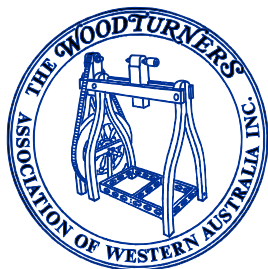

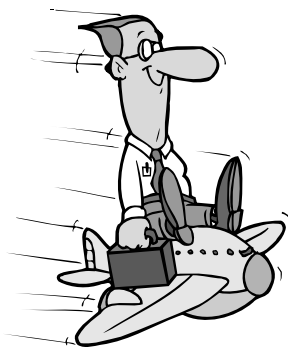

2008 Perth Royal Show Creative Crafts Exhibits

There has been a decline in the number of exhibits of wood craft over the past few years. Exhibits at the 2007 Perth Royal Show totalled 10 compared to 107 at the 2003 Show!

A number of reasons for the decline have been suggested, in particular there has been a distinct lack of promotional material made readily available to wood turners and other past exhibitors. The organisers thought that all crafts persons would be scanning the internet searching for the information, enabling saving a few dollars in printing costs. It is also suggested that there is a conflict of timing of shows, with many of our members preferring the Wood Show competition.

Why not recycle the exhibits to both shows?

I have made arrangements for copies of the schedules of exhibit classes to be mailed direct from the Perth Royal Show to each of WAWA's groups as soon as they are available. They can be presented at the regular group meetings. I will let the groups know when they are published.

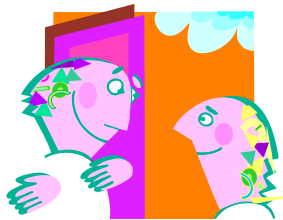

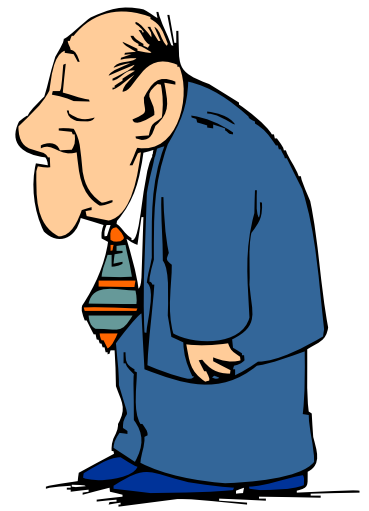
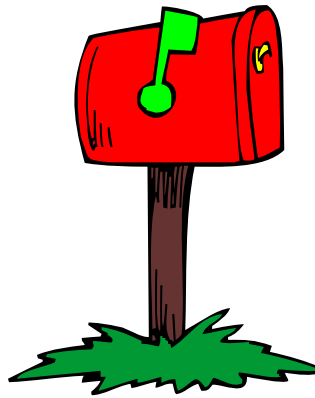

2007 is over and done with and we are now into a new year of competitions.

In retrospect, 2007 was a very good year for the competitions but my feeling is that it could have supported many more turners. The Association has about 600 members and yet there were only about 60 regular entrants in the whole of the year! Admittedly, there is the more senior section who have

done it all before and there are our country cousins who cannot attend due to the distances involved. But this still leaves a lot of members who turn at home and at their groups, many of whom who have no desire to enter the competitions for one reason or another or enter only when the comp item is suitable for them.

It is this latter group who enter once or twice a year that should be looked at in regard to their category placings. At this point it should be noted that no individual is being targeted! Comments from our members would be most welcome on the subject that members who have been in the Association for over a year (or two) should have gained enough skills to have them automatically promoted from Novice to Intermediate and possibly Advanced based on their acquired turning ability.

All members have the option of self advancement. But very few do this, so it is felt that some of these members should be promoted regardless, especially from Novice so as to give the newer members, the real novices, a fair go.

With the start of a new year competition on the horizon, now is the time to set some guidelines for the future.

Competition Items

Competition Items for 2008

- February . Desk Set - comprising of a Base with a turned Pen and two matching removable bowls (for paper clips etc) A pen trumpet is acceptable. it is also acceptable to add extra items if desired. (eg, clock, calculator) but the minimum requirement must be maintained!
- March . . . Nut Cracking Bowl - featuring an anvil in the centre of the bowl and a matching mallet. Size unlimited.
- April. . . . Salt and Pepper Mills - Novice, Pepper mill only. Matching Pair for Intermediate and Advanced. All (including Novice) to be exactly 200mm high excluding the mechanism knobs
- May Money Box - unlimited design and size. Must have feature to remove the money. (and to put the money IN).
- June. . . . Chisel Handles - A matching set of three handles on a presentation rack.

They will be 200mm, 250mm, 300mm long and match in timber, shape and design

- July Bowl...with a wide rim featuring Embellishment. Carving is excluded. Maximum dia 300mm Overall maximum height 80mm
- August . . . At the Working with Wood Show. Clock - Free standing mantle model with insert clock or mechanism.
- September Cup and Saucer - Life size
- October . . To hold Pot Pourri. Free standing or hanging. The lid (if used) will be a wooden one of your own design. Purchased lids are not acceptable. Size unlimited.
- November . Bud vase - Matched pair. To have an exact height of 180mm.
- December . Best Item turned in 2007 that has not been previously judged at an Association Workshop.
- February . Square Edged Bowl. All four sides to be a perfect square. Minimum 120mm Maximum 180mm measured from the flat edges, not corner to corner.

A Letter From Busselton

The October, November and December period was very exciting for our Group and amongst the highlights were:

BUSSELTON AGRICULTURAL SHOW

There is a Competition/Exhibition in Woodwork associated with this venture and is our major woodturning promotion activity in this Region. In the Competition itself Ray Batt, Tom Mazey and Charles Broadbent each had notable successes. The promotion consisted of two days turning demonstrations and at the same time appraising the public of the activities of WAWA and our Group in particular. We have already had two visitors to our Workshop activity following the Show and we hope they eventually join us.

PROMOTIONS IN OUR WORKSHOP

About thirty members of the Murdoch Probus Club visited our Workshop in early November and saw Charles Broadbent demonstrate turning small

objects together with Tom Mazey promoting the activities of WAWA. Charles turned a small Goblet, which the Probus Club will raffle amongst its members to raise funds for their own activities. Their visit was featured in the Busselton Times and we have sent our Newsletter editor a copy of the feature for this publication. Added to this was a presentation given to children from the Capel Primary School...nearly thirty young children their teachers and some parents were in awe of the Charlie Broadbent turning Christmas trees, small Goblets and spinning tops. Charlie was ably assisted by Tom Mazey promoting the activities of WAWA and the Busselton Group in particular'

WORKSHOP ACTIVITY

Our most recent hands-on project has been a little different. The project item was a 'Tumble Down Doll'. This is a small doll approximately 130 mm tall and 75 mm wide at the widest point, when completed the doll is pushed over and it then immediately rights itself. The October session was for each team to turn as many of the dolls as possible while in November the weight was added which would enable the doll to stand up again. At the latter session Jane Armstrong, a folk artist and Michael Whitehead's sister, showed us how to paint them. On Thursday 29 November the dolls were presented to the Shire President, Wes Hartley in his capacity as a Pastor of the Uniting Church. Wes will make arrangements for the dolls to be given to underprivileged children in the Busselton Region.



DEMONSTRATIONS

We now have a 'Chaplain' who, during various our activities, encourages all those present to remain directly in line with the lathe spindle at all times. This just goes to reinforce the wisdom of accepting Gerry's offer in offering his services to intercede on our behalf to a higher authority whenever the occasion arises.

The November demonstration night saw three relatively new demonstrators conduct concurrent

demonstrations. Owen Isbell turned a small box; Michael Whitehead did a small undercut bowl and Ken Littlefair a lace bobbin and a duck call. Each demonstration was well received and we appreciate the thought each of them put into their respective project. Ken's duck call was a classic and should be among the 100-woodturning items that every Woodturner should see before they die.

On 12 December, we again tried something new. Graham Lewis an emerging demonstrator on Weekend Workshop circuit and featured in two DVD's from the Association visited us to present how he turns a

All members are categorised into Advanced, Intermediate and Beginners, depending upon their perceived level of skill. The Beginners Category is restricted to people who have been a member of WAWA for three years or less. At the end of the year awards are given in these various categories. Winners for 2007 were Popular Vote, Tom Mazey, Advanced also Tom Mazey, Intermediate, Michael Whitehead and Beginners, Barbara Jennings. Also we congratulate Dennis Haddon and Michael Whitehead who gained prizes at the Annual Awards on 8 December. Like the Association competition, our Group just can't seem to get enough support for the Competition notwithstanding that those who do make an effort are rewarded for their efforts.

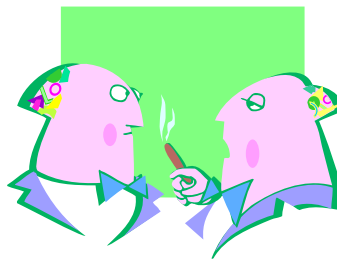

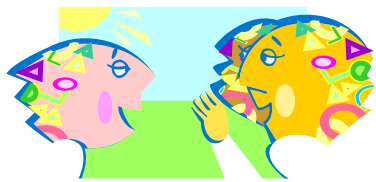

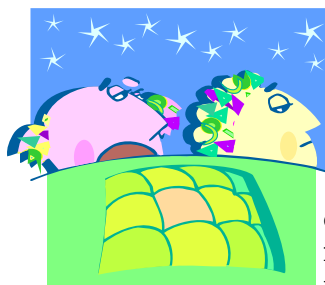

Melville Mutterings

It looks as if our search for a new home is finally bearing fruit! Melville City Council have sent us lease documents for a possible tenancy at the former Melville Primary School and subject to our proposal for the use we shall make of the premises being accepted we could be in occupation sometime in the new year.

Our November/December program was as follows:-

7th Nov – Norm Gratte showed us how he turns a bowl with the inside hollowing turned with an offset of 10mm. He mounted a blank with a flat planed face on a screw chuck and turned the outside shape completely to a very high standard. Norm then proposed to mount the bowl in a fairly large cage with one side flat to receive the base of the bowl and the other with a hole large enough to enable him to hollow out the bowl when it was set in the offset position. Norm assured us that the bowl could be held securely in the cage by means of the four long bolts which clamped the bowl in the cage which was attached to the lathe by means of a chuck centred on the flat end

of the cage.

Unfortunately Norm was unable to finish his demo as the cage proved to be too large in diameter for the lathe he was using and in trying to force it onto the thread of the headstock he stripped the thread of the wooden chuck he was using however he explained the process and we all got the idea.

14th Nov- Alan Smith gave a most interesting talk on iron and the various types of steel and how you should deal with them and in particular how to sharpen high speed steel tools. We all learned a lot and most importantly Alan said that if we were sharpening our chisels properly we should not quench them as it could make the steel brittle.

21st Nov – This was hands on day and Joe Hegney started it off by showing how you should make the item of the day- a bud vase as per a plan. Wooden blanks were provided by Norm Gratte and Ron Oliver and the members of the group did the rest. This format is both popular and useful in particular to new members.

28th Nov – We had a visit from Suzanne representing the RAC who gave an excellent presentation on the road rules and got us all to show our ignorance of them. She also gave useful advice for those of us coming up to the road test age of 85 on the test and what it was designed to do.

5th Dec – Roger Metherell gave us a very timely demo on how to make Xmas trees, snowmen and snowwomen. Roger's snowmen were complete even to hat and balloon on a stick.

12th Dec – Ron Oliver demonstrated how to turn a very elegant oval shaped table lamp by using a wedged shaped split turning. Ron's very full explanation of this technique was most informative.

to enjoy the exercise. Good results were achieved with 3 goblets completed (but not to specifications). The fourth ended up a miniature. David Devereux even used what was left of the timber to almost finish a lidded box. It was great to have Gavin Wenham from Sydney visit again. All in all it was a very good night to finish the year.



AFTERNOON MEETINGS:

6th November: Eric Walker gave us a double barrelled demonstration – a whistle attached to a rattle. He worked on the rattle first, cutting off the blank that he had shaped earlier with a spigot to hold it into the chuck to make the bottom. He then reversed the blank that was left and used the spindle gouge method to hollow out the rest of the rattle, making sure that the pieces fitted well. Eric took one he had already glued with popcorn in to give the rattle, then fitted that rattle back into the chuck to make the whistle on the handle end. He bored a 10mm hole then roughed it down to mouth size, cutting a "v" shape in the whistle end and parted off. He made a fipple out of a spare piece of timber, cutting it at a slight angle to give it the whistle sound. It worked! It always does with Eric's demos. (Very hard to explain though.)

The 20th November meeting was a "hands on", the first we had for the whole year. I was late arriving,

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but Eric Walker and Jim Clarke got the members organized and we had a good meeting - A session like this reminds us how tools should be used properly. The next Tuesday afternoon it was my turn to face the crowd.

I demonstrated a darning mushroom (a useless article in the 21st century, but people still want to buy them). I had timed the demonstration to one hour but went on for 1 ½ hours. I can't help it if I'm talk too much, but I have broad shoulders and can take the abuse and they can wait for their tea and biscuits.

The final meeting of the year was a success, thanks again to Eric Walker, who filled in for a late cancellation. I rang him to ask him to bring some tools for a last minute hands on, but he came up with a "What am I Doing Wrong?" demonstration. This developed into the great debate about the Skew versus the Spindle Gouge, easily filling the hour. Eric is one of those people who can be counted on and always comes up with something informative and useful. Thankyou Eric.

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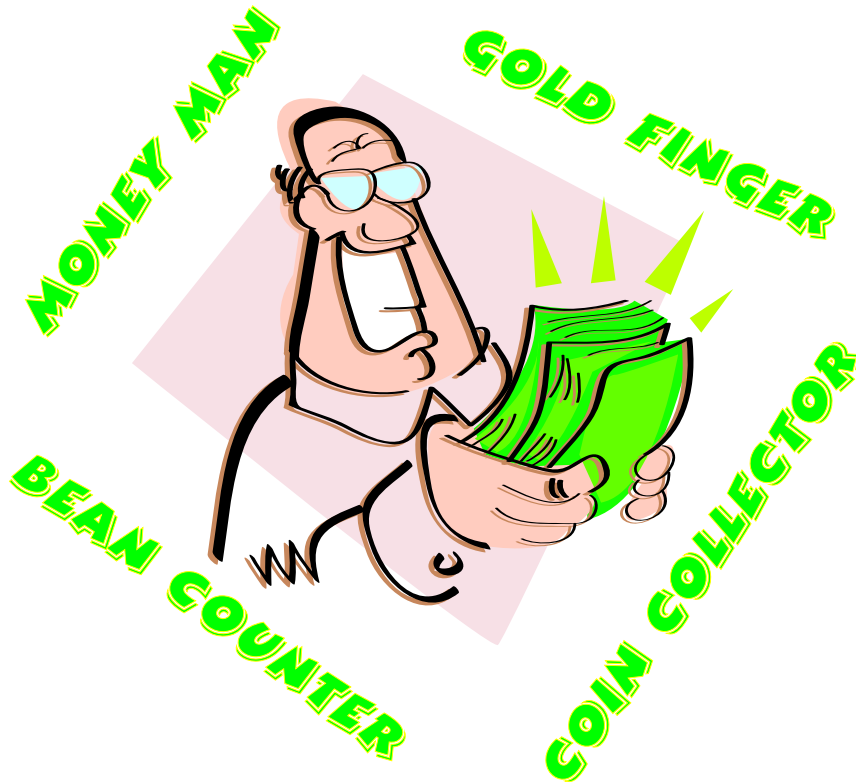

VARIABLE COUNTER BALANCE



Over the years I have tried many devices to counter balance off centre work. Although many did work, they felt uncomfortable to work with. These were usually over or under weights, screwed or bolted to sticks or discs with many leaving an air space revolving close to the work

I then developed what I consider the ultimate variable device which can be made in a size to suit your own requirements.



I used the following:

1. Two thin metal discs about 200mm in diameter and about 1.5mm thick.
2. One thicker steel disc the same diameter but 5mm or more thick.
3. About 12 metal thread screws – about 6 mm.

Method

1. Drill a hole in the centre of the two thin discs large enough to slip over the headstock screw of your lathe.
2. Drill a hole in the centre of the thicker disc large enough to clear the back of your scroll chuck. (I cut mine about 75mm diameter)
3. Cut the thick disc in half.
4. Firmly attach one half to each of the thin discs with your metal screws.

To use

1. Place one disc on the lathe with the weight against the lathe side.
2. Place the second disc with the weight facing your scroll chuck.
3. With the scroll chuck just loose, rotate the discs until they counter balance your work. Tighten the scroll chuck. These weights can be re-adjusted as required. This enables you to turn unbalanced work at a faster speed You can balance the work piece to an acceptable balance with just a little practice.

By using different size discs and thicker or thinner weights, one can vary the counter balance to suit your own particular need. My discs weigh about 2 kg over all.

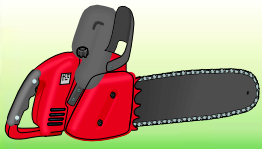
