



STEPHEN HUGHES.

Western Australian turners have been fortunate over the last three weeks in having Stephen Hughes, one of Australia's leading turners and teachers of craft, conducting workshops and demonstrating.

Stephen was born in Melbourne in 1958 and grew up there having been educated at St Joseph's Primary and St Kevin's Secondary schools in Toorak. In 1980, he completed a four year Bachelor of Education at Melbourne State College. He majored in Woodcraft under the tuition of Vic Wood. Stephen is a full time teacher, having started at Lavers Hill and presently at Karingal Secondary College in Frankston, Victoria. Despite his full time teaching commitments, he has found time to promote not only his own wood turning skills, but to assist in advancing the craft of woodturning in Australia and in the United States. His first exhibition was as part of a group in his final university year and his first solo exhibition was held in 1985 and was called "Decorative Woodware" and presented at the Craft Centre in Toorak.

Stephen is known world wide for his use of huon pine together with a combination of timbers such as jarrah, blackboy and sheoak. He also uses such other materials as beads, amber, stained glass, semiprecious stones, turquoise, jade etc. Latterly, Stephen has tended to concentrate on carving to enhance turned pieces in some of his major works.

Ninety five percent of his production is one off pieces of art varying in price from \$200 to \$30000. Fifteen major works have been sold in the USA and eight in Japan. This gives some indication of his reputation as a quality turner.

Other activities in his busy life include editor of the turning section of "Wood Review", judging at shows and demonstrating as he did at the World Turning Conference in Wilmington, Delaware, USA. While there, he also attended a symposium at Bucks Country and another at Brigham Young University, Salt Lake City, Utah which was organised by Dale Nash. He has been invited back to the United States to demonstrate at their Annual Conference this year.

This is Stephen's third trip to WA and he has conducted workshops at Midland, Denmark, Albany and Bunbury and also judging at the Denmark competition. For those fortunate enough to participate in these workshops the experience is invaluable.

Stephen is married to Mary and they have a daughter Ruby aged 11 months. They live on a 3/4 acre block in Mordiallac where Stephen has an excellent workshop attached and an adjoining shed to house an extensive collection of timbers including substantial quantities of his beloved huon pine.

All West Australian turners thank Stephen for the time spent here, for his enthusiasm and great teaching ability. They also wish him well in his future endeavours.

SOLAR TIMBER KILN CONSTRUCTED IN KALGOORLE-BOULDER.

Kalgoorlie-Boulder's developing specialty timber industry has received a boost with the construction by Timbers of the Goldfields owner Phil Panton, in co-operation with CALM and GSTIG, of a solar timber drying kiln.

The kiln was constructed with a \$25000 grant, approved under the Federal Government's Renewable Energy Research Program, by Simon Crean, the Minister for Primary Industries and Energy. The grant was obtained with the assistance of Kalgoorlie Federal Member Graeme Campbell. The award winning solar kiln technology was developed by the Department of Conservation and Land Management at the Harvey Wood Utilisation Research Centre (HWURC). It is now commercially available and being installed at various timber producing locations throughout Australia.

The solar kiln technology has been demonstrated and proven in the South West of WA where it has been shown to be very cost and energy efficient for small sawmillers. Construction of the kiln in Kalgoorlie-Boulder will permit research to be extended into a semi-arid, more solar efficient area and permit essential seasoning research on Goldfields timbers.

A research project involving Phil Panton, GSTIG, CALM, GEDA and the Kalgoorlie College is being developed. The research will involve seasoning of Goldfields timbers using the kiln, running the kiln, monitoring results and basic timber properties research on a range of Goldfields timber species. The kiln will be automatic, computer run and continually monitored with constant automatic recording of climate so results can be published in the future.

Background. For several years the Goldfields regional office of CALM has been promoting the development of a specialty timber industry for the Goldfields. This potential industry would be based on resource from the extensive regrowth and uncut Eucalypt woodlands surrounding Kalgoorlie-Boulder and the wide range of unique timbers available from throughout the pastoral and desert areas.

Results from a range of ongoing research and trials have been encouraging and this led to the formation of the GSTIG Inc. with the aim of further promotion and development of an industry.

Construction of the solar kiln allows the specialty timber industry to progress to the next phase, which is to overcome timber seasoning and processing problems. Once further research and development has solved some of the unique local timber seasoning problems, the industry has potential to scale upwards using the kiln in a commercial sense to provide a reliable, seasoned, marketable product.

Moisture in timber is a major problem, especially in Goldfields timbers which are difficult to dry without splitting. To minimise the splitting, timber has to dry very slowly.

To solve problems and speed up drying, CALM developed the new solar powered wood drying system. The kiln has a double shell of soft, inflatable, UV-resistant plastic. This forms an insulated solar collector. The controlled air inside can be separately heated and humidified according to the needs of the timber at different stages of drying. Large fans blow air through and around the stacks of timber, drying them evenly.

The stacks are covered by a patented blanket, and by adjusting the fans, the curtain filters, or fogger water sprays, any splitting or checking can be minimised. The wood can be inspected at any time simply by unfastening the Velcrosealed door and stepping inside. And the heat comes from the sun – free !!

This innovative system dries wood cheaply, quickly and evenly, and even the smallest sawmill can afford it.

SANDING TABLE.


Alan France. This is an easy to make and accurate performing sanding table to add to your lathe accessories. The dimensions given suit a Woodfast lathe, but could be modified to your machine.


Requirements.

180 x 50 x 50 jarrah (or any hardwood) 100 x 110 x 16 M.D.F. 38 x 10 gauge c/sunk head woodscrew.

Procedure.

- 1. Drill a 5mm (13/64") hole through the centre of the M.D.F. and c/sink to suit head of the woodscrew.
 - 2. Mount the jarrah piece between centres and turn a spindle 135 long x 25 dia. This should be a neat fit in the toolrest post.
 - 3. Produce a flat or slightly concave end on the remaining 50 x 50 part.
 - 4. Drill a 3.5mm (9/64") hole 40 deep on the same end. (I use a nova chuck to hold the spindle end to drill in the lathe).
 - 5. Screw the parts together.
