Bunbury's Elves save Christmas

In the Bunbury Mail, on December the 23rd an article was published about the Bunbury Woodturners, and their prodigious collection of wooden toys for the Uniting Church, and their Christmas toy collection for needy children.

The Uniting church in Melville was damaged the week before by vandals setting it alight, and the fire destroyed a collection of toys and toiletries destined for a women's refuge.

Stan Zeiba was responsible for rallying the Bunbury Woodturners, to make wooden toy grasshoppers as a replacement for the ones burned in the fire.

The efforts of the Bunbury members of the Woodturners Association of Western Australia are to be congratulated, and lets hope the spirit of Xmas lives on in this mighty group.

Veekend Vorksho ps Observations by Peter Pickering Bunbury workshop

Travelling by car down the new Forrest Highway to Bunbury certainly is a fast and efficient method of travel, just set your cruise control on the speed limit and watch all the other traffic pass you like you were standing still.

The workshop was held in the Bunbury Soccer Dome clubrooms and Jim Cunniffe in his role as Master of Ceremonies gave a warm welcome to the members and their guests. Jim introduced the Convenor Kevin Bell then explained the facilities and the order of procedure. As Bunbury is a major sea port with considerable history the theme of the workshop was to be of a nautical flavour. In keeping with the theme the first demonstration was Stan Zieba with a hand caster for a fishing line. Describing himself as a wood turner and poet Stan recited a poem he had written dedicated to our MC. Stan then proceeded to turn the caster, he accompanied his work with a series of jokes and finishing the caster with his trade mark of four captive rings. Stan showed the members how the caster worked and that the captive rings were not only decorative but served a useful purpose when winding in your catch. I saw Stan after the demo and he was kind enough to give me a caster which I took back to show members of our group that could not attend Bunbury. An interesting and entertaining demo.

After morning tea Neil Piper introduced his demonstration of how to make a ships wheel with a talk on the early sailing ships that visited Bunbury. The wheel was 300mm in diameter and could have a clock or other instrument in the centre. Neil explained the need for careful planning and absolute

accuracy as a minute error would be magnified as the segments increased. The wheel was made with eight segments in two parts. The eight spokes were fitted to the centre boss, after leaving the initial glue up 24 hours to set. Neil passed round a completed wheel; the craftsmanship was appreciated and admired by all who saw it. Neil then gave us some more history of the port including the involvement of American whalers, he also told us that there were a 19 identified shipwrecks in the harbour. Possibly some advanced turners may take up the challenge of this very demanding but rewarding project.

President Derek Martin conducted his Forum and invited Norm Graffe to speak on the International Wood Collectors Society. Derek reminded Groups to look after their members as he announced the vale of Richard Leggo and Ross Wilton. He also stated the possibility of a future workshop in Geraldton.

After lunch Tom Bixey took the stage to show us how to turn a fish on a lathe, he first passed around two fish as examples of unique items that can be made using offset turning and hand work with a dremel. He constructed the fish in two parts and after cutting the fins with a coping saw paper glued the pieces together. After turning he split the joints, Tom then turned the potato and cut it into chips, the fish was then filleted to make a Fish & Chip meal. Tom kept the audience guessing what the outcome was going to be right up to when he plated up the meal.

Jim Cunniffe came next with "Let's play with dolphins" Jim explained that ring turning (doughnut turning) was not new with the first records of this craft dating back to the 1500's and possibly earlier, although this date was the time of the spread of information due to books being printed with movable type. In the workshop the ring turner was a tradesman of great importance as he could keep 5 other people employed by turning for only 10 minutes, his other skill was the ability to see things in silhouette. Jim showed how you take a circular piece of wood with a disc on each side (lined up). Using a specially made chisel used as a scraper he cut one side for the top of the dolphin then reversed the wood and cut the other side for the bottom of the dolphin then shaped the fin. After completion you part off. What do you do with 60 dolphins? Jim was pleased that this question was asked and he

brought out and passed around many samples which included: a Childs mobile, 3 examples of a music box, a merry go round with dolphins pumping up and down, other examples used sea horses, frosty the snow man, kangaroo's elephants etc. This demonstration certainly got members thinking of ways to employ ring turning.

The raffle and competition results came next with John Mason so pleased with the quality and quantity of the entries that he was later seen celebrating with a large box of hot chips at the Myalup roadhouse.

A good day out at Bunbury with some surprises as they followed the nautical theme with interesting and informative talks and demonstrations.

Revised 24th Decmeber 2009 Definition of Natural edge.

To avoid any misunderstanding, here is a brief outline of what constitutes the February Comp item, "A natural edged bowl with a lid"

First up, a definition of a natural edge. The best so far is "Any edge that has not been touched by a tool" (and that should include saws and axes etc)

The lid is to be positioned so that it is lower that the bowl's top rim, possibly sitting on a small ledge. The size is unlimited.

Regarding the February competition item "Natural Edged Bowl with Lid", there are some pictures that show how some have been made, to be used only as a guideline for your entry.

Marius Van Derlecq talked to the Group about his mentor Stuart Heinrich and his final project at University in his studies for a Bachelor of Education to achieve his goal to be a Manual Arts teacher. For his project he had turned a salt and a pepper grinder in the shape of a man and woman using five different timbers for each, turning their hats grind the condiments. Faultlessly turned and finished they were a magnificent example creativity and technical excellence. The Group thanked Marius and wished him well for the future.

The Group project was turning an oval box.

Nov 6&7 The Gosnells Group participated in the Canning Agricultural Show. With two lathes and a table exhibiting samples of their craft John Gardiner, Owen O'Neill, Derek Pollard, Bill Wallbank, Rudy Goh, Allen Smith and Peter Pickering demonstrated to the public and explained the benefits of joining WAWA.

Nov 11 the group continued with the oval box. Phil Evans and Patrick Link brought in their donation of Christmas toys these included 5 Walking trolleys, 15 Trucks and 5 Racing cars. The group responded with a tribute for their great effort.

Nov 18 Finishing the oval box, this has being a challenging project and a first time for many members to try offset turning.

Nov 25 The monthly demonstration saw Chris Smith and Chris Sioulas combining their skills to present a demonstration on sharpening. Two grinders were set up at the front of the group and they worked in tandem, first spindle gouges with Chris Sioulas using a jig he had made based on the Heli-grind system and Chris Smith using a rotating jig similar to the Tru-grind but held in a V shaped extending base. Both obtained excellent results and explained their method. Bowl gouges next with similar methods. For roughing gouge, skew chisel and parting tools were ground by Chris Sioulas using a plate rest with the angle set by a template whilst Chris Smith used the V shaped extension jig. Chris Sioulas ground the scraper in a similar manner whilst Chris Smith used an angled plate rest. Their methodology and jigs may differ but these two master craftsmen obtained excellent results. They invited questions throughout the demonstration and gave continuous explanation. This was a first class demo and has provided members with all the information they need to produce standardised and consistent sharpening.

27 Nov. Saw many volunteers helping to move our equipment to our new home into what was the Gosnells Family Hospital. This property is owned by the Amaroo Village Aged Care organisation and they have kindly allowed us to occupy the site until they require it for redevelopment. We use one wing comprising two large operating theatres for our lathes, store rooms, tool rooms for band saw,drill,grinder etc plus meeting rooms, kitchen and toilet facilities.

2 Dec Settling into our new home and making a natural edged bowl.

5 Dec Annual Christmas break up BBQ at the Amaroo Village centre. A good time was had by all, although our Life Member Derek Pollard could not be seen when Father Christmas appeared with presents for the ladies and good wishes for all. Thank you Derek.

November meeting. Unfortunately, a few members did not get news of our new meeting time and venue in time for the meeting, but 19 members still rolled up.

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
