Happy turning.



Manjimup Matters

In October we were very privileged to host Graeme Priddle at a workshop attended by sixty two fellow woodturners.

Graeme has definitely got the gift of the gab, which made the demonstration very interesting as well as informative. He told of two turners who had lost their lives by errors of judgement in their respective studio/sheds. None of us have been at it too long that we don't need a reminder about safety. It is so important, and I am sure all who attended will go home just that more aware.

Taking a piece of Sheoak, Graeme, demonstrated his technique not only of turning but also his very interesting sharpening methods. This was the beginning of a very high class act producing a piece that now sits with pride of place in our workshop. Firstly he turned the base of the bowl, virtually using just one tool.

He then formed the top, made a small hollow, and prepared to embellish it. Graeme formed a wire scroll for his pyrography and made it look easy as he embellished his piece, whilst getting an even spread over his work.

As usual our ladies, led by Dianne, providing a sumptuous spread for morning and afternoon tea, and an absolutely fabulous lunch.

Whilst the task of hosting an international turner like Graeme Priddle may seem beyond the realms of a small group like ours, we stayed focussed throughout. Editor's / Vice President's Note:

The difficulty alluded to above, in gaining WAWA's sanction for the Graeme Priddle's demonstration, was due to his lack of professional insurance coverage, which is cost prohibitive for him, once he leaves New Zealand.

The Committee of Management has previously requested that Groups ensure that all demonstrators have comprehensive accident/liability insurance. The COM has an obligation to ensure that all members in an audience at any of the Association's meetings or functions, are covered by insurance, in the event that an accident occurs. This is also just as relevant for a demonstrator, who could suffer considerable financial hardships, if they were forced to pay damages to another person at a function, following an accident.

All regular WAWA members have automatic insurance coverage, and if a guest (non-professional) demonstrator does not, it is easily overcome by the person signing up for an annual membership to WAWA. The cost of \$95 can then be paid by the Group in question, and is normally easily defrayed over the expenses of an individual workshop. It is a very cheap option for "complete peace of mind".

Unfortunately, if the demonstrator is a professional (ie. being paid for their services), then our insurance cover is not applicable, as it is specifically tailored for non-profit organizations.


LATHE CARE & MAINTENANCE

In recent times I have been asked on two occasions about the need or desirability of the leather washer on the headstock spindle.



The answer is quite simple- it is a hangover from the 'old Woodwork Teachers in High School days'. One only had to be

caught once when by accident or '**other wise**' a student turned on the lathe with the faceplate (*no fancy chuck in those days*) only partly screwed on. The result was that the work spun on with quite some force, jamming it on the spindle. Personally I have had to dismantle the whole headstock, remove the spindle or shaft and get the oxy plant to remove the face plate.



The use of a leather or 3/16 plywood washer soaked in oil gave you some chance of recovering the situation.

However, on larger diameter work, this addition can cause vibrations to occur whilst turning

The other situation where a 'washer' of some sort is necessary, is when the face plate or chuck does not seat up against the spindle flange ie. *the spindle thread is 'too long* '.

In this case the 'washer' must be **metal**.
