


HANDY HINT

BACKING PAD MATS USED FOR SANDING, similar to scouring pads used in the kitchen.

Since I have been turning, I have always used the thrown away stripping pads used on most commercial polishers. They are very soft to use and are most durable. If a woodie knows of School Cleaners etc, they would gladly give them to you as their used ones are usually thrown in the rubbish. Simply rinse them in hot water, dry and cut into appoximately 4" squares. An normal 18" diameter pad cut into portions will last the average turner over six months.



RON GOODSON

R on has been a member of WAWA since the second meeting. Well known for his many demonstrations, particularly on aids to decorative turning such as Jacobean twist and carving with turning. He is also well known for his grandfather clocks which entail carpentry and joinery, turning and carving plus the fitting of the clock works.

Ron's great grandparents came to WA in 1842 arriving at Australind on the "Trustee". Ron was born at Wellington Mills in the South West of WA where his father was assistant manager. They moved to Mornington Mills, but the Great Depression of the early 1930's forced closure of the mills. His father then bought a dairy farm at Harvey. Ron worked with his father on the dairy farm and combined this with small building work until the outbreak of World War II.

Ron joined the 2/10th Armoured Regiment and served in Grant and Stuart tanks as a wireless operator gunner. By the end of the war he had obtained his commission.

Under the post war rehabilitation scheme, he completed a course in carpentry and joinery and then worked as a journeyman for some eight years. During this time, he bit by bit, made 13500 cement bricks (due to the shortage of cement this took some time), with which he built his own home in Harvey. This home was eventually sold to the Medical Department and is still in use as the residence of the Harvey Hospital Secretary.

Ron's first wood lathe was made by an aircraft fitter and turner in Harvey. It was exceptionally well made and is very likely still in use after many years of service.

Ron next decided to undertake academic studies and, after obtaining his leaving certificate, joined the Education Department as a Manual Arts teacher on supply. In 1958 he graduated from Claremont Teachers College and was posted back to Harvey Agricultural Senior High School where he taught for eight years.

In 1966 Ron applied for and was granted a Colombo Plan appointment to the Singapore Training College. Together with other Plan officers, he supervised the installation into 17 secondary schools of the \$4,000,000 worth of machinery supplied by the Australian Government. He then initiated a training scheme for Singaporean teachers to use this equipment.

After returning to Australia he taught at various Metropolitan Schools until appointed to the Nedlands Teachers College of Advanced Education later to become part of the Edith Cowan University. Under his stewardship, many mature age students with industrial experience were trained to become Manual Arts Teachers.

During this time he attended a Plastics course at Norwood Senior High School in Adelaide with the aim of introducing plastics into WA Schools through the Teacher Training Scheme.

Ron initiated courses in Freeform, Wood Carving, Marquetry and Wood Turning. He compiled the associated text books to complement these courses. At Nedlands, In-Service courses were run to re-inforce these subjects and to assist their introduction into secondary schools. After 14 years as a lecturer in Woodworking subjects, Ron retired. Sadly, Manual Arts is no longer given the emphasis he believes it deserves.

Ron is greatly respected in WAWA as both a demonstrator and as one who is only too happy to share his vast knowledge and experience with any who care to ask. An expert in sharpening tools, he has appeared in a video produced by WAWA and this is available on loan to members who wish to learn more of this important part of woodturning or woodworking.

He greatly enjoys the social and practical aspects of our Association and his contribution is greatly valued.

KENWICK GROUP WEEKEND WORKSHOP.

KENWICK staged a happy and successful weekend activity over 16–17th March in their new building at Cooper Avenue. It all started when we applied for a grant from the Gosnells Shire for skill development. Thanks to the good submission put in by our Convenor, Peter Dessent, we obtained sufficient money to fund the cost of the demonstration and administration with the help of a very modest entry fee.

Vaughan Richmond conducted a full day workshop and demonstration on Saturday, with plenty of hands-on opportunities. These were enthusiastically taken up by our attentive audience. He worked through all the stages of turning – thin bowls, using hot melt glue, chucking in various modes. This was followed by gold and copper leafing as well as the use of acrylics to add colour. Fifty five attended.

Sunday at 9 am we had 45 attentive members and visitors ready to be enlightened by Peter Lowe on the art of making and decorating closed forms and platters. Peter took us through all the stages of turning the items, with hands-on opportunities at particular stages of the work.

It was especially interesting to see the way he uses the router to remove the bulk of the waste wood before carving the details of the design. The use of colour followed by carving through the paint layers was most effective.

Sunday afternoon was spent most entertainingly with Viv Paust nominally on the subject of Doughnut Turning. Not only did we get an exciting demonstration of the process and a good indication of its wide potential, we also enjoyed the good humour of a very popular demonstrator.

Viv also gave us a very thought provoking talk on his two months work helping Timorese youth develop woodworking skills. This gave us some insight into the conditions in which they are working and the warmth of their friendship.

Thankyou Viv, Peter and Vaughan for your efforts. They were very rewarding.
