



Demonstrating for the first time at the Wandi weekend I was understandably nervous. I had decided early on that I would find something a little different and as I had not seen the ring gouge used or demonstrated in my 4/5 years with WAWA I felt this would be of interest. The demonstration started slowly but picked up after giving a short history on the tool, and then discussing the design faults and showing how the tool was sharpened and the use both inside and on the outside of the timber (I was making an egg cup). At this stage the demonstration was interupted by a prominent member of WAWA who took over the lathe and the audience to show the use of another tool to get just as good a cut. The point of my demonstration was not to show the best tool or the best way to make a cut, but to offer something a little different to those members who were interested by using a tool which is frowned on by the "experts" and to suggest that the ring gouge can be used to effect in some areas.

The interuption caused me some embarassment and because of this I will not be offering to demonstrate again.

SHEOAK SHEOAK TONS AND TONS OF IT

As many members of the association know we were recently offered a quantity of sheoak at a very reasonable cost. I know it wasn't a good time of year for milling timber, but it was offered on a take it or it will be burnt basis. I think any selfrespecting turner would hate such a valuable resource go up in smoke. With only a matter of a few days notice a decision was made to purchase the logs by the WAWA Committee, which I think we should all support, the one real problem we had was to find a place to have logs deliverd to. Rod Pattinson's name sprung to mind, as he has a 10 acre block in Wandi. A couple of phone calls later and all was arranged. The timber was duly delivered, now came the hard part, getting the timber cut up into usable size slabs and out of the sun. More phone calls by Committee members and group convenors, and a working party was organised. After three days of hard work the job was done. We managed to salvage well over half of the timber by weight which in not bad for sheoak.

Now to the main point of my letter. Many thanks to all of the volenteers who turned up to help out, the cutters, the sealers, the lifters, some of whome came from as far as Bunbury, and Busselton.

NOTICE OF A SPECIAL GENERAL MEETING. BUNBURY 20th FEB.12-45pm

In accordance with Clause 34 of the constitution the President has convened a Special General Meeting of The Woodturners Association of Western Australia Inc. The meeting will be held at the Soccor Drome, Bunbury, on Saturday 20th February 1999 commencing at 12-45pm. The business of the meeting will be to discuss the amendment of Clause 25 of the Constitution.

PREAMBLE:

The Constitution of the Associationn itself does not specifically empower the creation of Groups. However, it could be construed that Clause 25 of the constitution, particularly the words...."a group formed under the auspices of the Association" does in fact formalise the creation of Groups.

The Committee of Management are of the opinion that the establishment and conduct of the activities of Groups are best managed by the Policy on Groups. The policy is contained in the Association's Handbook and revised from time to time by the Committee of Management. Clause 25 of the Constitution prohibit a Convenor or Group Leader from serving a term of office in excess of two years consecutively. There are currently two Convenors acting in contravention of this Clause. It appears that if these people were to step down then there is a possibility that the groups concerned would fold. The Committee of Management are of the opinion that it is not in the best interests of Groups, the Association nor its members that such action be taken. We should not allow any breach of the Constitution to continue. The Committee of Management therefore recommends the adoption of the following:

- 1. That the existing Clause 25 be deleted.
- 2. The insertion of a new Clause 25 to read:

The President of the Association shall not serve in that position for a term in excess of two (2) years consecutively but is not precluded from serving more than one such term.

PROFILE OF A TURNER.....

John Lillywhite

Born 77 years ago into a West. Aust. Farming community, John spent his early youth at Cadoux. He left school to help with fencing contracts to minimise the effects of the Depression on the familly. In 1941 he joined the A.I.F. and was in active service in the Middle East and North Africa (El Alamein). On returning to Australia John was sent for training in Queensland and again was engaged in active service in New Guinea where he was wounded and later invalided out of the Army.

Returning to civilian life John did a short stint at farming and later worked in Boddigton at the Extraction Plant where he studied steam engine driving for his First Class Certificate. Hettie arrived in town and into his life. They were married in 1950 and raised 2 girls and 1 boy. On leaving Boddington John worked for the S.E.C. (Western Power) for 31 years, most of it on shift work.

John's community work included - helping at South Fremantle to improve working conditions at the Power Station, President of the Parents Committee in Sea Scouts, had involvement with Y.M.C.A.projects and for Y'smen (service club of the Y.M.C.A.) In conjuction with Harry Norman organised and directed Christmas Tree Sales over a 25 year period.

On retirement, travel had first priority - exploring Australia and New Zealand, visiting relatives in Canada, U.S.A. and friends in England and Europe.

John was introduced to woodturning by Ern Margetts in 1985 and in that year discovered The Woodturners Assoc.of W.A. After night school lessons and W.A.W.A. hands on workshops, he produced more items than his relatives could handle, his specialities being wooden bowls and table lamps, so John assisted at the first shopping centre woodturning demonstration and sales at Melville Shopping Centre. From this evolved his ability to direct operations and more so to persuade and interest shopping centre management to allow space for woodturners to demonstrate and sell.

Since Melville club's inception John has continuously held the position of Treasurer, has taught classes at Melville for 4 years and served 2 years as a Committee Member for W.A.W.A.

NOTES FROM THE WOODSHED

The nature of our native timber resourses is changing as the supply of old growth trees is rapidly depleted. Around the world, timber for construction of dwellings is increasingly coming from fast growing plantation timbers which have properties often very different from those of the virgin forests of the same species. Particularly changes in strength, durability, shrinkage and growth stresses demand changes in our techniques for processing the juvenile wood and how it is used. We as wood turners are largely insulated from the problems that face industrial users in that we don't need long lengths and the features which we seek are shunned by industry as defects. To cope with the changing properties, industry has turned to reconstitution in order to turn small fast grwing trees into a range of products like particleboard, medium density fibreboard (MDF), scrimber, flakeboard and oriented strand board (OSB) these processes not only destroy the natural appearance of the wood but also consume a great deal of energy and glue in their manufacture. Peeling of small logs with spindleless lathes has also been perfected and will produce large section laminated veneer lumber (LVL) products.

Peeling or slicing of decorative veneers which are then used to overlay the reconstituted boards is the most common way of mimicking the old growth solid wood products but none of the above produce suitable blanks for the wood turner. Glue-lam beams are laminated from small boards and although they make suitable wood turning blanks, by law (Australian Building Code) structural products must have resorcinol or phenol formaldehyde glues which are all very dark in colour. To make decorative (not structual) laminated beams with colourless glue, is likely to be cost prohibitive. Wood turners in Australia will always be able to display our magnificent old growth wood features because much of our native forests are being managed in perpetuity. We should understand and leart about wood properties in order to make the maximum value from an invaluable resource.

PURCHASE OF SHEOAK TIMBER

Dissapointment has been expressed by a number of members regarding the above project and the distribution thereof. The offer was received, and accepted, as the timber was being removed from a mining lease site in the Pinjarra Area. Details at the time were rather vague but if the offer was not taken up the timber would have been felled, stacked and burnt on site. Things moved quickly with the entire operation happening much earlier than anticipated resulting in delivery at the nominated Wandi site (necessary to comply with CLAM requirements restricting the distance it could be transported from the original location under the arrangements made). Fortunately a group of willing members, armed with the necessary equipment and knowledge to cut it to manageable sizes, rallied quickly to minimise deterioration.

Distribution was undertaken in the most practical manner under the circumstances and apologies are extended to any interesed members who missed out.

However the excise is considered to have been completed satisfactorily given the overall circumstances involved and thanks are extended to the band of helpers who willingly provided equipment and advise for cutting the logs.
