





As some of you may know, The South Pacific Woodturners Symposium is being held in Auckland, New Zealand from May 7th to 9th this year. Three of the main demonstrators are from Australia one from Victoria and two from New South Wales. You may have noticed, not one demonstrator from W.A. I will be attending the Symposium being held this year in Auckland, and have been invited to address the Committee of the National Association of Woodturners New Zealand Inc. on the advantages of closer co-operation between our groups. STEATITE OF JADE WOOD: I suppose a lot of you read about it as I did, and my curiosity got the better of me. I am referring to the article in the English magazine "Woodturning" of July 1998 No 65 page 11. "A wood that turns like stone" that is Steatite or Jade wood. It is a type of soapstone which is a soft rock composed mostly of the mineral talc. An item selling in England and coming from WA just had to be followed up. Many phone calls later, lots of "I don't knows" I finally found a bloke who not only knew about it but could get some for me. I arrived at his place and was shown a trailer full of the stuff. Black and green was the predominate colour and a mixture of these colours in some pieces. I made a bowl, it turned quite well considering that it was "experimental". It was glued to a face plate and turned at 65 rpmm, I was not game to go faster at this stage. After turning, it was sanded with 120 g paper then steel wool for a final finish. But, be warned, after the first couple of cuts on the steatite, your lathe and surrounding area will look as though a blizzard has just passed through. White powder every where. Some people may say that this is not wood and should not be included in "wood" turning, Perhaps they are right but is something that adds a new dimension to your turning. 

PROFILE OF A TURNER.....

Robin Halbert

Robin grew up on a farm in Cunderdin. Went to primary school at a little hush school erected by parents of the pupils but staffed by the Education Department. He attended Wesley College as a boarder for five years and left after obtaining his leaving certificate.

While at school, Robin started a merino stud which is still operating today after fifty three years. He went home on the farm and was active in what then was known as the Junior farmers. Won two trips to the Eastern States and in 1953, was selected to do six months exchange in the United States. Last year Robin made a nostalgic trip back to the places he had been in during 1953. Robin was State President of Juniors Farmers in 1955. He went farming on his own account in Tammin and in partnership with his mother at Doodlakine on part of her property.

At school Robin had always liked accountancy and in 1970 he enrolled full time at what was the W.A.I.T. (now Curtain University) and qualified as an accountant while still running the farm. Originally he thought that the qualification would be useful in the changes he saw happening in agriculture. As it happened, the opportunity arose to go into public practice and has been there ever since.

When their youngest son decided to go farming, they sold out in Tammin and Doodlakine and bought a property at Eneabba. There was still 5000 acres to clear and it gave him the opportunity to achieve a great deal on his own.

For eighteen years Robin was on the Council of Penross College, and for some years as Treasurer and later as Chairman. Robin greatly enjoyed being involved with education at that level. Robin's introduction to woodturning came about through his friendship with Keith Johnson and Len Nicholls. While he has little enough time to do a great deal of turning, Robin finds it most enjoyable and sometimes even relaxing. He greatly appreciates the companionship at the weekend workshops and the many friends in different fields that he has made since being involved with W.A.W.A. Robin was Editor of our newsletter for a number of years.

SHAVINGS FROM THE COMMITTEE (FEBRUARY 99)

CHUCK WAGON EQUIPMENT:

It has been decided to purchase a reamer (No 2 MT 10 TPI) and also a 30mm tap as additional chuck wagon equipment. These items are to stay with the chuck wagon – but be available to custodial group members during the month it is being stored by the group, but must be returned at the time the chuck wagon is passed on to the next group.

These items will be handy for cleaning/maintenance of items having a No 2 MT and also enable members to produce supplies of wooden faceplates for their use.

FIRST AID KITS AND FIRE EXTINGUISHERS:
