Presidential Pronouncement

This is my first Presidents report to the AGM and it gives me the utmost pleasure to report what I believe has been in the most part a very successful year for the Association.

This is due in no small part to support I have received from the Committee of Management. Although small in number all of the committee has worked tremendously hard on behalf of the Association. We have tried at all times to be transparent in our deliberations and report conscientiously to our members. The Committee is charged with working in the best interests of the membership, giving back to the membership where we can but at the same time maintaining fiscal responsibility.

For this reason we started the year off with a group officials meeting with 10 of the 12 groups attending. At this meeting we set out what we hoped to achieve for the year 2011-2012. And sought the approval of the groups to proceed with our plans. The groups responded unanimously in favour of changes to the Fee payment System and the method of funding the equipment requirements of groups. The fee payment system worked very well with few hiccups and will continue this year. We have managed to hold the fees at \$50 per year despite increased costs. We have completed our forward budget for the coming year and it is hoped that the Financial Dividend payable in early November will be about \$12.00 or better per financial member.

In continuing our determination to move forward plans are under way for another Group officials meeting in November to discuss the future directions for the Association. Already underway also are plans to run a Demonstrators Course in February next year. We also intend to bring International Turner Eli Avisera to Wandi next year and plans to do so are well advanced. His presence will be for the benefit of all members. I thank Gordon Ward for his initiative for this coup. Also in the pipe-line is a visit by Richard Raffan.

After much investigation and consideration a new lathe stage was finally purchased and we hope it will last for many years to come.

The Association Christmas function was a great success with a wonderful display of toys both wood and knitted made by members and their partners for distribution to disadvantaged children. The function was enjoyed by all who attended.

My thanks go to the Shopping Centre Group who throughout the year promotes woodturning to the public and whilst it enables them to sell their turnings, it is also source of income to the Association. I acknowledge the work done by Groups, the backbone of the Association who are also out in the public domain promoting woodturning.

Numbers at Weekend Workshops has fallen away this year and this worrying trend will be discussed at our Group meeting in November. Demonstrating is not an easy task and a vote of thanks is in order for those who have shared their talents and skills with us, some more than once. Our thanks also to the behind scenes members who month after month contribute to make Workshops the success that they are. They include the audio visual personnel (Alan and Barry), the librarians (Ted and Elaine), and in the past George and Myrtle, door staff, the competition guru John Mason, and of course those wonderful ladies who labour away unseen in the kitchen.

It is disappointing to report that Membership numbers are down this year by 34 to 513; this was caused mainly by a reduction in new membership from 70 in 2009/2010 to 42 in 2010/2011. It is noteworthy that the groups participating in public events recruited better than those who did not.

Despite a very slow and worrying start the Wood Show Competition was extremely successful with a large number of high quality entries in all levels making the Judges task most difficult and also an excellent display of member's best items.

I close my report by thanking you the members for your encouragement during the year, the members of the Committee, in particular the Treasurer George Sharpe and the Secretary Sheila Carlile who cannot be with us today due work commitments.

Weekend Workshop Observations

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT WEEKEND WORKSHOP 6th AUGUST 2011

The workshop was quite well attended although numbers were down a little maybe the recent cold mornings stopped people from coming out.

The MC, John Gardiner welcomed everyone and also mentioned that the Committee did more than sit around a table together, they could actually perform wood turning. This morning was an opportunity to "road test" the newly acquired stage unit with the demo lathe in position.

First up was Derek Beer who gave a demonstration of turning a wooden bottle stopper. Derek used an aluminium mandrel to hold the blank in place to perform the task of shaping. This took us through to morning tea time with everyone enjoying the spread provided.

Alan Roberts was next to the demo stage to show how to turn a three sided box from a cube shape of timber. Alan described how the piece was prepared with the corner of the cube as a pivot point between two drive centres. He then proceeded to shape the outside after making a spigot on the end. The job piece was then reversed so that the middle could be hollowed out. Alan had several previous examples of different shapes and styles to hand out amongst the audience. This was followed by the Presidents Forum to bring attention to activities within the Association.

Lunch break was taken with a choice of a hamburger or sausage sizzle to sustain us for the afternoon session. During this time Bruce Jackson from Mandurah had a trailer full of wood turning blanks for sale and Rod and Debbie Cocks had a stall selling a variety of turning products.

The next demo was performed by John Gardiner who was going to show how to make a scalloped platter in Jarrah timber. The blank had a hardwood spigot screw fixed to one side to enable easy mounting in the chuck. This spigot was later removed when the inside was hollowed out. Once the outside shape was formed complete with a small bead and spigot on the base, John said that in the words of Rudi Goh, "I'm happy with that". Normally the outside would be power sanded and treated with sanding sealer ready for the finishing lacquer or oil. When the job piece was reversed in the chuck, the removable spigot was unscrewed and partial hollowing was done. John deliberately left the rim quite thick to allow for the hollowing to be done. The next step was to setup a vertical metal post over the lathe bed onto which the router could fit and rotate around the post. Using the spindle index, 20 scalloped faces resulted around the rim of the platter. On the inner edge of the scallops a small

bead was made to divide and enhance between the scallops and the inside edge. Again the comment was "I'm happy with that". John then hollowed out the inside shape using a round cutter and followed with a negative rake scraper. The job piece was taken from the lathe and handed out to the audience. A valuable question and answer session followed that took us up to afternoon tea time.

John Mason then conducted the competition results. There were five entries in the advanced category, three in intermediate and four in novice. The standard of entries was excellent and congratulations must go to all who entered.

The last item for the day was the raffle for two food hampers. One winner said he was looking forward to the roast leg of lamb.

"Stand In" Roving Reporter

WANDI GROUP WEEKEND WORKSHOP AND ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Master of Ceremonies Rod Cocks welcomed all to the AGM and Wandi Workshop detailing the order of procedure, facilities plus advised of wood and other items for sale. He then handed over to Alan Roberts to conduct the AGM.

The AGM proceeded as per agenda and recorded by Doris Martin. Highlights included the Presentation of a Certificate of Appreciation to Doris Martin and Life Memberships to Brian Fowlie and Viv Paust.

A presentation was given on prostate awareness by Trenton Jones Men's Health Ambassador Speaker for the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia. Trenton a cancer sufferer himself who explained the problem and the various treatments available. He urged members to have regular testing for early detection of the condition.

After morning tea Chris Smith was introduced to demonstrate turning a long stem box. Chris had started the box and after mounting it in the chuck shaped the outside. Then using a hooked tungsten carbide tool hollowed the box starting under the lip. Chris warned that the hook must clear the tool rest otherwise a dig in will occur. He then completed the outside and the hollowing of the sides and bottom. Sufficient thickness must be allowed on the bottom to make a recess for the stem. Then changing to standard jaws chuck, he reversed the box to hold in expansion mode and finished the bottom by removing the spigot and cutting a recess for the pre made stem. Chris then checked the fit of a pre-



turned lid and glued the stem into the bottom recess, the thicker end to the top. Then changing to a chuck with pin jaws, Chris fastened a round length of pewter in the jaws, he explained how he melted down pewter trophies (supplied by Gordon Ward), and poured the liquid into a mould formed by drilling a hole with a spade bit into a piece of dry wood. Chris explained that turning pewter was like turning wood and then proceeded to turn a finial with a tungsten carbide cutter. This was then sanded to 1000 grit and polished with brasso. Chris then assembled the long stem box on a pre turned base. Not only did we see fine wood turning we also learnt about using pewter to enhance the piece.

After lunch Rod introduced Rob Jones to demonstrate the finer points on turning Jarrah burls. Rob commenced with a slideshow of items he had turned from Jarrah burls explaining each piece, he then passed around samples of his work with burls. Mounting a burl on a screw chuck and with tailstock support, he shaped the bottom of a bowl, explaining that the spigot must avoid the gum veins. Rob then super glued the gum veins on the outside of the bowl and set it aside for 24 hours to set. He then mounted a pre turned bowl burl on the lathe and finished the top and bowl recess with gouge and scraper. Rob sands the inside of the bowl before cutting the recess for the insert. He would then use compressed air to blow out the veins before sealing with lacquer, using a grey abrasive pad followed by a white to prepare the surface for spraying with Mirrortone lacquer. Rob then passed around the piece with the laser cut insert in place. Next he mounted a partly finished wide edged bowl in the chuck and tidied up the rim and bowl with gouge and scraper, ready to finish later. A question and answer session followed an informative and entertaining demonstration.

The raffles were drawn before afternoon tea, which was followed by the competition results with John Mason expressing disappointment that there were no intermediate entries. However the standard of entries received was excellent. John then announced the prize winners of the wood show competition.

Rod Cocks thanked all that participated in a very successful AGM and Weekend Workshop.

29 June Rudi Goh to demonstrate his prize winning technique in turning a cake stand. Rudi was well prepared explaining how he had used a glass cake stand as a model; he showed the glass stand and two copies he had made. The stand would be constructed with three modules a base, a stem and the top. Rudi made the base first, drilling a 35mm hole to fit the chuck jaws and later to hold the stem. Rudi then completed the base until "he was happy with that". Next he turned the stem to a pattern that he marked out and fitted into the base until "he was happy with that". The top was made in similar method to the base and after fitting to the stem, Rudi proclaimed "I'm happy with that". Judging from the applause that he received from the audience they were also happy with that. Throughout the demonstration Rudi provided a detailed explanation of his work. This was his first time and the group look forward to many more.

6 and 13 July The group worked on a four part desk tidy set.

20 July Annual General Meeting of the Gosnells Group and election of office bearers for 2011-2012 .

27 July Chris Smith to demonstrate the making of Christmas decorations by the use of inside out turning. Chris showed samples of hollow forms, icicles, Christmas trees and baubles; these were painted and decorated to make a colorful show. Chris explained that accuracy is essential as any error will multiply as you go through the various steps. First the 4 pieces of wood must be identical with all 4 sides exactly the same, these were taped together and fitted into end cups. After cutting a large cove in the centre Chris rotated and glued the pieces. He explained how he uses the ghost image to shape the outside. After completing the bauble, the job was sanded and parted off. Chris then showed how to make Christmas trees by fastening the square wood in pin jaws, and then bringing the end to a point. He then used the short point of a skew rolled down the tree, and after shaping the trunk, the tree was parted off. Chris then made some small flowers, some bells, golf tees and some more flowers to complete a very informative demonstration.

31 August. Life Member, dedicated clubman, consistent Show and Tell participant, Derek Pollard took the stage to demonstrate his considerable skills in making a Natural Edge Bowl. Derek was well prepared, bringing nine natural edged bowls in various woods and shapes that he had previously made. Derek explained each one and passed them around. He had a piece prepared with bark removed and a hole drilled to receive pin jaws, which he mounted on the lathe to cut a spigot and shape and sand the bottom. Mounting the piece by the spigot, Derek hollowed out the bowl and finished the interior by scraping and sanding. He then made a base hollowed out on top to fit the spigot. After assembly Derek passed it around. He then started another bowl, showing how to use a screw chuck. However the BBQ lunch was ready and Derek had to stop work. The demonstration generated considerable interest and Derek was pleased to answer all questions. His commentary throughout the demo provided many tips, particularly how to maintain the bark edge. Good work Derek, you have still got it.

Melville Mutterings

22 June – Today commenced with a demonstration by George Walker on creating "captive rings" –it later became singular – on a small goblet & was completed successfully. The demo was followed by a spin off of the tops produced by members following last weeks "hands on" project. The ultimate winner, following numerous changes to the rules, DURING THE EVENT was Robin Spence with a time of 2.5 minutes – very creditable. Numerous comments were made regarding whether the top was assisted by "other means" but this was not followed up. However the event was concluded when Norm Gratte announced that all tops would be confiscated & become part of our Xmas Toys pool. The day concluded with a critique on the large number of show & tell items tabled. Attendance is again nudging 50 members.

29 June - Bill Power is off overseas AGAIN shortly, so demonstrated his approach to producing an attractive candle stick from a piece of American timber acquired on one of his trips. The result was very pleasing, achieved in short time enabling him to make another in the time available. A good tabling of S & T items.

6 July – Monthly "hands on" day with the project being a natural edged goblet.. The usual good enthusiastic participation with 8 lathes working & 36 members participating, Joe Hegney on the grinder & a few "social" members. Some goblets even ended up with a captive ring on the stem. Thanks to Norm Gratte & David Rechter our lathe accessories have been collated & painted different colours, including lathes, hopefully for easier identification & matching to allotted lathes & housed in wooden boxes painted a similar colour to the accessories. Upon conclusion of activities it will be members responsibility to repack items to comply – hopefully we do not have too many members with colour deficient eyesight!!. 13 July – "Bring Your Gadgets" day. It is amazing what comes out of the "woodwork" and not to mention their applications. Quite a problem solving exercise for a number of members.

20 July – Norm Gratte demonstrated making a small attractive golf ball desk clock on a turned golf caddy stand – two in fact. An interesting project presented in the usual "Norms" attention holding manner- almost an extension of the previous week, with the jig used to hold the ball, while the hole for holding the watch insert being used.

27 July – Roy Lundy demonstrated his approach to making pedestals which involved laminating the materials & also using jigs to develop the shape. Roy admitted that it had been, as always, quite a "trial & error" process over the years – a common situation with all of us & reinforces that you must always learn/refresh earlier lessons on projects undertaken.

3 Aug – Demonstrator for the day was Dennis Kestel recruited at short notice, explained & demonstrated his method of producing banana bowls – an item that has not been covered for quite sometime.

10 Aug – Laurie Green demonstrated his self made "Bowl Saver" tool. which very effectively cut out a smaller bowl blank from another blank resulting in economies of timber materials & significantly reducing litter on the workshop floor, & effectively creating another item available for sale. Well received & generated quite a lot of discussion within Group members in attendance.

17 Aug – Monthly "hands on" day with enthusiastic members tackling production of a small lidded box. The session was preceded by a brief explanation from Norm Gratte, Roy Lundy & Joe Hegney, as to their various approaches to this project which each varied in their own unique way. Despite this, final results produced were creditable. Members are enthusiastic to these sessions which are undoubtedly broadening their knowledge and tool skills.

24 Aug – AGM day and, surprisingly, a very good attendance. The day commenced with a tribute to our member John Parker, for his long Group/Assoc membership & standard of turning. A number of John's items were on display attesting to the level he has achieved in producing a range of delicate & intriguing items which have been the subject of quite a number of discussions on his techniques.

A Certificate of Achievement was also presented to John by the Group. The meeting covered the usual range of "housework" with our new Convenor, Dennis Kestel, supported by a Committee of ten members. Thanks were unanimous to Bernie Dixon for his past two years as Group Leader. The day concluded with a light morning tea of fresh scones, jam & cream – a touch of culture.

31 Aug – Demonstrator for the day was Neil Piper showing his approach to turning a laminated specimen vase. Neil mentioned that the most time consuming part of the exercise was the lamination of the vase, followed by routing the base to produce an attractive scalloped effect where the two types of timber met. He also mentioned that he now prefers to use Titebond adhesive as recent experience has shown that the Aquahere has a tendancy to "creep". Also curing time for Titebond is shorter. A good tabling of S & T covering a variety of items.

Swan Snippets

Here we go: Tom is still away, so I am still the relieving scribe. We have a new convener for 2011 – 2012 year by the name of Ian Moss, a retired Swan TAFE lecturer in metal machining, and a turner of embellished, low profile bowls and boxes with fine turned lids with finals.

lan is also doing a lot of work with decorated and embellished, hollow-form turned containers with delicate final tops.

I finished the last newsletter with some works by Eric Walter, and will start this one with some more. Eric did a demonstration of a 200mm high, multi-piece toy soldier. The turning project is based around a jig made to hold the body parts as they are made. The jig consists of a turned 40mm x 12mm round a spindle of about 50mm in length. The with jig is used to hold most of the body parts as they are turned. Eric brought along a drawing of the parts and a completed example of the soldier that had been painted and finished. An impressive toy for the grandchildren.

Matthew, our club treasurer, did a demo of a pair of salt and pepper shakers based around a plastic insert with a screw-on chrome lid. Matt formed a curved taper from 55m down to 35m and back up to 40m. The overall length was about 70m. A 25mm hole was drilled with a forstner bit to create the centre hole for the plastic insert. A quick sand and finish with mirror-tone wipe on lacquer completed a good demo of a simple project.


Graham Bell did a project creating a seedling pot making mould. The two-piece mould, when complete, uses a small sheet of newspaper to create a light-weight seedling pot. The pot forming setup consists of a turned section about 58mm tapering to 56mm by 125mm long. The top is turned to a handle for comfort of use. The second piece is a shallow, hollowed out base into which the taper, with newspaper wrapped around it, can be pressed, which forms the pot. A very inexpensive way to make seedling containers and it works!

Ian Moss, our new convener, did a demonstration and display of hollow-form, burl turning with tall finial lids. The hollow forms were a Jarrah burl and a York gum burl, a 150mm to 180mm diameter and about the same in height. The finials were turned from a 30mm piece of Jacaranda. When finished they were ebonised and lacquered.

We held one of our demos outside our meeting rooms under an overhanging tree due to the unannounced painting of our rooms by our landlord. We moved the lathe and the tools outside and Malcolm gave a demonstration on the use of many of the standard turning tools. The 28 parrots in the trees seemed to enjoy the demo.

Last but least, Noel Moyes gave a demonstration on making a box with a spinning top as the lid. The box is 65mm round x 80mm high, hollowed with a recess to take the top as lid. Noel also used an embellishing tool made from a metal turning knurling wheel that worked well. The top was decorated with sparkling gold and silver nail polish from the \$2 bin at his local chemist.

In conclusion of this Swan Snippets, I must give a sincere thanks to Joe Clark and his committee for a job well done for the year 2010-2011.

Wandi Waffles

Hi gang, new scribe. Unfortunately Daphnie is too busy and cannot do this anymore. So here we go.

In August Graham Lewis demonstrated a 4 legged bowl. The material was green mountain Mauri with some of the bark still on. He had many examples of other 4 legged bowls out of other materials, and most he had turned green. Using pyromaniac demonstration we had a spectacular blue light from the flames produced by the turps painted on the outside and then the inside. By soaking over night, a drying out effect will work too. There was number of hand tools, including the sand plate produced by Sandvik in the old days. He demonstrated how using cut off strips of bicycle tyres, helped protect your work on the chuck. The Black and Decker power file did an amazing job, and the hand tools finished it of.

In July Ron Yates demonstrated the technique of overlaying in lay in a lidded box. Even showed how to repair a mistake. The results were a beautiful lidded bowl. Hard to describe his jigs but there are photos of the demonstration and tools at Wandi, as is for all the demonstrations described here. Also photos of the items brought in by others. Ron described a number of different ways of making this jig, and others to suit anything your heart desired, for doing this and similar projects. Ron's jigs and tools remind you of the ingenuity of our older generation, who didn't have the Bunnings and internet to tap into others work.

Also in July Allan Roberts demonstrated an unusual 3 sided bowl. This is impossible to describe how he did it without the diagram now on the wall at Wandi. We did need a bucket to catch the flying objects, so make sure your reflexes are quick when you attempt it. As with all our demonstrators they bring along so many handy designed tools to share with the others. Allan's sanding block works so easily.

In August Bob Malacari showed how he does his copying turning. The key seemed to be take less off

more often, or you will take off too much. Use sharp pencils to mark. Leave things 0.5mm to 1mm bigger so you don't take too much off. See photos at Wandi. We also had a discussion on the inside out turning. Cannot wait for that, for I got very confused, and it was obvious by my blank looks.

Thanks to all the demonstrators and members who bring along items to discuss. This helps us newies heaps. Not that we take it all in, but eventually we will. Catch you around.

Joondalup/Wannerso Journal

At our July meeting, Jim Waters demonstrated a single tier cake stand in preparation for our August comp. He showed the completed stand in Show and Tell in August after he had tamed its efforts to emulate a flying saucer in his workshop. Viv made some general comments on the design of cake stands, which prompted some discussion, in particular, if a cake stand should have a raised rim or not.

Doug McD followed with a follow-up demo on his w/e workshop review of the skew. He suggested that the new blue high speed grinding wheels are the best he has used, running cooler than the white Al oxide wheels. He showed us a 54J wheel (54 is the grit size and J the bonding material strength A=hard – Z=soft). Looking on the web I see that the blue wheels are made from microcrystalline Al oxide in which the grit particles consist of many small crystals while in the white wheels each grit grain is a single crystal. The polycrystalline wheels last longer, require less dressing and run cooler, but needless to say, are more expensive. Norton recommend their "I" hardness for high carbon tool steel and "K" hardness for HSS, so I guess Doug's J is probably the best all rounder.

Doug also presented some data that claims there is no evidence that the use of camphor laurel for food contact is harmful, although long contact (as in a pepper grinder) or contact with moist foods is likely to affect the flavour of the food. A guy at the Art-n-About craft fair in Wanneroo was selling cut-ting boards made exclusively from camphor laurel, and was promoting it's anti-bacterial properties.

The July comp was for a bud vase that was judged on accuracy to a drawing and general finish. Novices: 1st Trevor Cockcroft, 2nd Ron van Velzen

Experienced: Equal 1st Tony Collins & Viv Paust, equal 3rd Graeme Draper & Ron Swarbrick.

July's hands on session was devoted to inside out turning jigs, from Gerry Q's Rolls Royce model to rough & ready.

The group had displays at the Wanneroo Art-n-About craft fair and the Malaga Craft Fair which were well patronised. Although we could not demonstrate at the Wanneroo's inside venue, we did make around \$800 in sales (mostly Tony C's stuff). I don't have the figures for Malaga.

A new committee was installed at the August Group AGM. Convenor – Charlie Totten, Deputy Convenor – Geoff Quesnel, Secretary-treasurer – Graeme Draper, Safety – Frank Visser, Committee – Andy Mc Fadyen, Tony Collins, Viv Paust.

Gerry Q demonstrated inside out turned Christmas decorations in his Rolls Royce jig, followed up by Geoff Q with some really simple to make decorations he found on the web.

Geoff Q won the cake stand competition with a marri platter and base joined by a triple spiral column in an unknown species of very hard arid area eucalypt. 2nd was Charlie Totten with a curly jarrah and Tasmanian oak stand followed by Graeme Skews Cape Lilac stand 3rd. Geoff's great piece also won awards at the August WAWA workshop.

We plan to have stalls at the Spring in the Grove fair on 6 November and at Yanchep on 13 November.

ON DEMONSTRATING

Demonstrating at our Weekend Workshops can be rewarding, fun, yet some times quite frustrating. One may consider it an honour to be asked to give a demonstration, but I often wonder if the audience really appreciates the preparation and effort that precedes the day.

A demonstrator may prove to be very popular with audiences because he tells great jokes, should this be the major criterion for judging a woodturning demonstrator's merit, or should it be a demonstrator's main focus.

Mike Darlow puts it very succinctly -

"Demonstrating is two-way: The demonstrator's primary role is to enthuse the audience, give information and usually to a lesser extent entertainment, and **to leave the audience with a forward path**. In turn the audience ideally give back to the demonstrator through their attentiveness, constructive questioning and comment, and where appropriate, laughter; they are ideally **participants** rather than just attendees".

The range of commitment, knowledge, and abilities of the attendees at our Workshops vary greatly. A demonstrator cannot hope to satisfy all equally, in part because they also vary in their reasons for attending – to be entertained, to learn, fellowship, networking, social etc. **All valid, but where does it leave the demonstrator?**

Probably the best approach in regard to a topic for a demonstration is to pitch it at a level which exceeds the skills of at least 50% of the audience. There is nothing worse than a bored audience, a factor which can often be judged by the amount of quiet conversation from the floor, whilst the demonstration takes place.

Bob Chapman- West Riding club, England -

"Demonstrators should, I think, be well-prepared with the timber, tools and equipment they need for the demonstration. Apart from the topic of a demonstration, some things are obviously better than others – watching someone hollowing a deep vase, for example, where the tool tip can't even be seen, is rather like watching paint dry and is not a lot better than a verbal description of the technique.

I do expect the demonstrator to be able to talk and turn at the same time. I want to know what's being done, and why it is being done in that particular way. A silent demonstration is like watching TV with the sound off; you get a vague idea of what's happening, but miss out on all the detail needed for a proper understanding."

There is a lot more to this topic, but I would like to highlight two issues:

- (1) With the introduction of new WAWA equipment, which is larger and heavier, a demonstrator's own personal equipment is not always compatible- *thread on the head stock, tool rests, swing of the lathe for attachments, etc.*
- (2) The time allowed for a demonstrator to set up his bits & pieces before a demonstration- *I always* like to be scheduled straight after a break, in order to have time to familiarise myself with equipment and set up carefully. It is frustrating trying to establish things, when the previous person is still answering questions and clearing away at the same time with the audience waiting for the next "**Act**".
