Gosnells Gossip

9th Jan. The first meeting in 2013 at Gosnells, and Kevin Cheetham outlined the program for the year including the group competition items, the first being a set of three candle holders. Kevin also explained the demonstrations planned. A quantity of wood had being purchased from Austim for sale to the members. Bill Wallbank showed two Streptohedrons he had made.

16th Jan. Derek Pollard showed a lidded bowl on a stand, produced from Sheoak.

23rd Jan. Alan Andrews showed a herb cutter and base, plus a square shaped mezzaluna, which provoked a discussion on food safe oils. Two cotton bud holders in Carob were shown by Stuart Heinrich, and from Peter Manchee, a lamp holder and two matching bowls, also in Carob.



30th Jan. John Gardiner gave a demonstration and talk on the Eli Avisera technique of sanding, with minimum dust and maximum finish. John spoke of the difficulty in obtaining the exact materials which Eli used, and therefore some experimenting may be necessary. However the results achieved in a dust free sanding environment make the effort worthwhile. First John used the standard mix of 80% paraffin with 20% bees wax, made by dissolving solid bees wax with heat, and then mixing with the paraffin. Using Jarrah for the test, John first applied sanding sealer, then sanded through the grits, using the mixture between each. John repeated the test but this time using Sheoak, and the mixture as a paste. All agreed that a great finish was achieved both times.

Briget Sapina from Sports Medicine Australia was a guest demonstrator for the defibrillator which our group has on order, and after an excellent presentation, all agreed that it was a wise choice to purchase the equipment, although we hope that it will never be needed.

6th Feb. In the interest of safety the group agreed that it would be beneficial if members could prepare a sheet with personal relevant medical data, to be kept in a sealed envelope, and handed to ambulance crew in the event of an emergency.

Ian Eagles showed a shoe horn and a back scratcher, and George Kieliger showed a wine glass with wooden stem.

13th Feb. Graham Lewis visited to tell that he was organizing a First Aid course. The group instantly agreed that we would pay for five of our members to attend, and thanked Graham for his work. Kevin handed out the medical information forms to members.

27th Feb. Derek Beer gave a demonstration on making a bud vase with two types of contrasting timber. He passed around a completed sample, and showed us four pieces of pre-cut pine and one piece of jarrah, drilled to fit the insert to be used. Derek had three sets prepared, two of those glued up. He mounted one on the lathe, with bulb towards the headstock, and shaped with a roughing gouge 160mm. After sanding and sealing the vase was mounted in pin jaws to finish the top. Derek then polished with EEE, parted off and finished the bottom. He passed his work round, and then made another. Derek then glued up and clamped another set, explaining the importance of exact size for the timber and good glue joints.

6th Mar. Ian Eagles showed a back scratcher and Chris Sioulas a Seattle Tower box, plus a shallow box with finial. Ivan Moro showed a segmented vase.

I'm back after a SHORT break & thanks to Vice Pres./Editor, David Rechter, for attending to this duty during my absence – well done David

16th Jan. – Scheduled "hands on" day under the watchful eye of Norm Gratte, with the day's "challenge" to follow on from Frank Dymond's demo last year, to

create wooden dolls, male and female. A great start to the year, active participation, some mild criticism and, as usual, creditable results.

23rd Jan. – A presentation today from O'Connor Chain Saws with a broad coverage on types of saws, uses, maintenance, safety aspects and developments in these tools. Well presented and interesting topics generating the usual question session at its conclusion.

30th Jan. – Todays demo was by Norm Gratte, with the topic being Hollow Turning, techniques, appropriate tools and their uses/applications. Norm's usual well prepared/presented and detailed approaches to this topic.

6th Feb. – Robin Howarth, a fairly new member, made his debut demonstration on how to turn a a novel seed pot mould and spurtle, for later planting of the germinated seeds in the garden. A very practical and novel item for the keen gardener. A very good demo, ending with a pot made from newspaper using the turned mould.

13th Feb. – Todays presentation was by Bernie Dixon's "My Way" (obviously a Frank Sinatra devotee) to making platters. A well presented and detailed demo, utilizing Marri, and with the inevitable discussion "when does the item change from being a platter to bowl" with the usual unresolved conclusion – "it's the maker's decision".

20th Feb. – Joe Hegney conducted a "basic tool skills" session covering the aspects of creating beads, spindles coves etc., using the recommended tools and their applications, to achieve the intended result He supported this with a handout to members for reference in follow up if needed. The usual well

prepared and detailed "Joe's lesson" which was well received by members present. Very educational, particularly for our newer members

27th Feb. – Monthly "hands on" day with members practicing the topics/ techniques incorporated in Joe Hegney's presentation the previous week. Good involvement by members present, which topped 40 in all, and maintaining the attendance numbers established at our first meet for 2013.

6th Mar. – The presentation today came from Brian Fowlie who demonstrated techniques for embellishing/decorating items made on the lathe, utilizing a router combined with other "creations" to achieve the intended result. He also presented and demonstrated the use of a router lathe which enabled patterns/ designs to be significantly expanded, basically in a scrolled manner. Excellent tabling of "Show & Tell" items capably presented by Syd Harvey. Attendances continue to lift with over 50 members present today. If this keeps up we may need to resort to seat sales and forward bookings. Well done fellas !!!.

Jan 22nd Cliff Cross started off 2013 demonstrating different items such as cradle spindles and a paper weight. It was his first demonstration, so well done.

Jan 29th Today we had two half hour demos. Ted Stewart-Wynne showed how to use up scraps of wood to make small objects, a fridge magnet, door

butter dish and a thimble. Richard Barkman gave an interesting talk on how to inlay fabric around the rim of a bowl. Very effective.

Feb 5th Jim Hanney made a young child's pull along toy, in the shape of a bug. When the wheels turn, the wings also revolve to imitate a flapping movement.

Feb 12th Ian Moss made a platter showing us a number of ways to decorate the rim, using a chatter tool, a dremmil, router and Arbortech.

Feb 19th Eric Walker showed us a vase with a difference. First the vase was made by hollowing it from the bottom and replacing a plug. But the difference came when he cut the top off at an angle of 45 degrees, and gluing on a handle, turning it into a pitcher. Very elegant.

Feb 26th We have come to expect an interesting demonstration from Don Clarke, we were not disappointed. He crafted a beautiful fishing reel, suitable for a child's fishing rod, which he had previously made.

March 5th Today's demo was by yours truly, Bob Jones. It was my first time, and so was a very nervous occasion, but with hind sight, a most satisfying one. My project was a nest of tea light candles made from a round of 50mm thick timber, then cut into three semi circles, each one fitting over each other when not in use.






BASIC TOOL SKILLS EXERCISE

There is always a need to refresh our skills with some simple basic exercises and practice.


Take a piece of 42mm square (preferable soft material) around 180-200 mm long and set up between centres, on the lathe. With a roughing gouge reduce to a cylinder round 40mm dia. Then using a pair of dividers mark off a series of divisions around 18 or 19 mm each.






Now with a skew chisel cut a series of 'Vs' along the piece. Consider the depth of each cut - 'V' cut equals the depth of the beads or the radius of the bead?. Mark the centre of each division with a pencil, and with a spindle gouge, form a series of beads.


Now reduce every second bead to a cylinder, and form a cove.





Now if you really feel confident, try a square to round exercise.

Having gained some satisfaction and skill, try this exercise. *It may be best to produce a template/story board first.*
