# Recipe #1

Perry (468) Your prayers are answered, thanks to John Mercer (550) who is also an old bloke but didn't lose the recipe!!! I have included the recipe for everyone rather than just send it to Perry who might lose it again (Ed....no offence intended)

# Recipe for Finishing Wax Pol ish INGREDIENTS

Flakes of Carnauba.... (Carbatec or Timbecon)
Block of Beeswax.... (Fremantle Markets)
Bottle of <u>Vegetable</u> Turpentine .... (Bunnings)
Place equal quantities of Flakes and Beeswax in a

Place equal quantities of Flakes and Beeswax in a container, stand container in a pan of water and heat water on stove until waxes are liquid.

## DO NOT ALLOW TO BOIL

When waxes are liquid add turpentine to make one of the following consistencies.

PASTEWAX: 2 turps to 1 wax

Allow mixture to cool in old baking tray or tin

When the paste mixture is cool pour into a can or small jar.

**HARD BLOCK**: 1 turps to one wax

Allow mixture to cool in old baking tray or tin

When the block mix hardens break it up into useable pieces.

# Finishing Wax Recipe #2

We also have the following Recipe from Jim Waters (446) of a completely different version of a finishing wax so everyone gets a double bonus!!!

# Recipe for wax polish as requested in last newsletter.

50 gm Carnauba wax flakes,

100ml.gum turpentine,

6 teaspoons strong shellac,

3 teaspoons talcum powder.

Melt the wax in a pan of water, add strong shellac, stir in slowly.

Stir in gum turpentine, then stir in talcum powder. Allow to cool.

# UWA Friends of the Grounds

I am contacting you in the hope that some of your members, who are obviously interested in woodwork, might find the following proposal interesting. The UWA Friends of the Grounds formed several years now to try to encourage interest in and enjoyment by the wider community in their magnificent asset - the garden and grounds of the UWA campus.

Recently we decided to undertake a program of gradually restoring the

hundred or so teak Memorial park benches which are placed around the grounds. Most of these benches have been donated in memory of past graduates or faculty members. Some of these traditional benches are in need of repair and most need on-going annual oiling. From time to time new benches will be needed. We intend to contract out most of this work and are setting aside funds for this purpose.

Currently we are cataloguing and photographing all the benches. This will entail assessing their condition and establishing a program for maintenance. This is where I thought some of your retired members may be interested in assisting our group. It could also be that some of your members might be able to assist by submitting a price to repair or supply benches. We are interested in involving people in enjoying the University grounds.

Enclosed are copies of our membership brochure which features one of our benches on the cover. The UWA Friends of the Grounds meet three or four times each year. We coordinate campus walking tours, visit the University's galleries and collections, attend lectures on related subjects, and hold an annual picnic supper followed by a film at the Somerville Auditorium. # Competition I tems for 2007

\*\*\*\* Please note, this is an interim list subject to change of item and/or venue. \*\*\*\*

17th Feb. . Gosnells Group at Wandi. Natural edged Bowl... Must have continuous natural edge on the rim or edge of the bowl. Size unlimited

24-25 Mar Manjimup Group Cake Tray... Single tier on elevated base. Minimum height 100mm, maximum height 150mm

21 Apr... Melville Group at Wandi Sugar Bowl... For Novice bowl with lid and spoon. Intermediate and Advanced, bowl (with a lid) featuring a flange on the bowl to accommodate six spoons. (Spoons do not need to be included) 19 May . . . Mandurah Group

Vase... Open type rose vase. Not a bud vase. The top will be open and wider than the base. A flare or roll at the top is permissible Minimum height is 150mm

16 June . . Wanneroo Group Platter... A platter is a flat plate with the edge height not exceeding 1/10th of the total internal diameter. The internal base will be flat for at least 2/3rds of the diameter. The minimum overall diameter will be 260mm

21 July... S w a n a t K a l a m u n d a Candlestick... To feature Inside-out Turning. Minimum height of 150mm and maximum of 300mm.

August . . . None.

15-16 Sept W a n d i G r o u p Lidded Bowl or Container... Must feature at least three different timbers in the lid by laminate or insert. Size unlimited

20-21 Oct . A v o n G r o u p a t T o o d y a y Clock... Mechanism and hands or an insert clock. Mounted in wood and in turn supported by wires, cords, fine chains or similar in a supporting frame. Size unlimited.

17-18 Nov. B u n b u r y G r o u p Hollow turned item.... The requirements here are that the opening in the top shall be smaller than the internal diameter and the height be greater that the width. Size unlimited. Hollowing through the top will be the only accepted method.

8 Dec . . . . WAWA Committee at Kalamunda Best item turned in 2007 that has not been previously judged at an Association workshop

# Competition Rules - Continued

I have taken up the position of Competition Coordinator for the Association (WAWA) Workshops for 2007.

There has been a lot of discussion and I have received considerable assistance, suggestions and advice from many members for which I am very grateful. Thank you.

The main changes are listed here.

### Points Allocation

Entering an Item 2 points (unchanged)
First place 5 points, Certificate and cash
Second place 3 points and Certificate
Third place 2 points and Certificate
Fourth place 1 point as an encouragement
No Certificate.

# Open Competition

(Novice, Intermediate and Advanced combined)

This Competition will be given more status as it is a very important part of the year's activity.

Accumulated points in this culminate with the Keith Stout Memorial Trophy at the year's end.

Points and certificates will be awarded the same as above with the exclusion of entering points.

### **Promotions**

This is one of the most misunderstood and contentious issues, but in my opinion, one of the most important as it rewards the promoted member without impacting on others in the higher grade.

From this year, a member will be promoted as soon as he/she achieves 3 grade wins within a three year time frame. When promoted, the member will be able to take points won into the next grade up to the number that places the promoted member 2 points behind the person currently in third place in the next grade.

In July, the member is given the option of accepting

the promotion immediately or deferring it to the following year as he would have little chance of a podium position with only a few workshops yet to come.

The advantages of this method is that the member promoted is faced with new challenges in woodturning which entails additional skills, the whole purpose of the competitions! It also has the benefit of not being detrimental to the members who have achieved the top positions in the next grade.

It could be quite a disappointment to be holding first place then suddenly be overtaken by a newly promoted member!

Any member may, at any time, promote him/herself to another level but is then unable to go back to the original level.

The popular vote will continue as before, unchanged.

It is hoped that these newly defined guidelines will encourage more members to enter the Association workshops competitions as this is the best way to improve your skills.

# Gone Cruising

Travelling Australia, particularly the Outback with our Landcruiser and tent is a passion of ours. Last year Ursula and I had the good fortune to be able to go on a four-month trip to the Eastern States. This time we went to see places we always wanted to visit but somehow never did. The trip took us via the Nullarbor to Broken Hill, Cameron Corner, Gulgong, Tenterfield, Proserpine and the Tablelands and from Birdsville via Simpson Desert to Ayers Rock, Warburton and Kalgoorlie back to Perth.

Apart from many beautiful towns with historic

buildings we saw magnificent scenery, such as the Carnarvon George National Park in Queensland, the 1100 sand dunes of the Simpson Desert in South Australia, the Olgas in the Northern Territory and much more. We came across magnificent and rare trees such as the Desert Oak (Allocasuarina decaisneana) in the Red Centre, the Waddi Tree (Acacia peuce) near Birdsville, the Beefwood Tree (Grevillea striata) in the Mutawintji (Mootwingi) N.P. and giant Red Gum (E. camaldulensis) near Mt. Isa with a circumference of 10.89 metres which was more than 500 years



old.

There are many galleries and museums all over Australia, some of them good, some of them not so good. Anyway on our travels we visited lots and lots of them including State Art Galleries and Private Galleries exhibiting Paintings, Pottery, Glass, Furniture and Woodturnings.

In one of the craft galleries in the Rocks Area in Sydney I had an interesting experience. After having a good look around all the pottery, jewellery, textile art and wood turnings we talked to the lady who minded the shop for the cooperative of makers. The first thing she said to me was: are you a wood turner? When I said: yes, why, she said: I can always tell. Of course I had steered straight towards the wood turnings and this was a dead give away. She

asked me would I be interested in joining the cooperative as they had lost a turner and had difficulties to find a replacement. To date I am still not sure what to make of this. Are there really not enough good turners in NSW? I declined of course. It would be too difficult to mind the shop once a week.

In another gallery I had the opportunity to see, handle and closely inspect turnings by some of the well known turners of the Eastern States including Richard Raffan: very interesting indeed.

One of he highlights of our trip (in a woodturning sense) was our visit to the Museum in Proserpine in Queensland and what followed on from it. I really think it is one of the finest country museums in Australia. It is in a purpose built building on Highway No. 1 and has an excellent display of Australiana. The most surprising thing however was that in there we found the 3.5 m turned wooden pen which I had seen in the magazine Woodturner as well as the 2.6 m diameter bowl turned from laminated Mackay Cedar; both made by the Proserpine Woodturners Group.

I had read the article by George Hatfield about the Proserpine Turnout in Woodturning No. 161 with the photos of the pen as well as of two visiting Japanese woodturners and their intriguing lathes and tool rests. I had studied those photos with the magnifying lens for a long time trying to figure out how they work and it was my plan to learn more about it one day. - My turn had come now!

In the foyer of the museum was a display with items for sale, the pens with the phone number and the name of the maker: Con Jensen. So I rang him and he invited me to come and visit next morning. As it turned out he is the driving force of the Proserpine Woodturners Group, a group of I think eight members. Con told me to drive up to his shed

and meet him there. What a shed! A sugar cane farm shed about twice the size of my whole house. It contains a woodturning room with more than half a dozen lathes, a collection of motorcycle paraphernalia from a "previous life", a collection of artefacts from all over the world and a stack of timber for turning and I mean a STACK and there is still room for the cars of the family.

The Proserpine Woodturners Group put on their annual Turnout with attendees from all over Australia. During my visit I learned that to qualify for attendance you have to bring your own lathe and turn. It is not a spectator event but a very much "be in it and turn yourself affair". Even the celebrity turners who are invited don't demonstrate formally. This promotes a lot of interaction with looking over each others shoulders and discussions.

Con and I talked all morning about turning, about the local timbers such as Mackay Cedar, Black Bean. Concker Berry and more; most of them unknown to me. He showed me the lathes the group made for the Japanese turners already half dismantled, ready for a new project and he told me the story of how he found the two turners, how he organised their travel, interpreter etc. Con doesn't know the word impossible.

Further north in the Atherton Table lands we found another woodturner's delight. It is a beautiful new Gallery in the tiny place of Tolga. We were already halfway through the town when it caught Ursula's eye and I slammed on the brakes when I saw the new timber building. It houses a coffee shop and a great display of furniture, paintings woodturnings and pottery. A door connects it to the large workshop. Luck would have it that the owner had to mind the shop that morning. When I spotted the corner where he had lots of bowl blanks for sale the conversation started to revolve around the local

rainforest timbers such as Black Bean, Red Lancewood, Northern Sassafras, Bloodwood etc. Of course and despite the fact that the Landcruiser was already packed to the top I could not stop myself from buying a fairly large quantity of blanks. When the owner saw my enthusiasm he went and got a piece of the hard to get Crows Apple (Owenia venosa) to give me as a farewell present. To top it all he gave me his card with his name on: Trevor Allwood.

As I write this we already have booked a flight to Switzerland to help celebrate my mother's 88th birthday in February. But there is also a well known woodturner in Lucerne, Sigi Angerer, whom I plan to visit. More about this another time.

Well, the day arrived for Haydn's unlikely bit and the result under his hands is, to say the least, dramatic.

. After our refreshment break where our new treasurer, Dave Roberts, in the tradition set by Stan Zeiba, provided a plate of fruit-cake, we had two demos going on: one by Toni Wilson showing the use and application of aluminium discs which, when glued to the base of the article to be turned, avoid the trouble of cutting spigots or recesses and have considerable advantages over both these methods. The other was a long-hole boring demo,

given by Mick Johnson. That it was not wholly successful under even his skilled hands gave heart to those of us who have seen the drill emerge, unbidden, through the side of the piece.

The meeting on the 15th was our last meeting for this year, made necessary by the closing of the college, wherein we hold our meetings, for the end of year holidays. A fairly social night with plates of goodies in abundance which members and their wives had brought along plus a gastronomic wonder of soup, freshly made from asparagus which only hours before had been contentedly growing in George and Lorraine Parke's veggie garden.

The Show & Tell was of mainly unturned items, the eception being three perfectly turned goblets which our guest, Joe Hegney, presented. Among ther other items was a delicate pencil drawing by Toni of her grandson. showed his oval frame-cutting jig, a ball-cutting jig with a special mount for the chisel, the cutting tools and jig for grooves in spheres and several other items. Joe Clark's items included a jig for holding an aluminium disc, a gauge for measuring the diameter of a screw chuck, and a hand-made, large compass. Bob Nichol's ideas included a box of jigs made from wood off-cuts, his gauge for measuring wall-thickness of a bowl or hollow form and a number 2 Morse taper jig threaded at the work-surface end to take a scroll chuck. This allows the item being turned to be held in the tailstock, brought up to a wooden face plate, fixed to this with hot melt glue and the bottom then to be cleaned up. Jim Hanney had another jig to clean up the bottom of a bowl made from MDF, 4 pieces of pine and using hot melt glue. He also showed a all cutting jig made from a hole saw, a wooden tool rest post with a metal insert to rest the tool against and a sanding disc, velcro-backed, made from a truck tyre valve. John Attwater had a jig to hold a ball to be cut into a puzzle and some home made Tunbridge ware. Richard Barkman showed his depth-adjusting jig for tools to be ground using the Tru-Grind system. These different jigs and so on clearly show the ingenuity of the members. 1 and 1/2 hours simply flew by!

This was followed on 12 December by a presentation of different methods of tool sharpening, the most impressive (and expensive) being the Tormek system, showed by Don Clarke. This included their new gauge for quickly setting the tool projection and angle to achieve the same bevel time and again. Noel Moyes, our convenor, demonstrated a simple desk clock on the evening of 12 December. He showed a clever use of the base of the clock as the jam chuck for cleaning up the end of the clock's body and the method of drilling the hole centrally and at centre height to fit the body to the base.

Our final Tuesday afternoon of the year was by Jim Hanney who demonstrated some "wearable" wood items (cf Terry Martin in Australian Wood Review #22). The items included chatter work, in-lays and turning off-centre designs in the surface of a broach or pendant. All in all we have had a most successful year and look forward to much more to come in 2007.
