

February competition was a walking stick (getting in practice for the WAWA workshop in Collie on March 17th). The winner was Rino Tuia, and although I wasn't present to see it personally, I'm told it was beautifully turned. Well done Rino.

Gosnells Gossip

11th Jan. The year commenced with a presentation by John Gardiner of a detailed program of the projects and activities for the year. The first project was an ogee bowl to specifications, which commenced immediately. Doug McDiarmid spoke to the group regarding WAWA's Weekend Workshop survey and sought our support.

18th Jan. Work on the ogee bowl continues.

25th Jan. Demonstration by George Kieliger, on how to make a walking stick with handle, which was the item required for Collie's Workshop. George spoke on the value of entering competitions, the

benefits to WAWA and the Group, and particularly to the individual member. He explained how he would use as a reference the pattern by Eric Walker printed on the WAWA website. This provides a firm base to try out your skills, solve production problems, and then modify to your individual requirements.

As usual George was very well prepared and started by handing out paper, pencils and rests to the members so that they could take notes. Hidden away was several examples of walking sticks in various stages of manufacture. With an 800mm length mounted on the lathe to be reduced as a taper from 20mm to 25mm diameter, with an allowance for sanding, he planned a reduction of 1mm every 160mm. A steady was essential, and George showed one that he had made. This promoted a discussion on various types of steadies. After turning the stick, George showed two that he had previously made, and how they looked after sanding. The handle was next, which involved accurate drilling and shaping so as to fit securely on the stick. He made two handles, so as to allow the members to access the method and accuracy required. These were then fitted to the stick. In summing up George stressed the need for safety, and suggested that we resist the urge to over decorate, but recommended we all have a go.

1st Feb. A round lidded box made to specifications was commenced as our next project. The ogee bowl was judged with top points awarded to Chris Davis. As Gordon Ward had being visiting our group on a regular basis, his sudden death dampened our meeting. His presence will be sadly missed. Always willing to assist with his considerable skills, and combined with his unique humour and

endless supply of jokes, he will be sorely missed by the woodturning fraternity.

8th Feb. Working on the round box.

15th Feb. We moved equipment back to our original room to meet the requirements of the college.

22nd Feb. Working on the round box.

29th Feb. Ian Eagles demonstrated how to make a Mortar and Pestle. He explained that it was a tool to crush, grind and mix solid substances. The pestle is a heavy bat shaped object, the end of which is used for crushing and grinding. The mortar is the bowl usually made of hard wood, ceramic or stone. They have being used since early Egyptian times, as documented to 1550BC. lan commenced with the pestle, stating that a plain design is best for food preparation and the finish must be foodsafe. The demonstration was aimed at novice level. and lan carefully explained the procedure from selection of the timber, marking out, safety precautions and tool handling. After turning the pestle, he explained his preferred method of finishing involved sanding to 180 grit, then sanding with shellac as a wet slurry to seal the wood. After drying, he would continue through the grits. The Mortar was next, and lan stated that the bowl must be thick and solid to sustain considerably pounding. lan provided an interesting demonstration with a lot of information, particularly aimed at our beginners.

Chris Smith judged the 17 entries of round boxes and provided a professional criteria of each entry, with Peter Povey awarded the top point score.

8th February: Norm Gratte demonstrated ways of finishing green turned timber; in this case a small bowl, which had gone out of shape and required trueing up. Norm then applied Canaubra wax finish. Overall very successful, with the finish aspect receiving the usual input from members present.

15th February: A trade presentation from Gordon Heggey on a range of Triton products recently upgraded and rereleased on to the market. Also present was Aaron Penny from Gorilla Products, who spoke on the recently released range of adhesives. He also introduced two representatives from Kinchrome, which stocks the Gorilla products

22nd February : The usual monthly "hands-on" day, with members charged with the production of bangles as demonstrated by David Rechter on 1st February. Most members, as usual, manned the lathes and proceeded to produce these items enthusiastically, but were also watching others closely with the usual good advice and humourous banter.

29th February: Guest presenter, Chris Sioulas from the Gosnells Group demonstrated his approach to making lidded boxes. Brian Kirkby demonstrated a small striking sphere-shaped container in Jacaranda, with lid and finial enhanced by a central band from a Sorby texture tool.

In Show and Tell, Viv & Tony exhibited lidded boxes in a huge variety of styles, designs and wood species.

I also note that Mirolac complies with European and Australian standards for use on domestic furniture and children's toys.

The month's demo was an experiment with Viv talking, while Andy McFadyen turned. One of the funniest demos I

have seen with some dubious coordination between them, but it was still very informative. I have managed to make my first walking stick using (I think) their methodology.

A demonstrators course, organised and run by Viv with some assistance from Doug McDiarmid, was attended by a five of our members. We look forward to some new faces demonstrating at meetings over the coming months.

We all wish Viv a speedy recovery from the surgery he will have undergone before you get to read this newsletter.

It is with considerable sadness that we note the passing of Gordon Ward, on 27th January 2012.

Gordon was a long standing member of our Association, who served on the Committee of Management for a number of terms, was always a very willing demonstrator at Groups and workshops, and a skilful instructor for many of our members through classes, and his involvement with the Dwellingup Forest Heritage Centre. He was awarded Life Membership of WAWA in 1998, as "an outstanding contributor, who had raised the technical, practical and artistic levels of the Association to new levels"

Gordon was always a colourful and worldly character, probably due to being born in China, and then educated in that country as well as Hong Kong and the UK. His professions included being a mechanical and production engineer for De Havilland Aircraft Company, a field instructor for the Simca Motor Company, a service manager for Mitsubishi Motors, and a manual arts teacher at a number of colleges in Western Australia.

Gordon's fascination in wood was not only limited to his involvement with WAWA, but also as a wood carver, membership of the Goldfields Speciality Timber Industry Group, and the Fine Woodwork Association of WA.

There isn't a member of these groups who will not miss Gordon's unusual sense of humour, his very quick wit, the numerous "accidents waiting to happen", but most importantly, his absolutely outstanding ability to manipulate a piece of

wood in to a magnificent work of art, which was often touched off with some beautiful and imaginative colourings.



The Technical Desk

Ball Cutting Jig



Recently I had reason to produce a couple of knobs or hand grips for a special router base. In the past it would have been cast aluminium and plastic as in the top left photo, but no longer having access to that equipment, it had to be from wood. Have read about a number of systems to cut a ball – Bruce Leadbeatter from Sydney demonstrated a device that replaces the tool rest in the wood lathe banjo, rough sketch as per top right diagram, and swings in the horizontal plane. The Late Ken Rex had another system that moved over the top in the vertical plane.

The following is the result of a little experimentation on my part.





As can be seen from the photograph, I have used the stem of a tool rest as pivot, the exact centre of which must be positioned directly under the centre of the ball – *locked* in position and not moved for any adjustment.

The cutting tip must also be located on centre height, which may require flat washers or the like to raise the whole jig.

In summary:

- I found it best to lock the stem post in the banjo and allow the jig to rotate on the stem.
- A home made screw chuck used to hold the work piece in order to allow the jig to rotate as far as possible to the left.
- Over all quite pleased with the result, but would like some micro adjustment of the actual cutting tool or tip, to get that final smooth finish.

The nozzle thread is compatible with some glue manufacturers containers making it possible to fit any nozzle directly to the manufacturers glue bottle.

Less comprehensive than GB-55, but just as useful is GS-114 Glue Bottle Set which includes a glue bottle and 3 interchangeable (roller, point and Napolean style) heads. Decant glue from larger bottles into this convenient size container for smaller jobs.

And whilst we are discussing glue, overcome the annoyance of dried up glue or caulking compounds in trade tubes with Twist-N-Seal Stoppers (25K80-95) supplied in 5 packs. This clever reusable plug forms a long lasting airtight seal on plastic nozzles or tubes. Made of a tough plastic composite, it inserts simply by pushing and turning. The fine screwlike threads deform the softer nozzle or tube material, so it grips securely, but removes easily by unscrewing. Dried glue or caulking does not adhere to the non-stick plastic.




Carbide Hollowing Tool
