

Presidential Pronouncements

So much for the Christmas break ... have no idea where it went!

Next year is now this year and in many ways, 2015 is going to be significant year for WAWA. Apart from the fact that it is our 30th anniversary of establishment, there is a strong possibility of the establishment of a new group at Cannington and interest in establishing a new group closer to the coast in the City of Cockburn. Three groups that I know of – Avon, Mandurah and Swan – will be moving to new premises this year and Gosnells to a new site at the same premises. The COM is working on a promotion strategy to attract new members that will involve the distribution of the DVD Rudi Goh produced for the Wood Show last year. The COM has tested successfully remote attendance at a meeting using computer and internet technology thus enabling committee members to contribute to meetings if for some reason they cannot physically attend. Hopefully, more country members will be inspired by this to nominate for positions on the COM in the future.

I encourage all groups to consider some way of celebrating our 30th birthday.

Quite a lot has happened since the last edition. An excellent Busselton workshop, at which I was privileged to present Mick Johnson with Life Membership. Two COM meetings that have resulted in some important decisions and some great initiatives. A number of Christmas functions that were good opportunities to chat with and get to know members in a relaxed (and very well fed) environment. Then Christmas. After that it gets blurred around the edges. But I hope you all had a good one and Santa found your chimney.

Important decision one: the WAWA Group Challenge. Bruce Jackson, in his capacity as Competition Coordinator, has proposed an inter-group competition to run concurrently with the traditional weekend workshop competition. As you will appreciate, developing a competition format that puts all groups on at a more-or-less level of competitiveness required some innovative thinking. The aim of the new competition is to get more members involved in weekend workshops through more entries in the competition and, hopefully as a result of more entries, higher attendance. A formula has been decided whereby each entry will gain a point for that member's group. At the end of the year, total points for each group will be tallied and the totals divided by the number of members for each group eg a group finishes the year with 50 points and that group has 40 members. The score is 1.2; a group earns 20 points and has 20 members, score is 1. The prize for the winning group will be \$1000 with \$500 to the runner-up.

A consequence of this initiative is that we will need a bigger pool of judges for the workshops and may need to consider some changes to judging procedures if it is successful and there are LOTS more entries.

Important decision two: changes to distribution of the newsletter. The cost of printing and posting the newsletter has become unsustainable and, for the past year, has been slightly in excess of \$6000. This works out at \$20 per member

receiving a printed copy. There have been rumblings from members who receive the email copy, and fair enough when the majority of "print members" do have an email address.

This is the last newsletter that will be prepared for printing and posting by the newsletter editor. From edition 177, the newsletter will be available for download from the web site and will be emailed to all group secretaries. An email advising members that the new edition is available will be sent to everyone for whom there is an email address listed on the membership database. **If you change your email address, please let the Membership Registrar and the Newsletter Editor know your new address.** Those members who have not got an email address or have other problems with using email must let their group secretary know that they would like a printed copy. The newsletter will continue to be produced as a PDF file, so printing should not be an issue if members wish to print their own copy.

The up-side of this decision is that the money saved will be directed into the the equipment fund thereby increasing the amount that is returned to groups each year.

I'd like to thank all the members who have shared with me their thoughts and opinions on various matters at different functions and trust you will continue to do so.

Good progress is being made towards the establishment at Southern River College of our own dedicated workshop with a tentative completion date of March 2015. The construction costs are being borne by the College with the Group being responsible for the fit-out and electrics. In order to help meet these anticipated costs we held a very successful sausage sizzle at Bunnings, Harrisdale on 6th December.

Joondalup—Wanneros Journal

November: In his member short talk, John Van Den Bogert described his early life in Balcatta in the 50's before completing a chair making apprenticeship which he completed about the time mass produced furniture made the trade redundant. He then followed a career in the building industry making curtain walling on high rise buildings. He was also involved in the construction of a large chamber to test building component resistance to wind and rain. He took up turning after acquiring a cheap lathe, then, after some near misses, joined WAWA to improve his skills.

The Christmas decoration comp was dominated by Christmas trees, lanterns, snowmen and angels. Intermediate winner was Randall Harding with Mike Wickings runner up. In the advanced division, Frank Visser's inside out turning won from my effort.

Graeme Skewes demonstrated his method of making spinning tops and the handles with draw-strings to spin them. The December comp (spinning tops is to include a spin off as part of the judging)

In Show & Tell, Jabbal showed a beautifully made segmented Jarrah and European Beech dish and Indian cooking vessel, comprising some 385 individual pieces of timber carefully glued together. His finish was four coats of poly urethane

Tony showed us a hollow form vessel (made in two halves) and bowl made from Huon Pine with Sheoak and Jarrah inlays respectively. His finish was Danish Oil and Wax.

Viv showed laminated pepper/salt grinders needing only small pieces of wood,

which he had made up following his show & tell at the last meeting. One had a friction fit top which dispenses with the need for a retaining knob.

December: A total of 75 Christmas gift toys made by Joondalup/Wanneroo members were donated to Vincent de Paul, Santa's Workshop (Bentley) the Joondalup Baptist Group.

Our December regular member's short talk was presented by our convenor. Frank spoke of his life since being born in Holland in 1947. His family migrated to Australia by air. The trip took a week, flying only between 0800 and noon each day. Life here commenced at the Northam Army Camp for three months from where his father had to commute to Kwinana for work each day. He had seven children to feed. The family moved to Kalgoorlie. Frank got an apprenticeship in the mines where he soon became electrical foreman. He married Mary in 1970. His career progressed to Western Mining's design office in Perth, working with CAD design systems and gaining his diploma in electrical engineering at night school. He retired at 65 after many years contracting, and took up woodturning through WAWA in 2008.

In the spinning top comp, Mike Wickings and Aiton Sheppard apologised for not bringing in their items which they had forgotten at home – such is the pressure of office bearing! Novice and intermediate were won by Bob Hammett & Jim Waters respectively. A respectable seven entries in Advanced, and the winner was yours truly followed by Graeme draper and Barry Cobb. The spin off had tops going in all directions entertaining all present.

Our next competition, in February will be a Multi-material turned item (could include metal, acrylics, bone etc., but not painted).

In the absence of a demo, we had an extended Show & Tell.

Mike Wickings expressed his concerns that the Group were concentrating on boys' toys and showed Japanese Dolls that can easily be turned for girls.

Jim Waters showed the nut bowl and mallet he had made from ancient timber; the jam chuck and threaded face plate he uses for restoration; and, how he made up a push rod gouge and ring gouge out of old screwdrivers.

Andy Hill showed the home made chatter tool he uses on end grain; and a variety of spinning tops including a 'tippy top' and finger spinner.

Frank Visser showed his hand top.

Graeme Skewes showed a variety of hollowing tools and scrapers he had hand made from old files.

Barry Cobb showed a MDF chuck jaw extension. He advised that 12mm M6 Pan Phillips head bolts are available from Porter Agencies in Malaga.

Events: Our stall at the Hot Rod day at the Yanchep national park on 16 November was successful with some \$350 in sales. The Poynter Primary Farmers Market stall on the Saturday before Christmas was even more successful with interest in turning and sales much higher than other events, even though it is only a three hour event. Oct 29 –Today's demonstrator was Graham Sibon who showed his approach to creating a simple letter opener involving quite a significant amount of time using a skew chisel to achieve the intended result. Well prepared & presented demo with excellent displayed use/explanation of the skew techniques. A comprehensive show & tell of the items tabled was given by Milton Rundle. Early evening we had a small gathering of a Melville Council reps, local sea scouts members & the supervising artist (John), & a few Group members to hand over the sculpture created from timber salvaged from the old Deepwater Point jetty. The evenings format was a presentation by George Walker on wood carving, aspect of woodturning by David Rechter & a short practical demo by Norm Gratte on woodturning. An attentive & appreciative audience.

5 Nov – Robin Spence today captivated his audience with his technique for creating an off-set handled scoop utilizing conventional & unconventional approaches to achieve the finished item. A novel item, not without its difficulties as Robin highlighted by passing around earlier efforts (at home) each minus a handle OR a very short handle. 

TECHNICAL DESK

The difference between Carbon Steel & High Speed Steel

This involves a study of metallurgy that can get quite involved, however, for new turners who turn up with some older tools formed from carbon steel; this may help to explain why HSS is the better way to go.



By definition- mild steels are those in which carbon is the main alloying element. The chart opposite is an indication of the various carbon content and uses. In the past many lathe tools were made from tool steel with a carbon content of between 0.6 to 1.5 %, which meant they could be hardened and then the 'temper' could be drawn to the toughness required, unfortunately they did not remain hard at 'red heat' (*pressing too hard on a emery wheel*).

By definition – HSS, an alloy steel that remain hard at red heat and **gain their properties from either tungsten or molybdenum**, often a combination of both.

Different manufactures will have different alloying composition that may include chromium, vanadium, cobalt and aluminum.

In summary, since it is possible to achieve specific properties by careful adjustment of alloying elements, manufacturers are able to offer the most suitable HSS grade for virtually all kinds of applications. With woodturning this includes, the optimum comprise between the hardness to be able to take and hold a sharp edge, and the toughness required to minimize the possibility of brittle fracture as well as the abrasive nature of turning.
