### Joondalup-Wanneroo Wanderings

In the last couple of months we have welcomed several new members to our group as well as some visitors. With the added interest from the advertising campaign we are getting some results.

In arrangement with CarbaTec, the group welcomed Chris Pouncy from Robert Sorby Tools to conduct a demonstration of the Robert Sorby tools for wood turning. The demonstration was excellent with a lot of good humour and excellent skills displayed. The approx. 25 attendees were from our and other groups. CarbaTec had a good range the of tools on display and available for discounted sale.

At our *July* meeting, Barry Cobb gave an excellent demonstration on how to make a pen with a Celtic knot. This was much appreciated by all concerned. Two strips of veneer laminated together are inserted into 45 degree bandsaw cuts in the blank. Bondcrete 75% and 25% water mix is a good adhesive. As baking paper does not stick to the glue it was used to sandwich the veneers while laminating. Barry is most particular about his finishes. He achieves excellent results after sanding down to 1500 grit and applying several coats of Medium CA (Super) glue, available from Fibreglass and Resin Sales in Kewdale. 'Zip Kicker' can be used to speed up drying between coats. The demonstration was widely appreciated and Barry's dry humour added to the atmosphere.

At the *August* meeting Graham Turner was back with a skilled example of turning a natural edged bowl out of a piece of Jacaranda. Graham used mainly bowl gouges but did show how to remove large amounts of wood with a sharp skew scraping method. Graham also demonstrated his classic method of mounting the wood using of an aluminium disc with three screws driven into predrilled holes.

The August meeting was also our AGM with all positions declared vacant. There were no nominations for the positions of Convenor or Secretary *Andy Hill* has offered to continue as Convenor until our Weekend Workshop in October, but he then has to vacate the position as he has completed his two years. Andy reminded everyone that without a Convenor, the group will have to disband. *Aiton Shepard* did indicate that he may continue on as Secretary, but as he was not at the meeting, this could not be confirmed. *Bill Birch* volunteered for the position of Treasurer which was accepted and confirmed. All other committee members offered to continue in their present roles and were confirmed.

### Melville Mutterings

21 June – Monthly "hands on" day again with Norm G & Brian F in charge with the selected item for today being a pot pourri – makers choice in respect to choice of timber & shape with a number of inserts available. With the colder & shorter days numbers have dropped in recent weeks but 33 members manning the 11 lathes & enthusiastically tackling the challenge with very creditable results overall, Being "Hands On" no S & T today.

28 Jun e – Frank Dymond had the lathe today & his chosen topic was demonstrating/explaining the procedure for replicating attractive Russian wooden dolls theme on entertainment/ weddings etc involving a large amount of offset turning together with small items for feet , hands, head decoration & musical instruments (balalaika) painted in appropriate colours & resulting in a very attractive item. S & T was capably handled by Bernard Boycott.

5 July – Quarterly General Meeting day with quite a lot of housekeeping business to be discussed/resolved including a report on progress regarding the proposed relocation of our club meeting room – preliminary at this stage. S & T was presented by Ian Barclay.

12 July – Today's presentation was given by Ian Barclay on his approach & method to making pens together with a detailed explanation of a number of the most popular mechanisms available. Ian then proceeded to create a pen incorporating a detailed commentary of the stages involved & details of his popular styles/designs. Only a small tabling of S & T items critiqued by one of our newer members Rob Shannon.

19 July – Today was Ian Barclay's "Hands On" day as a follow up to his presentation from last week with members present charged with creating a pen of their individual finished design with Ian providing a range of mechanisms & wood blanks. The usual enthusiastic participation from those present & overall good results. As normal, no S& T today.

26 July – Housekeeping early session to bring members up to date with the sudden death of Joe Hegney, which shocked all, together with co-ordinating transport for those intending to attend the funeral in Bunbury. Also a briefing to members unable to attend last Saturdays meeting at Bateman regarding formation of a Men's Shed in that area & which has been SUGGESTED may be our new meeting place sometime in the future. Brian Fowlie then took the lathe & proceeded to demonstrate his technique for creating four "FOUR SIDED" (?) bananas utilizing inside/out & off set turning techniques & later a turned apples , S & T was undertaken by Tom Patterson.

2 Aug – Today the lathe was taken by Les Small who demonstrated his approach to creating a small wooden letter opener/paper knife – a simple easily achieved project with an item suitable for gift presentation. S & T was a small tabling with the critique undertaken by James Murray.

9 Aug – Group Annual General Meeting day with a change in the majority of Office Bearers & Group Committee with all key positions filled. Bernard Boycott was unanimously elected as Group Convenor for the coming twelve months. David Rechter presented a comprehensive report on the situation in respect to proposed Group Meeting room planned to commence early

in the new year with a great number of discussions with the Melville Council to be undertaken during the intervening period. At the conclusion of the meeting one of our newer members , John Quartermaine, gave an address on his life from birth to retirement & getting vaccinated with the woodturning virus which he admits he is enjoying immensely. S& T was presented by Milton Rundle.

16Aug – Monthly "Hands on" day with the selected item being for members to replicate the Letter Opener demonstrated by Les Small on 2/08. The challenge was enthusiastically taken up by the members in attendance with all finishing the project within time & some even applying a lacquer finish to their item. WELL DONE! No S & T today.

### Swan Snippets

Show and tell continues to grow with new members bringing in some of their work. Many other items of interest including tools are also displayed for discussion.

For the benefit of those who didn't attend the weekend workshop, Ian Moss demonstrated an offset bowl with embellishments of dremel work and colour. This was achieved by use of a wooden block, screw chuck, hot melt glue, skill and humour.

Bruce Shephard showed us how to make a small square-edged bowl. He stressed the need to have the blank square & to carefully mark the centres to ensure that the final bowl will have symmetrical edges & spaces between the bowl & the sides. Initially the blank was mounted on a screw chuck & the bottom and spigot turned. Reversing the blank the top was carefully trued-up using a scraper to cut from centre outwards to avoid damaging the corners. The bowl was hollowed & the piece reverse chucked using Cole jaws to remove the spigot& tidy up the base.

Joe Clark demonstrated a lidded bowl. How to hold the wood blank with the use of spigots each end and how to part off the top from the bowl allowing for a nice snug fit between the finished top and bowl was demonstrated. The finish was interesting with lines covering both sections. Ideas for embellishment are often obtained through woodturning magazines.

The construction of a drinks trolley was explained by Allen Murten. A lovely trolley was presented and pulled apart for Allen to explain how to assemble the item. With a set of turned legs it was then explained how to drill the holes for the dowel joints ready for fitting together and gluing. Finally how to clamp the item together with correct angles was shown.

The dirty old banksia nut was the wood of choice by Bruce Shephard for his bud vase demonstration. With the use of a spade bit the inner tube fitted snug. A jarrah neck and stand finished off this most attractive item.

Don Clarke entertained us with the making of coasters and storage box. A wooden block covered with nonslip material was used to hold the timber steady on the lathe. To reverse the work Don used a ring in his large chuck. The ease with which Don produced a coaster and the ability to reproduce replicas was shown. Don's homemade Rose Engine Lathe enabled a router to cut very interesting patterns resulting in repetitive and consistent patterns. The sides of the storage box were embellished using a Robert Sorby Spiralling tool.

A natural edged bowl was demonstrated by Richard Barkman. How to hold your selection of wood to enable you to get both walls of the bowl level and how to hold your item on the lathe was explained. Fast speed and sharp tools made light work of the corners of the log. Making an indent in a jam chuck in which to place the foot of the bowl for gluing and reversing made the hollowing a simple experience.

Chris Allen gave a lively demonstration on how to mark out a hexagon on a 100mm diameter blank ~ 40mm thick & turn a tea light holder. The drawing for this was made by Richard Barkman (see DL 040). He stressed the need for accuracy to ensure that the 6 points were evenly spaced. He used a chuck with pin jaws to hold the top of the item allowing the bottom to be turned.

Following Richard Barkman's recent demonstration, Joe Clark showed his way of making a natural edged bowl. Differences included the use of a chuck screw to hold the blank while forming the bottom spigot, cutting off the corners of the blank and using a live cone centre in the tail stock, with the centre point removed. This creates a circular indent in the base which allows re-chucking when the foot is turned, without a pointed mark which needs to be removed. (There is always more than one way to make an item)
