Competition Guidelines For Jhe Working With Wood Show, August 2007.

The competition item is a Wine Bottle and Ice Bucket. These items can be of any size but obviously, must be in proportion. This is to be a "standard" Association competition, the exception is that it will be held at The Wood Show instead of a group workshop. Members and the public will be voting on this as well as appointed Judges.

However, there are some necessary guidelines for our members to follow. They are:

- 1.. Entries must be received by 10.30 am on the Friday of the Show. Remember Late entries will not be accepted !!
- 2.. I (John Mason) will be in attendance at opening time. (Hopefully!)
- 3.. Members may obtain an entry number (as per our workshops) from me by phone or e-mail. Stick this number on your item. This will work as long as I have knowledge of the item. They must still have it at the Show on time.
- 4.. The judges selected must be at the Show at the same time. These will be selected at our July workshop. I will supply the judging forms to them at that time.
- 5.. Members will be responsible for the collection of their entries after the show unless alternative methods are used.
- 6.. Suggest some groups allocate a central receiving depot and possibly an agent to collect the items.

A fetter From Busselton



WORKSHOP ACTIVITY - Our first meeting for the month of Maywasasaw 'Big Beautiful Bruce' McCormick (since promoted from 'Big Bad') show how to turn a Platter. Bruce gives a flawless exhibition and subsequent events showed

that all those present absorbed what he demonstrated. This was

Competition night and the eight entries of a Rose Vase were of a high standard. The placegetters were Tom Mazey in first place with Ray Batt and George Herring equal second. A pleasing result is that every entrant earned points, and a number of these went on to compete at Mandurah's Weekend Workshop at Wandi with Vince Triglia gaining first place in the Novice Category.

On 23 May the 'hands-On' theme was 'Put a handle on it' with Tom Mazey leading with a spinning top handle, Ray Batt with a new style Bread Knife handle courtesy of Peninsular Woodturners Guild, and Dennis Haddon doing one for an Awl.

The idea was for each group to move from lathe to lathe every 20 minutes or so to ensure everyone got a chance to turn each of the three handles. 'Skew' Haddon almost convinced everyone that his item was the only one that could be turned with his favourite tool. This was a fun night with some very interesting articles produced.

The second Wednesday of June saw Vince Triglia demonstrate how to conquer inside-outside turning. Someone unkindly said Vince was 'handicapped'; firstly someone inadvertently took home all of the spur drives and secondly the Program Coordinator, in his wisdom, arranged for Charlie Broadbent to provide a commentary while Vince did the turning. This was definitely a case of Ying and Yang at work. Vince and Charlie gave a first class presentation. This was also the June Competition night for the Platter and there were nine entries with a further five on the Show and Tell table. The results saw Vince Triglia first followed by Ray Batt and George Herring filling the minor

places. Once again every entry received votes. Seven of our members entered the Competition at the Associations' Weekend Workshop at Wandi with a great deal of success. The Show and Tell table had some interesting submissions and a lively discussion took place as to what is the definition of a 'Platter'. The second meeting for the month was hands-on with the theme 'Put a finish on it'. Members were asked to bring a number of pieces to final sanding stage. Ray Batt featured Mirrotone and EEE Wax while Tom Mazey showed how he uses Penetrol to great effect.

On 23 June we conducted one of our bi-monthly one-day workshops. There were 9 participants including Ray Batt and Chas Broadbent, Dennis Haddon and Tom Mazey acting as 'mentors'. The project was a table-lamp to a specific drawing so that everyone worked to the same end result. We borrowed four lathes from members because we just don't have enough of our own to conduct this part of our activities.

Other Activities...Saturday 9 June was our annual wood gathering activities and we had a terrific turn out for both days. As usual there were some momentous and hilarious incidents. To avoid embarrassment we won't mention a breakdown in the convoy arrangements, suffice to say that a Compass, or even a GPS, would not have helped. Their respective wives were delighted to see them home early.

We have now got a good supply of timber for sale at the Group's headquarters at the rear of the Old Agricultural Building on the corner of Queen Street and Marine Terrace, Busselton. Visitors can contact Convenor Tom Mazey on 9754 1818 to purchase some of this. We will be taking some to the November Weekend Workshop in Bunbury on 17 and 18 November.

Future Activities - The next one-day workshop is scheduled for 25 August 2007 which will feature one of the Busselton Show Categories. Full details are on the Notice Board so our members are asked to express their intention to participate as soon as possible so that we can ensure we have sufficient lathes.

The Group has revamped the alternate Wednesday evening sessions led by Tom Mazey but now including other experienced turners so as to give Tom some support. These are not going to be structured sessions but conducted to enable everyone to get some help to improve their individual skills. The times are 7.00 pm to 9.00 pm. This newsletter is being prepared in some haste as I only returned from a short holiday in Scotland on Tuesday evening and it's a bit like making bricks with straw.

My sources for the program for June have I think memories like mine but we have I think cobbled something together which will give some idea of our activities for May and June.

May 9th –Alan France demonstrated how to make a very nice fluted candlestick, this was a typical Alan France demo – he showed how he made jigs to hold the router to do the fluting (all in wood of course) and the turning was all too easy. Thanks to Maxine for bringing Alan along to the meeting.

May 16th – This was a hands on morning and we were all given the opportunity to practice our skill with the skew chisel in making a stool leg as shown by Joe Hegney. It was a good morning although some members preferred the spindle gouge to the skew we all learned something.

May 23rd - A meeting day followed by Bill Power showing what was possible with our recording equipment. Bill's demo emphasized the need for more of us to become familiar with this gear in the event of he and his small band of helpers being unavailable at the same time.

May 30th – Laurie Green brought along a wide selection of the tools he uses for deep hollowing he then showed how the various tools were used and no doubt helped those members who were contemplating going into deep hollowing (no pun intended) in deciding what tool to buy.

June 6th – Ron Goodson demonstrated how to make a very attractive segmented platter with scalloped edge. He explained how he cut and glued the segments stressing the importance of cutting same angle on each segment. It was as usual a very interesting and professional demo from a master turner.

June 13th – Ken Brown a member new to demonstrating showed how to turn a pen. I am told that he got a lot of prior private tuition from Ken Rex nevertheless he made the effort and I am sure that he and all the members benefited from the his demo.

June 20th – Hands on day and more coaching from Joe Hegney and others in the use of the skew chisel and spindle gouge. I understand that all members found the morning helpful.

June 27th – Monthly meeting day which was followed by a guest speaker Elmer Ellison from Abrasive Industrial Distributors of 28 McCoy Street Myaree. I am told that Elmer's talk was well received and he said that he would be pleased to attend to the needs of any turners in regard to abrasives.

Swan Snippets

Swan continues to have a big turn out at its evening and afternoon meetings. The evening meetings

involve onstrations,

com petitions, show and tell, and a raffle. The afternoon meetings are quite informal (and more fun), with a demonstration or hands-on activity, followed by much discussion and advice from the members.

The demonstration at the May evening meeting was presented by a guest woodturner, Robert Jones.

He discussed how he turns platters while the timber is green, then leaving them to dry before finishing. He demonstrated turning a half-finished platter using scraper and bowl gouge, getting a high quality finish before sanding ready for embellishment. This he did with an assortment of acrylic paints. His demonstration was very entertaining and inspiring, judging by the competition in June. This produced some beautiful platters, especially in the Novice section. Unfortunately, some did not fit the criteria (as per guidelines) as they did not have flat bases. We hope that Robert will return at a later date. The evening raffle was won by Eric Walker – At Last!

Don Clarke returned from holidays in England in time to demonstrate at the June evening meeting,

In spite of little time to prepare, his inside-outside

candlestick demonstratio n was of his usual high standard. Don turned the inside first, then reversed the pieces in the jig to do the outside. Holding the four pieces in the jig enables him to reverse them when needed. He



numbers each piece to keep track of them. Again, a quality presentation of a difficult procedure. We expect some great entries in our next competition. The raffle was won by Eric Walker – Again. We will all have a better chance next month when Eric is away.

The first afternoon demonstration was by Jim Hanney. He showed how he produced the lattice work on a mounted clock which he had entered in a competition earlier this year. He started making the back of the lattice work, centred on a faceplate board, screwed and hot glued to hold in place. The work is reversed and offset to the left or right, creating the lattice effect. Jim's turning was all achieved with a thin parting tool (home made of course, from an old pair of scissors). Looks complicated, but quite easy according to members who had a go.

The following week's demonstrator was Graham Bell. He started his pen in the usual way, but his finish was very unusual. He uses a mixture of thin machine oil and superglue, working it into the wood with a 240 sandpaper, creating a slurry to fill gaps and cracks. Of course, rubber gloves are essential for this procedure. Graham then gave the pen a finishing coat of Shellawax. This was not the first time Graham demonstrated this technique. It was used to finish a burl fob watch which he demonstrated last year.

At the first June afternoon meeting we were treated to a faultless demonstration by Bob Naphtine.

Bob is vision impaired and was working in unfamiliar surroundings and with a lathe he had never used before. We were amazed how he guided the tool with his fingers so close to the sharp end as he demonstrated making a paper towel holder. Bob measures with home made devices he is familiar with. Well done, Bob, you did not have one dig in!

Eric Walker demonstrated at the next afternoon meeting. He started off with a jarrah blank burl on the lathe, and proceeded to turn a platter with a bowl gouge and scraper. (unusual for Eric to use a scraper). The finished platter was sealed with lacquer. Eric then used pliers to nip small pieces off the edge, then touched it up with ebonizing liquid, creating a natural effect. A great demonstration.

Eric would have finished his platter off at home by spraying with lacquer.

Our final June afternoon meeting had Bob Nichols repeating his demonstration of the pull-up toothpick holder, which featured at the last Wandi workshop. This time he drilled a perfect $1 \frac{1}{2}$ " hole in no time at all. Even the chatter tool worked well and gave a good "scream". His demo created a lot of interest, and the plans will be in the drawing file soon, courtesy of our resident draftsman, Richard Barkman.

Demonstrations are made much easier since we have the use of our new tool trolley. This was made by Joe Clark and Jim Hanney and is a great asset. Thanks, Joe and Jim for your time and skill.



As a starting point, to get the feel & procedure of 'spoon making', suggest you start with a piece of material 30 mm square by 120 mm long.

Mark the centres on each end, place on the lathe , between centres and turn down to a cylinder, say 28 mm dia.



Mark the width of the 'bowl', same as the diameter, and turns as shown in the diagram. The next stage is to turn the sphere to form the 'bowl', take care to form a fair sphere, otherwise when it is hollowed out an ellipse will result.

The handle can now be formed as required, various decoration/ design may be turned.

The next stage is to hollow out the 'bowl'. Have seen various methods of holding the piece, in order to turn out the hollow – the following is fairly simple to 'in shop build'.

In this instance the jaws were made from material 30 x 20 50 mm long.

Having mastered the procedure for spoon making, the next thing would be to experiment with different sizes !!
