### Woodturning Courses



I am pleased to report that the WAWA SPONSORED TURNING COURSES have, with the exception of one all run so far and have been extremely well received by those who participated. Some of whom have already signed up to attend

further courses.

I have made one very interesting (but troubling) observation regarding the courses at this point in time, only four members of our association have so far attended, all of whom have been ladies!!! I wonder why?

A short time ago it was mentioned to me that some of our own ex WAWA management committee members have been voicing their concern over the insurance cover on these courses. It should be mentioned that these comments were not through the proper channels unfortunately but have been heard back through the gossip channel and we all know how the story changes as it is passed around. Is that why some members may not be attending?

I think it important therefore that the misinformation being circulated be corrected.

All of the tutors carry their own CURRENT insurance with QBE Insurance. To quote some of the policy "those who teach their craft to groups of ten or less" and also "those who demonstrate their craft or exhibit to the general public". These policies are available for viewing by all course attendees. Additionally, the management committee has been assured by the representative of our own insurance company that our own policy covers WAWA members attending or working for the courses.

I hope that this information allays the fears that some of our members may have.

Finally, on behalf of the management committee could I ask that the originators of this gossip please in future express their concerns in the proper manner, a procedure that they in the past have been most insistent on.

## News from the Groups

### Bunbury Bulletin



Our first March meeting opened with a somewhat less than successful demonstration of fancarving by the writer. Fan-carving has nothing to do with wood turning so my modest reputation as a turner is intact. It is my reputation as a demonstrator that is in

tatters.

The evening was saved, however, by Wally MacDougall showing us a bagpipe chanter which he had made and giving us an interesting talk on

bagpipes, an ancient instrument found in many parts of the world.

The meeting on the 15th heard the news that our demonstration at Dardenup Heritage Park netted \$200 in sales and perhaps the fewer pieces of work offered may have had a bearing on the somewhat disappointing result.

We took pleasure in welcoming Peter Cotter into our membership.

Our meeting of April the 5th was excellent, commencing with Tom Brixey giving a talk on finishing, which,



typically, was well prepared and well delivered. Then Mick Johnson gave a talk on spray-guns, their use, type and preparation of sprays with the warning never to use a spray-gun without wearing a proper mask. Stan Zieba showed us undercoating with shellac prior to applying a burnished wax finish.

The meeting drew to a reluctant close with Jim Cunniffe giving a friendly warning about the application of finishes with properly folded rubbers which had no tails or loose ends to wrap around the article in the lathe and, perchance, to trap fingers with, at least, painful results. He also gave a recipe for a low-cost but effective wood finish. For the benefit of those who, like myself, are unaware of this recipe, here it is 1 ½ measures of pure linseed; 1 measure of gum turps; 2 measures of petroleum jelly.

I was unable to attend our last April meeting but my network of informers, cleverly disguised as Doug Chamberlain, faithfully relayed the events of the evening, which, it seemed, was quite a lively one, starting with the Show & Tell, conducted by Mick Johnson. Three Lazy-susannes were offered, one by Mick which was passed round to see whether the members could detect a none too obvious fault. Only the eagle eye of Jim Bennett saw that the holes carrying the screws of the ballrace mounting had been bored right through the plate. "Not so." was Mick's rueful admission. He had actually bored four blind holes for the screws in the face of the plate instead of the back! That he had skilfully remedied the error was obvious but the fact that a master like Mick can make that sort of a blunder greatly encouraged an old fumblefinger, like myself and the next time I do something similar, I can say, "It's not just me, it happens to the best of us."

Two other items in the Show &Tell were a laminated biscuit barrel in huon pine and jarrah by Malcom Targett and a spherical lidded bowl in jacaranda, about 9 ins. in circumference finished with a contrasting Sheoak knob by Doug Chambelain. The second part of the evening was given over to a demonstration by Jim Cunniffe wherein he mounted a cube of wood in a prepared chuck; then cut a 20mm hole in the presented face precisely 6mm deep; he then inserted a purposemade right-angled cutter and cut away inside the cube and parallel to the presented face. He repeated the operation on all six sides of the cube and lo! there was another free-moving cube inside the original one. Do you follow me? Well I am assured that that is what happened. Jim said he got the idea from a 15th Century German book describing an ancient Chinese technique. Such unusual demonstrations by Jim are always well received and much appreciated.

### A Letter From Busselton



The new program format introduced by the Group Committee at the beginning of the year is starting to bear fruit. A 'Workshop Program' is placed on the Notice Board in Studio 8 of the Old Courthouse Complex, the current program is for the period to the end of July. This program firstly follows

the items scheduled for the WAWA Competition, features a demonstration of the following month's item and then a full day workshop is conducted for those who want additional help in completing the piece. The second meeting of the month is a handson session turning a specific item.

A general meeting of members held in February 2006 agreed unanimously to formally advise the Shire of Busselton that the Group would extend our tenancy for a further twelve months in accordance with the lease agreement. It further resolved that the Group negotiates with the ArtGeo Committee of Management for additional space, as the hands-on sessions have become too crowded which could cause safety problems.

We welcome Bill Hallyburton to our Group. Bill recently relocated to Busselton and has made himself known at one of our meetings and is fitting in very well.

#### **WORKSHOP ACTIVITIES**

- The first meeting for the month of March involved the turning of Musical Instruments for the April Competition. George Herring spoke about the types of Woodwind Instruments that can be produced on a lathe, these ranged from a 'fife' to 'horns'. A number of handouts from the book 'The Amateur Wind Instrument Maker' by Trevor Robinson explained in detail how these can be made. Charlie Broadbent showed how he produced a 'Chanter' used to learn playing Bagpipes. Finally Cliff Hart brought along his 'Chanter' and excited everyone with his six note rendition of an unknown tune.
- The meeting held on 22 March was another hands-on session involving several teams turning a Needle Case. Our erstwhile program organiser was taking a sabbatical but has assured me that he left clear and concise instructions together with a professionally drawn plan of a Needle Case and suitable timber in the hands of Dennis Haddon. The people

taking part in this session included some very good turners but the results that were produce were 'surprising' given this talent.
