12-13th March

Members look forward to the Manjimup weekend in anticipation of a well organized function combined with good old fashioned country hospitality and their expectations were fulfilled. Master of Ceremonies Graham Quaife welcomed everyone to the workshop and explained the order of the weekend including the dinner planned for Saturday evening and the informal activities at the clubhouse on Sunday. Graham thanked all their sponsors including W.A Plantation Resources, Woodgate Wines, Mitre 10 Manjimup and Bridgetown plus Manjimup Monograms.

Dennis Kestel was the first to demonstrate how to use multi-centered turning to make a pen set holder for a desk. Dennis had pre-prepared the oval shaped blank with four 30mm holes drilled by a forstner bit, then using the chuck in expansion mode in the drilled holes and using them in rotation he shaped the oval, Dennis then drilled a 3mm hole through the end ovals and used this to provide the centre for two turned decorative grooves. He then showed a finished stand with the pens held in trumpets which was passed around. The demonstration showed not only a way to make a desk stand but provided ideas that could be applied to other oval objects.

Graham then introduced Manjimup councillor Sam Karamfiles who extended a warm welcome to the members and friends visiting Manjimup, and told how the Manjimup Group was held in high esteem because of their involvement in town activities.

The first prize in the raffle was then drawn and this continued after each demonstration.

After morning tea Norm Gratte demonstrated the Escoulen Ball and Socket Chuck with indexed pivoting insert. Norm showed some items he had made including a golf club, an egg in a cup and an egg cup with a duck in it. He made a spigot exactly 40mm which he mounted in the chuck and set the offset, Norm then turned a duck, the special chisels he used were passed around. Norm then demonstrated how to make a turned box with lid ,the lid to have an offset knob. Norm explained that he just started to use the chuck and looked forward to determining the full potential that it is capable off, Norm and the chuck would be available at the shed Sunday morning.

Alan Roberts conducted President's Forum emphasizing the need for volunteers to fill the vacant positions.

After lunch Graham Lewis demonstrated how to make a lidded box in the shape of the Seattle Tower inspired by the Space Needle in Seattle and described in "Turned Boxes" by Chris Scott.Graham passed around several examples he had made and then demonstrated the turning procedure. As there are 4 component parts in the tower Graham explained the importance of working methodically and accurately to ensure a perfect fit at assembly stage. As space in this report is limited I would suggest that you read the book for a detailed description.

Chris Smith came next to demonstrate the turning of the Space Needle spire in Queen Ebony Chris explained that as with any finial you start at the thin end and work towards the thick end, applying the finish as you go from point to tear drop and then cove. Chris then demonstrated how to turn pewter using a tungsten carbide bit and polishing with brasso, explaining that you can sometimes get pewter mugs in op shops and melt them down.

Chris and Graham combining for a very informative demonstration.

Following afternoon tea Rob Jones came on next to demonstrate making a Pot-pourri bowl using a Stephen Hughes designed insert. Rob explained that he was following on from his Collie demonstration of decorating a wide edged bowl with domed cutters used in a Dremel. He then passed around a bowl with a centre insert and samples of lazer cut inserts in plywood using a fish theme. Rob said that the plywood insert required sanding and staining, he then passed around several samples. Rob then turned a bowl cutting a shoulder in the recess to fit the insert , this must be a perfect fit. He then decorated the rim using a cup burr in a dremel. The rim can then be painted with your choice of colour and the pot pourri bowl finished to your taste. As usual with Rob's demonstrations the audience is inspired to try his ideas.

Competition results were next with John Mason stating that he was very pleased with the Manjimup Groups organization.

The day was concluded with an invitation to attend the Clubrooms in Timber Park Sunday morning.

The Sunday session could be described as an organized but informal gathering of skillful turners keen to share their knowledge and to learn from each other. There was so much going on that I can only report on what I saw.

Melville

April 16th

Brian Fowlie welcomed the members to the workshop and explained the order of procedure and the location of facilities, John Imrie would have wood for sale during lunch and the trade supplier was P-Square Agencies. Tools belonging to the late Ron Goodson are also on sale.

Roy Lundy was introduced as the first demonstrator, Roy explained that the Melville Group make at least 90 lolly bowls each year to be donated to the Silver Chain Association for filling with lolly's to be distributed to the elderly at Christmas, for some it may be the only present the receive. The bowl is to be of a simple shape which Roy proceeded to make, After sanding the bowl was finished with Shellac. Roy gave detailed explanation as he worked which was beneficial to all watching and an inspiring idea of a worthwhile charitable idea that other Groups may take up for Christmas. Roy then said that he would make a mortar and pestle, he explained that he would make the pestle first as the mortar is tailor made the fit the individual pestle. The pestle is basically a plain bowl of substantial construction and thickness and it did not take Roy long to produce it. The Mortar is made with sandsoap stone glued to the end and shaped to fit the bottom of the pestle. Roy passed around samples of the stone and the finished work.

After morning tea Laurie Green took the stage to demonstrate profile turning with the aid of a laser. Brian Fowlie told of Laurie's interesting life before woodturning telling that he was a metal machinist by trade which was evident as his demo proceeded. Laurie passed around samples of hollow turning which he had made with a laser to assist him in using a hollowing tool through incredibly small neck openings of his hollow forms. Laurie showed how he mounted the laser



and demonstrated hollowing and decorating hollow forms. He explained the problem of lighting through small openings and the flexible light he uses. Laurie talked about the different types of wood he uses , their moving characteristics and the drying method s he uses. A very lively question and answer session took place on lasers ,hollow form techniques, tools and methods but it was the use of lasers that dominated the discussion with many present planning to use them in the near future.

John Gardener conducted President's Forum with topics which included

- •Relocation of the Gosnells Group from Amaroo Hospital to the Southern River College.

Len Nichols was next with a history of the Melville Group, he commenced with the formation of WAWA at Eneabba in 1985 highlighting the foresight of those involved and the effort in forming a constitution with members spread over considerable distances and no access to modern communication such as the internet that we enjoy today. April saw the first Melville meeting with 30 attending, followed by the start of the Shopping Centre Group at the Melville Plaza. Len spoke of the activities that the Melville Group engage in which have included fire relief fund raising, and other charitable activities. He spoke of workshops past and showed examples of work to illustrate his memories.

After lunch Norm Graffe demonstrated the making of boxes with embellished lids, and passed around several examples with designs inspired by starfish and tree nuts. The lid is made in two parts the base which fits the bottom of the box and a domed top into which the embellishment pattern is carved giving a hollow effect of the lid. As the lid is the showpiece the bottom is turned last so that a perfect fit is achieved. Trust Norm to come up with something different every time he demonstrates.

Joe Hegney was next with a tribute to Ron Goodson an association which began in 1958. Joe commenced by welcoming and introducing Ron's daughter Janet to the members. After talking about Ron Joe stated that the best way he could honor his friend was to demonstrate the making of a Jacobean and a Barley twist done Ron's way. Using Camphor Laurel Ron's favorite wood he first made a Barley twist explaining the technique as he proceeded. Next was the Jacobean twist employing the hand tools and rasps that Ron had used. Several examples of Ron's work were passed around for member to admire. Joe completed the tribute with a reading of "The Craftsman".

After Show and Tell John Mason gave out the competition results.

Brian Fowlie closed the day with a special thank you to the demonstrators.

Competition items 2011

May 28th, Mandurah Platter with Inlay. Usual feature of platters " at least 75% of the inner base must be flat". Size unlimited.

June 18th, Joondalup/Wanneroo Sugar Bowl and Spoon, Bowl to have a lid and the spoon to be all wood or have a wooden handle, Size functional.

A real classic ! The bowl made of wood as is the lid. Either the bowl or lid will have provision for the spoon (as in a slot or groove) so it (the spoon) will sit neatly in the bowl whilst the lid is on.

The spoon may be made entirely from wood if you have the skills to do it, otherwise a metal spoon with a mandatory wooden handle will suffice.

July No Workshop

August CoM Single Tier Cake Stand

Single tier cake stand usually has a central spindle and a flat platform on top to hold the cake. The "platform" can have a beaded rim or not, it should be flat right across, edge to edge and of a size to hold a nice cake. The spindle should not be too high and the base should be wide enough for stability

August Master Class with Dean Malcolm all day

September 17th, Wandi (AGM) Inside-Out turned Christmas Decorations. A set of four and must be displayed on a stand. Segmenting is optional.

Once again this quite popular item but this time, a little harder, in that these need to be hollowed out or turned inside out. It is a set of four and they must be displayed on a stand or "tree", or they will not be accepted.

October 15th, Swan Natural Edged Bowl. Size and design is unlimited.

With this item being unlimited in design, size and style you can really let yourself go. Think of a natural edge with a bark inclusion as in a tree branch or a natural edge as on a piece of Burl. It is your choice.

November 19th, Bunbury Any Item made from a single piece of timber. 75mm x 75mm x 200mm.

This was a WAWA comp item many years ago, thought worthy of doing it again. You may turn it into whatever you desire but you are permitted ONE cut of the piece in any direction. One cut only or there will be heaps of pens, spindles, bobbins etc etc. Use your imagination ! This could be interesting !

20 April As above

27 April Demonstration by Chris Sioulas on the making of a sugar bowl and spoon to the specifications of the Joondalup / Wanneroo workshop. Chris had prepared a olive blank with spigots on both ends. He first parted off the top then shaped the bowl, after hollowing Chris used a flat bar tool rest he had made so as the minimize vibration of the scraper on the bottom of the bowl. After sanding and finishing Chris reversed the bowl into a jam chuck to finish the bottom.Chris then made the top so as to achieve a perfect fit to the bottom. He then passed around his work including a wooden spoon that he had made earlier.

4 May The pepper grinder production continued with Ian Eagles applying the finish at home, then John Gardener using pyrography to burn the Southern River College name on the items. Other members continued on various projects including rolling pins also for the College.

20 April -Another guest demonstrator, Milton Rundle, gave an address & demonstration his NUMEROUS methods of chucking timber for work undertaken & covered a range from the early days of WAWA to date. This highlighted the progress achieved over the years to enable turners simplify approaches to their various projects.

27 April - Brian Fowlie demonstrated his approaches/methods to fruit turning including a simple holding device utilizing left over spigots from screw cup chuck when finishing items. A very good tabling of Show & Tell items including a lot of our Xmas Bowls project.

Swan Snippits

March 8: We were treated to an informative and entertaining evening by Ian Moss who handed around hollow formed vases he had made mainly from jacaranda, some lightly engraved. Ian showed diverse hollowing out tools, ranging from expensive and efficient to cheap and effective. Members produced some outstanding work in the competition for a matching pair of bud vases with inserts making voting difficult. There were five open entries and one each in intermediate and novice. Results: Open: 1st: Brian Kirkby, 2nd a tie between Bob Napthine and Joe Clark. Intermediate: Mike Howard, Novice Bud Cooke.

March 15: Malcolm Munro made bangles by segmented various types of wood, with

enhancements. He cut a circle marked out in segments then enhanced the bangles with glitter cotton thread and fine copper wire, producing gifts to delight any young girl.

March 22: Not even the smallest piece of wood needs to be wasted according to Bob Nicholls. A sugar gum tree which was hollow in the middle was used to produce some useful little pots and holders, with the damage becoming attractive features. These were made particularly striking by polishing the outside and painting the interior mat black.

April 5: Jim Clarke gave an example of precession turning by making a mushroom out of olive wood. The top was detachable from the hollow stem - an interesting classy demonstration of turning which appeared deceptively simple.

April 12 Six members of the Toodyay woodturners attended this evening, assuring us they really enjoyed the bigger gathering and planning to return. Bob Nicholls demonstrated a platter with a cypress pine inlay. Competition winners for a hollow form vase were: Open: 1st Bob Napthine, 2nd Bruce Shephard, 3rd Ian Moss. Intermediate: 1st Mike Howard. 2nd Tom Wainwright, Novice: 1st Alan Murton, 2nd Bud Cooke.

April 19: Brian Kirby showed home-made tools and their uses. These included an off-centre chuck made from a pattern on the Internet out of aluminium with a steel weight showing how it can assist in making multiple small dishes (up to six) from one piece of pine – ideal for parties. Brian also demonstrated a bowl chuck made out of plywood for use on a lathe with an outboard facility.

April 26: This was hands-on day with all lathes whirring to begin churning out Christmas toys. These included locomotives, a babies rattle, wheels for various toys and Owen McGrath's famous mice.

May 3: Bob Napthine demonstrated a jarrah stand and surround in the shape of a new moon to hold a hydrometer, which was then set into a type of bookend. It looked impressive, being more so as Bob is our sight-impaired member.

Knot Sleepless in Seattle!!

An absorbing night was had by those who attended Graham Lewis's revelation on the creation of a 'Seattle Tower box', which upon completion has a couple of separate storage containers together with an exquisite finial. His attention to detail, the meticulous manner in which he creates his pieces, and the keenness he exudes when 'teaching' was very evident. Unfortunately time eluded us before the finial was commenced – perhaps one of those vacant spots later on in the year! I'm sure we shall see some of these projects adorning our show and tell displays very soon.

Here's the scoop!!

Dan Killgallon, on very short notice kindly divulged the art of off-centre turning which can be utilized for many purposes; many of his items were on display, including an idiosyncratic goblet and a rather cutesy looking duckling. With a healthy commentary, his completed item for the night was an attractive functional scoop.

Rawhide scraps

Tim masterfully demonstrated the art of creating a leather pen, espousing the use of second hand materials such as scraps of leather from items such as belts and handbags, or sourcing materials from auto trimmers and furniture makers (often given away); even the beveled punch used to create the multiple discs was 'home made' from scrap metal tubing. Utilizing scraps again to create a sacrificial square block, holes can be drilled allowing numerous halves to be completed in one go. Once bored, randomly compact the punched out pieces of leather into the now PVA filled holes, clamp it and allow it to set (perhaps overnight), carefully drill the holes down the centre and insert the roughened and glued brass tubing. Cautiously use the band saw to remove most of the excess wood, place the piece on the mandrel and complete the pen as normal.

These included axles, wheels, bearings for steadies, rubber chocks for bowl jaws, small mandrils etc. Bob B demonstrated a circle cutter jig he has made for his bandsaw.

There was considerable comment on the 100mm opening spec for the hollow form comp. Trevor C took the beginners prize with a jacaranda turning. Tony C won the experienced division with a pink coloured jarrah piece. Members commented on the finish Tony used, which was a liquid polishing solution from Rustins followed by Shellowax. Mike P took 2nd place with his camphor laurel piece while Viv's entry featuring pyrography embellishment took third.

Platters, Bowls etc should have a maximum diameter of 350mm's.

ITEMS OUTSIDE OF THE MAXIMUM SIZE WILL BE DISQUALIFIED.

6.The piece will be judged on: Design, Turning, Originality, Joints (if any) Degree of Difficulty, Finish And Selection of Timber

7.All items MUST have a minimum of 80% turned. 20% maybe embellished

JUDGING and ENTRY DETAILS

1. Competition Coordinator John Mason will appoint a panel of Judges known only to him

2.Judging will take place the morning of September 9th at the Woodshow and winning entries will be identified on completion of judging. Prizes and Certificates will be presented at the AGM 3.The Judges decision will be final and no discussion will be entered into.

4.Entries should be handed in to the Entry Receiving Officer Alan Roberts NO LATER than the August Week End Workshop, but maybe handed in earlier by arrangement. LATE ENTRIES WILLNOT BE ACCEPTED. 5.Packaging should be clearly labeled with: NAME, MEMBERSHIP NUMBER, GROUP, SECTION ENTERED, TYPE OF WOOD and BRIEF DESCRIPTION of ENTRY (Vase, bowl,etc)

6. It is the responsibility of entrants or groups to hand in and pick up entries.

7. Entries will be available for pickup at the AGM




Something to think about!
