the chance of distortion.

2 Mar A power outage upset the order of the day but when it was restored the group continued making salt and pepper shakers.

## Wandi Waffles

#### At his convoluted best!

This years opening demonstration night, viewed by several members, was aptly christened with great aplomb by our amiable buddy Gordon Ward who kindly displayed, with a little assistance from Kelvin, how to create a convoluted edge. The air was peppered with the aroma of camphor laurel, as the final shavings were removed from the neck and lip of the vase; a hole was then bored and indexing about centre height permitted accurate markings to be created allowing a general outline to be drawn. Using a 'Dremel', the petal-like shape evolved beautifully before us. Many thanks for a wonderful introduction to 2011.

#### Masterful Deep Hollowing

John Scarfe, fortified with numerous beautifully shaped vases and an abundance of deep hollowing tools, masterly informed and revealed how to utilize each tool. From the Jim Clerk hollowing tool to the 'ultimate' Vermec – equipped with a foam rubber gripped handle; a side handle – which can be adjusted to indicate the angle of the cutting head being used; a tool support which fits in the normal tool post position; and cutting heads, for both roughing out and shear scraping. The key to any deep hollowing is to design the external shape first, and then drill a hole down the centre of the vessel to the desired depth, the Vermec tool can cut to a depth of 350mm. Hollowing when using this device should be from the neck of the vessel working gradually to the depth of the drilled hole . It seemed effortless and easy to maneuver.

Tim also revealed another fine tool, bought from America, with a lovely orange handle; he uses it to create his wonderful coffee mug holders.

#### Embellisher's Best

Applause reverberated around the room following the masterful demonstration of embellishing performed by none other than Jack de Vos. Predominantly applying the 'Dremel', he reminded the audience to 'think outside the box' when creating and embellishing pieces. He also imparted these pearls of wisdom; perhaps experiment on scrap pieces of wood, sit in a comfortable position, allow for ease of pivotal movement, do the edges first, use flowing lines – these he later accentuated with a pyography machine; use varying sized and contrasting shaped burrs, and change the angles of any dimpling; gently taping the Dremel pieces into the wood can also create magnificent patterns. Highlighting areas with a daub of paint may also accentuate the pattern. Jacks art is often finished off with a spray of lacquer. Thank you for an enormously absorbing night.


## The Technical Desk

#### Joseph P Hegney What is WD-40



## The Technical Desk

#### When You Go

I've now been contacted on three occasions by wives of woodworkers who've had their partners pass away and leave a shed full of tools.

In one instance there were no family members close by to help out and in another, no one in the family had a passion for tools. Typically there is no history of the items such as date of purchase, purchase price and amount of usage(seldom-regularly-heavily used).

One lady showed me an extensive collection of tools

including a good quality lathe. Later she phoned to say that she had been offered a few hundred dollars for the lot when the lathe alone was worth more than that.

Fortunately with the help two fellow club members, I was able to catalogue and price items as best we could and took the items to the Club for sale to members.

One lady had an extremely old lathe that we were unable to sell so in the end we arranged for it to be given to a group in the area teaching woodwork classes. She was very pleased that it went to a good home.

At times we hear stories of items being discarded at the local tip because they were deemed to be too old to be of use to anyone, when in fact they were collectibles much prized by the previous owner. Timber, hoarded and seasoned for decades, is often off-loaded as firewood.

#### Taking Action

If you take action now, you can make things much easier when you go. Disposing of your tools and timber will not be as stressful for your partner or family and they will be in a better position to receive some financial benefit from your long-term investment.

Take the time to catalogue those tools of some value, including purchase date and price if known. At least endeavour to give an estimate of their worth.

Itemise those tools that are to be given to family or friends (or in the event that they are to be given first option to purchase them).

Consider donating some items to a Club to which you belong.

Where possible, label your stored timbers. You may not be around to identify them when they are being disposed of.

Make your family aware of where you keep the receipts, catalogues and manuals associated with your purchase as these can be an excellent aid to identification and pricing.

The above documentation is not only handy when you go. It's also invaluable if you have to make an insurance claim for fire or theft. However it's important to keep it in a safe place. You done want it lost with your tools and you don't want to give a burglar a handy shopping list.

#### Do it now

So do your family a favour and take the time to make a list, to make things easier when the time comes.

As one woodworker was heard to say to his friends, 'After I die I hope my wife sells the tools based on what they are actually worth, not on what I told her I paid for them'.
