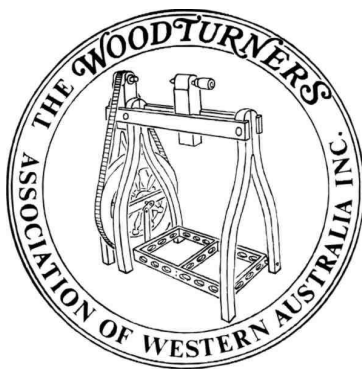
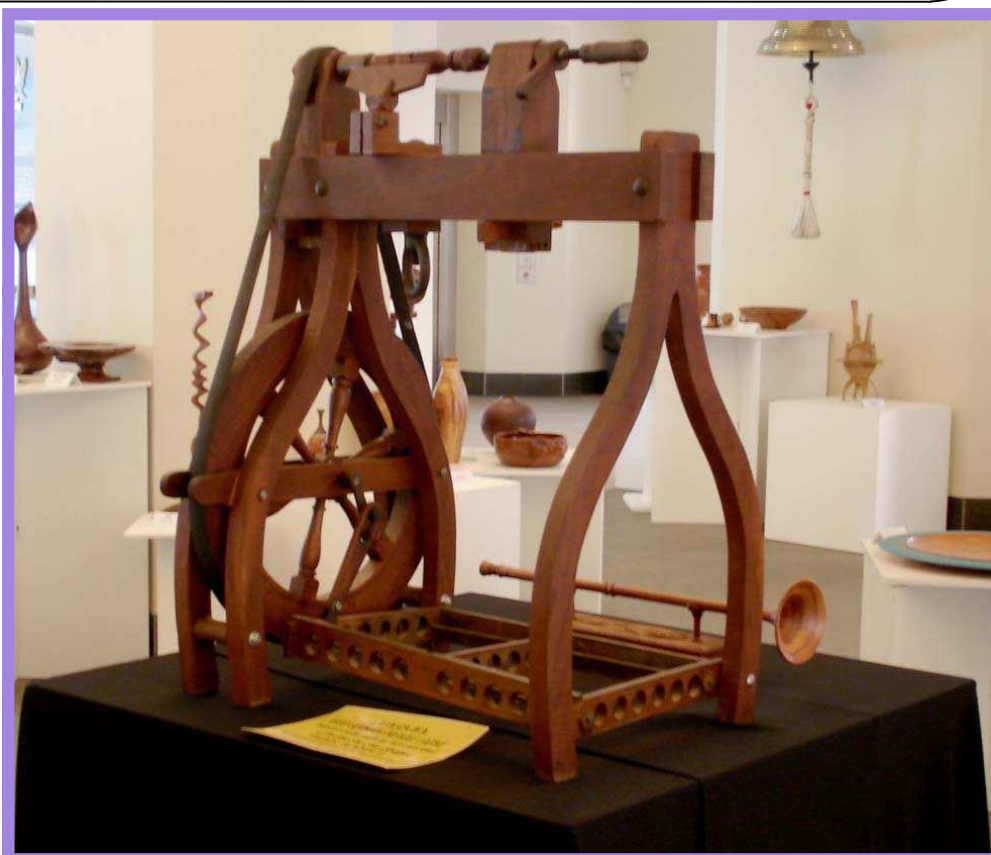

Presidential Ponderings

I'm sitting down to write this the day after Melville's February workshop at Wandi and I'm still chuffed – with good reason! There is a lot to be chuffed about. It was a large and extremely well attended workshop with great demonstrators and a range of interesting topics, along with an appreciative audience who were clearly interested and attentive. Despite the mugginess, there was no snoring to be heard in the afternoon sessions, no sleeping body fell off the chair, so there was clearly something very good going on. And there was! Melville is entitled to our congratulations for a good job extremely well done.

I got up to the front a couple of times during the day and what impressed me most was seeing the audience surrounded by tables of competition entries – nearly 70 of them and half from novices. While quantity is always important, quality is what really matters and I couldn't help reflecting on the great improvements that I've seen over the last couple of years in design, tool skill, and finish. Judges had every right to be anxious about their task because it's obviously becoming more difficult but they did well and the new scoring system developed by Mal and Barbara Jennings worked to perfection. If next month's WAWA workshop is equally successful, then the year will be off to a great start.

Of course, WAWA shouldn't be running the March workshop – not because the Committee of Management can't run a workshop but because it shouldn't! This is very much opposed to the spirit of WAWA that our founders built into the way that WAWA was organised and run. I had something to say about that at Melville's workshop and I'm going to repeat it again here because I think it holds the key to our future. It certainly explains our past successes.

In their great wisdom, our founders organised WAWA so that the groups did and the Committee of Management facilitated their doing. That has been the way of things for more than 30 years. Groups ran the workshops, for that was the way that all WAWA members had to share their experiences as equal partners in the great adventure of teaching one another how to turn. A small central committee was established to assist groups to buy the equipment they needed, insure equipment and members, coordinate activities between groups, and carry out all the other tasks that helped groups perform better. But that was all the central committee did.

We are about to introduce the strategic plan to cover the next four years so we need to remind ourselves that groups DO and the Committee of Management FACILITATES. Understand that principle and the strategic plan will make more sense.

The introduction of special-interest groups, kicked off at the Melville workshop and announced in this newsletter, is a reflection of that principle in action. The Committee of Management, responding to members' requests, has taken the initiative to get the groups going but, once that happens, the groups themselves will be expected to manage their own affairs.

Special interest groups represents an exciting development because they will bring members from different groups together to do what we have always done well – sharing our knowledge of specialised aspects of turning. I encourage all of you to help them get off the ground. The Committee of Management of course is interested in hearing from anyone who thinks other special-interest groups should be formed.

Do keep turning. Regard each item you turn as a new beginning.

The next week was better and Show and Tell produced a lidded vessel from Chris Smith finished in black. Chris also offered a bowl in jacaranda and jarrah, all up to Chris's usual high standard. Bill Cooper showed a nicely finished platter in pine with a ceramic insert.

Valentine's Day saw us treated to some very fine pieces for Show and Tell. Ivan Moro showed a beautifully finished pitcher complete with handle in jacaranda with she-oak accents.

John Gardiner presented a bowl in she-oak with a pierced lid also in she-oak produced to John's usual high standard..

Peter Manchee provided the piece de resistance in the form of a bowl in which the knots in the timber have been incorporated to form a carved tree trunk with the foliage simulated by cunning piercing. The bowl was laid on its side to present the tree upright and mounted on a natural edged base. Very effective!

Show and Tell on 21st Feb was an opportunity to view the groups entries in the cheese platter competition. A recent member, Ian Hamilton, produced a nice platter which was unfortunately oversize and was withdrawn by Ian. My own entry received 1st intermediate for which i'm grateful also on display was a bowl by another new member Callan Souter in jarrah burl. Unfortunately the burl had a serious crack extending almost two thirds across the diameter. 7 Feb – Brian Fowlie took the lathe today to demonstrate his technique/approach to creating a small lidded box from a sheoak blank and giving a detailed explanation of his progress , tool use & reason for use thereof. S & T was undertaken by Ken Thurston.

14 Feb – Frank Dymond took control today with comprehensive detailed explanations in his approach to creating a number of innovative items which incorporated utilisation of engineering devices ie. cams, cranks (not members) , gears, ratchets, pulleys, to be fitted to items during the course of construction to achieve desired actions/movements. Altogether very ingenious & involving quite a degree of fine turning for the various devices sought. S & T was capably undertaken by one of our newer members, Graham Padgett.

17 Feb – Melville Group's 2018 Week End workshop held at Wandi. A great success with 118 financial members registering & 15 wives/Associates/visitors also signing the attendance registers & 70 members entering the competition – a cheese platter. All entries were of very good standard and took up a great deal of time for the judges who rose to the challenge and completed their task well. Timber Characteristics - courtesy of Woodturners Society of Queensland



Botanical name: *Melia azedarach*, var *australasic*.

Other common names: Syringa (South Africa), Persian Lilac, Chinaberry Tree, Texas Umbrella Tree (USA), Bois Rouge (New Caledonia), Cape Lilac, Tulip Cedar.

Family name: Meliaceae.

Distribution: A medium hardwood found in the rainforests of New South Wales and Queensland. Also found in Oceania and parts of Asia and now widely cultivated internationally as an ornamental tree which produces a characteristic small yellow berry in clusters after flowering.

Colour: Heartwood is pale to reddish-brown with distinctive growth rings. The sapwood is creamy white.

The timber: Straight grained with a fairly coarse, uneven texture.

Mechanical properties: Medium rating in all classifications. Not suitable for steam bending. Not sufficiently durable for exterior work. Sapwood susceptible to lyctid borer attack.

Working properties: Works easily. However, fibres may lift and tear during planing. Holds nails and screws without pre-boring. Glues well but difficult to bring to a good finish due to the coarseness of the grain. Filler should be employed in the finishing medium.

Uses: Furniture, internal joinery, cabinet work, turnery.

Availability: Limited as not produced commercial timber.
