- Oct...To hold Pot Pourri. Free standing or hanging. The lid (if used) will be a wooden one of your own design. Purchased lids are not acceptable. Size unlimited.
- Nov... Bud vase Matched pair. To have an exact height of 180mm.
- Dec... Best Item turned in 2007 that has not been

previously judged at an Association Workshop.

Here is the proposed competition list for 2009, designed to be within the capabilities of the Novices, yet challenging enough for the Intermediate and Advanced turners and also able to be fairly judged! Your comments and/or suggestions are welcome on any or all of these items. However, there will be no variations or changes after December 31st, 2008!! So, if you have anything to offer, please do so by then as no changes will be made after that date. Any and all comments/suggestions/changes should be made to me, preferably in writing, (but we can talk about it).

My thanks to Jim Hanney for his assistance and valuable input.

- Feb... Square Edged Bowl. All four sides to be a perfect square. Minimum 120mm Maximum 180mm measured from the flat edges, not corner to corner.
- Mar. . . Candlestick as per published design (Page 19) to exact measurements. Reproduced with kind permission from Nick Arnull and Woodturning Magazine (# 169).
- Apr... Goblets, Matching in all respects. All to be exactly 150mm high. Set of two for Novice, Set of three for Intermediate, Set of four for Advanced. Goblets only, no trays, racks etc.
- May . . Inkwell and Inkwell holder to be all wood, with an old style pen with a nib or a quill pen which is also made of wood.
- Jun... Fruit in a Bowl, Five different pieces of fruit in a bowl. Fruit to be coloured, all pieces to be realistic and average life size.
- Jul . . . Lidded Honey Pot and Honey Dipper. Maximum size of the bowl and lid, 150mm h x 100mm w. Dipper to be proportional.
- Aug... Double Bowl, To feature two overlocking (interlocking)(figure of 8) bowl recesses. Unlimited size
- Sep... Needle Cases, Set of three 70mm, 90mm, 110mm, matching in shape and timbers.
- Oct . . . Thin Wall Bowl, 150mm to 160mm high x 180mm to 200mm wide. The bowl walls to be as thin as possible. A correspondingly thin base would be desirable, but not mandatory. (Variable measurements are to allow for any movement in the wood).
- Nov... Hanging Christmas Decorations, Set of Four. Upside down Finial type. Not necessarily matching, no colouring. To be presented on a stand, board or tree.
- Dec... Best Turned Item made in 2009 that has not been previously judged at an Association Workshop.
- Jan... No workshop.
- Feb... Natural Edged Bowl with a Lid. The lid to be set inside the bowl away from the

Also to Les Davies for his first show And tell item of a Spoon Tree, by the writers estimate would hold 300 spoons. Les has set the bar so high for himself that I think some time in the future we can expect him to bring in a fully turned full scale model of the Eiffel tower.

After our cuppa and cake Jim Cunniffe gave a very interesting talk and demonstration on designing and turning bud vases. Jim put a lot of thought and time into his preparation. This was most evident with his presentation. The White Board drawings were interesting and helpful in explaining the difference in good and bad design and function (proper base size for stability). The demonstration on the lathe was excellent with the golden rules being covered in Jim's use of the skew chisel admired by all. Members took it all in and forgot about the clock until demonstrations and questions finished, thank you Jim.



8th July Busselton had the great pleasure having Mr. Ian Kealley as quest speaker who gave a very instructive talk and slide show on the timbers of the gold fields and their uses, these including the manufacture of musical instruments. FOI was introduced to WA in 1992 when the Act was passed. It requires all government agencies to give access to information when a citizen requests it in writing. Personal information must be given without charge but fees are payable when the information does not relate to the person requesting. A helpful pamphlet describes the process clearly. See <u>www.foi.wa.gov.au</u> or phone (08) 9220 7888.

Australia introduced the legislation in 1982, America in 1966 and Sweden in 1776. We sure aren't front runners!


Despite being dogged by cold weather for events where we welcomed visitors, there was a warm welcome at both the annual Weekend Workshop at Kalamunda Hall on Saturday July 19 and our latest social venture a Hotpot Night at our Gumnuts meeting hall on Saturday August 30.

First to our weekend workshop where members and visitors kept warm with copious cups of tea and frequent trips outside to catch some of the occasional sun on the bitterly cold day of Swan's weekend workshop at Kalamunda Hall on July 19. Despite the inclement weather there was a good turn out, though it was noted that at Tuesday afternoon's subsequent meeting here were ample snuffles from those who caught cold at the workshop.

An interesting day with intriguing demonstrations more than made up for the weather. Once again we were treated to Bob Napthine's inimitable style of turning by feel. With the tongue in cheek title of Seeing is Believing, Bob, who is sight impaired, deftly turned a bud vase. In a running and often amusing commentary Bob explained why his designs are often made on the run even more than his fellow wood turners and why he is particularly wary of sharp edges. He told of once almost unwittingly severing his finger. Until his wife came into the workshop and inquired where all the blood had come from, he was totally unaware of his injury.

(At this point I must digress to say that I am all too aware of how vulnerable fingers can be. A week after hearing Bob's story and prior to going on holiday I managed to crush the top of my left hand middle finger while guiding a piece of jarrah through a circular saw. I subsequently had to have the end joint amputated. This was my first injury after working with power tools for more than 50 years and demonstrates how one can never be too careful).

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But back to the weekend workshop and its intriguing themes. Eric Walker was listed To Perform an Unnatural Act, which drew a few comments from his fellows. However this turned out to be a demonstration of how a burl could be made to appear to have a natural edge by selectively snapping pieces off. Derek Beer of Gosnells made a segmented vase and Don Clarke fashioned an excellent and unusual mug tree from a large segmented block.

Swan is a well patronised group with its major monthly meeting held on the second Tuesday each month, but with three Tuesday afternoon meetings as well.

On Tuesday July 3 Noel Moyes claimed he did not know what a mantle clock was, yet he despite this he produced an extremely satisfactory timepiece. At this meeting Don Clarke spoke on his research on cacogenic timbers, with apparently the only non-cacogenic timber being native she oak. This once again stressed why wood turners should wear masks.

July 10 Mike Howard showed us how to make pot stands with a difference. This consisted of four round pieces held together with a large keying. The pieces were turned and later released from the ring to be spread out. There was also a great deal of interest in Barrie Leivers' demonstration of his Mark II fluting tool.

August 5 Convenor Chris Allen made a ring stand from bottlebrush, which made many members think of pruning their bottlebrush trees in the garden because the grain was surprisingly good. Mike Howard showed the group a distinctive

banksia pot, which had a jarrah insert, a big improvement on the ubiquitous turned banksia nuts, so popular with international visitors. One of our newest members Owen McGrath came in for a bit of ribbing when he produced a rather strange shaped egg. He confessed even his granddaughter questioned the shape and certainly it was not something that a chook would be proud of. As we all know we learn from our mistakes and sharing information at the meetings invariably leads to improvements.

August 12 Eric Walker demonstrated a fine tazza (cake stand) to give members an idea of what was expected at September's competition.



A Good Serving

Kevin Luff imparted his knowledge on the art of creating a 'lazy Susan', an attractive accessory for your dining room table.

Stating he uses epoxy and dowelling to fix his 200mm wide Jarrah boards for better grip (biscuit joints and white glue have a tendency to move!!); Kevin demonstrated his Aussie jig to show how simple the procedure can be. He then proceeded with the base and bearing mechanism. Placing the piece of wood between cup centres, he used a scraper, spindle gouge and skew to fashion the base, creating a round board with a recess.

The bearing was then fixed to the top first. Ensuring it was centrally placed on the board, and using self taping screws and a magnetic screwdriver, the process was easily accomplished.

His preferred finishing materials include Becker's diluted lacquer which is sanded back a couple of times, followed by a few coats of Danish Oil and a gentle rub with steel wool in between coats.

Just Fungi's!!!!

With time ticking rapidly, all eyes were on deck, as John Scarfe performed an impromptu demonstration on creating a mushroom, the competition piece for the night.

Then, with tools brandished eagerly, eyes affixed upon the lathes and wood to be attacked, the moment began for competitors to have some fun. A variety of caps and stalks were created in the allotted time of five minutes. The chatter and commentary added to the atmosphere.

And the winner for the best Pinus Radiatus Fungus, Chris Grey, who walked away with Wandi's best Chateaux plonk!!

August Club Nights

KISS Design

Rod Cocks discussed the basic principles of good design. Planning your projects in advance can be most beneficial, especially when taking the following factors into account:

1.Situation - the reason/need for the creation - whether a gift/for display or whether a practical item

2.Brief - who is the item for/what do you want to make?

3. Analysis- assess the ergonomics - how big/small,

what shape/style; design may be determined by the size of the wood

4.Research - what dimensions, what type of timber- assess the orientation of the grain; what type of embellishing/finish-oil/lacquer

5.Concepts - actively playing with lines and shapes, either drawing by hand or using computer screen; perhaps using such aids as a chain or mirror may also be beneficial

6.Chosen idea

7.Testing - make a prototype, experimentation costs nothing but time and allows you to iron out any problems encountered before the perfect goods are made.

8.Producing - complete the item

9.Evaluation - remember to take stock of events, record results and outcomes. They may be useful later on.

Rod also discussed the 'Golden Rectangle' or 'Golden Mean', an ancient Greek mathematical formula which can be used for determining proportions, thereby making the item more pleasing to the eye.

In conclusion, there is no right or wrong way to create a design; you have to do what pleases you. However the 'Keep It Simple Stupid' approach may be very useful. Nothing can surpass the simple designs that bring out the natural beauty and character of the wood. Thanks again, Rod.

Scrapers Deluxe

To make your scraper you will need:

- 1. . One piece of High Speed Steel 16 x 6 mm and 300min long
- 2. . One 1/4inch (Whitworth) T-nut
- 3. . Two pieces of hardwood 40 x 15 mm by 300mm long
- 4. . Two pieces of hardwood 15 x 7 min by 300mm long-just thicker than the HSS steel
- 5. . One brass or steel ferrule 20 min diameter by 25mm long
- 6. . One piece of greaseproof paper to wrap around the steel bar.
- 7. . Best glue: eg, Araldite.

Method

- 1. About 35-40mm in from one end drill a hole with a spade bit just deep enough to hold the T-nut below the surface.
- 2. Then drill right through this hole with a smaller drill so that the T-nut can be embedded into the wooden bar below the surface.
- 3. Wrap some greaseproof paper around the steel bar so the steel bar won't get stuck in the handle during gluing.
- 4. . Glue the two smaller pieces to the piece above with the steel bar between them.
- 5. . Glue the last piece on top and clamp. Leave overnight to dry.
- 6. . Remove the HSS bar, plug the ends and turn the handle to your desired shape.
- 7. . The working end next to the T-nut is cut almost to hold the 20mm ferrule.
- 8. . Heat the ferrule in a gas flame and with pliers slide it over the end and quench in cold water immediately.
- 9. You should be able to slide the steel bar in and out (removing the paper packing) and adjust to your desired working length using a grub screw or gutter bolt to hold the bar in place.
- 10. Sharpen to your desired profile.


