

Melville Mutterings

6th Jul 2022 – The program for the day consisted of our regular quarterly meeting which was ably modulated by our convenor, and we were all brought up to date with the club's affairs and the progress of the extensions of our clubrooms - we can look forward to some action on that front in the foreseeable future.

Following the meeting, we were treated to talk on the background of David Bradley that had us in stitches, very well received by all and gave us an insight into his life and how he came to the club and has enjoyed his time with us ever since. A very enlightening talk which was greatly appreciated by all. Fantastic job David.

13th Jul 2022 – This week's fare was billed as a Variety Day where members could bring in special tools, jigs, tips and provide helpful hints to the rest of us mere mortals. It would be impossible to describe in detail all the information passed on but our thanks goes to all the members who contributed to the event including George Kieliger, David Bradley, Keith Quayle, Mike Head, George Walker, David Rechter, Don Hicks, Lindsay Toop and David Milton for their generous input while David Finch also took on the role of coordinator. A big thank you to all concerned.

S&T for the day was ably presented by Des Pascoe and included an eclectic mix of items from examples of bladeware, lidded boxes, a mobile phone stand, 3-piece interlocking puzzle, a turned wall-art piece, a bowls, vases, platters and a walking stick. The talents of the various makers were evident and reflected well on their creators.

20th Jul 2022 – Special notices were the order of the day with a visitor being welcomed, advice being given that nominations for the new committee were now open and most importantly, the Council had approved the construction of our clubroom extensions. David Rechter gave us a rundown on the program for getting our gear out of the building and into storage.

Don Hicks provided an insight into the beginnings of WAWA as he introduced the subject of his demonstration - an ibis. The blank was mounted on a screw chuck for basis shaping before using a template to mark out the shape of the bird accentuating the grain of the wood. The rest of the form was cut on a bandsaw and a variety of tools used to refine the shape and finish the bird. A wonderful demonstration which had everyone spellbound for the duration.

S&T was conducted by Frank Dymond and consisted mainly of a series of platters from the recent WeWs that had been entered by Eric Hartley, David Finch, David Rechter, Chris Chai and John Oliver. Other items included a potpourri by David Bradley, a hand mirror created by Frank Dymond and a decorative bowl beautifully turned by George.

27th Jul 2022 – Our program director, David Finch, had today slated for a hands-on day and to make the day a bit more interesting, circulated the plans for a Cindy Drozda lidded box with finial which was to be the item attempted by those wishing to make a mess in the workshop.

For the most part, each lathe had an experienced turner on hand to give some guidance and assistance to the participants and the results were quite impressive. In a lot of cases, those turning were newer turners and it was evident that while they were having fun working on their boxes, their skills were a testament to the tutors who had passed on the benefit of their experience and the students willingness to absorb the information and put it into practice. All in all, a very good day was had by all, including those who simply came along for the morning tea and a chat.

3rd Aug 2022 – Our AGM was the order of the day and by all accounts, we had a very successful year on a number of fronts, the highlights including the construction of our wood shed and the Council letting the contract for the extensions of our clubrooms.

The sitting committee was disbanded and thanked for their service over the past 12 months and the new committee voted in with the executive being returned: Robyn Mclean as Convenor; Frank Dymond as Vice-Convenor; David Milton as Secretary and Rob Snowden as Treasurer. The incoming committee is a mix of previous and new members. Congratulations to David Finch, Ian Ludford, Syd Harvey, Kevan Harwood, Bernard boycott, David Bradley, Eric Hartley and myself on being elected. I think it is fair to say these members will have a busy year ahead with what is already planned and what is to come.

Following the official proceedings we were then entertained with a quiz on wood turning and associated wood working knowledge with David Finch being the host and attendees being split into groups of 3 or 4 to answer 25 questions on various topics. A few people were perplexed with some of the answers when published as they were a little obscure to say the least. A great fun way to finish off the morning.

S&T was conducted by Frank Dymond and was a varied affair consisting of 3 lidded boxes with finials, some examples of inlays in what will be salt and pepper grinders (the inlays being done using a laser cutter/engraver), some toys for the Christmas handover and finally, a beautiful intarsia parrot.

10th Aug 2022 – David Rechter advised he didn't like knobs and this would be the subject of his demonstration this morning. Little did we know at the time he was talking about the knobs on the top of salt & pepper grinders.

After giving us a run down on the types of mechanisms available, he went on to pass around examples of them and some drawings of how they were to be installed before turning on the lathe to show how some of the more intricate parts of the project were completed. He also mentioned that his preference to file down the fins on the mechanisms and insert them into the timber using Araldite since a lot of our local timbers are too hard to allow the fins to bite into them.

During the course of the demo, he finished off turning grinders which would have either a crush grind or click grind mechanism and then how to make the top of a standard type mechanism so the knob was recessed under a cover. These were made of a variety of timbers including Camphor Laurel, Tasmanian Myrtle, Queensland Beech and Jarrah. All in all, a great demo with lots of hints and tips being passed on to those who may not have had a lot of experience in turning grinders.

17th Aug 2022 – There weren't any cows around today but we did have a demonstration on carving by Lindsay Toop showing his method of carving items from cheese knives to walking sticks with a variety of implements.

As most of us do not do any carving, it was an opportunity to see the types of tools available and in use by someone well versed in the craft, giving some tips on how he goes about his craft and the safety equipment he uses to prevent accidents. Lindsay went through the process of how he does his carving using a series of mechanical carvers and sanders on hard timbers and passed around his set of carving knives that he uses mainly on softer timbers.

As is always the case, when you see someone who really knows what they are doing, it always looks so easy and today was no exception. Although most of the tooling used was of the motorized variety, the speed with which the excess timber was being removed was something to behold and when asked how long it would normally take to do a walking stick, the crowd was amazed to hear it was about 10 hours.

As has been mentioned, we are in a state of flux at present with our extensions so there was not a great deal of material for S&T presented by Syd Harvey comprising of a lovely lidded box by one of our newer turners, a beautifully finished lidded box with finial and a series of small ornaments cut from a quarter section of a branch resulting in the effect of a medieval castle on a hill.

The final exhibit was a Dremel type tool which was spoken about by saying that although it would do what the owner wanted it for, there was a severe lack of power in the motor for doing any heavy-duty work. The old saying comes true, you get what you pay for.

24th Aug 2022 – Today was a bitter sweet experience for most of us at Melville as we had to say goodbye to our old accommodation so the builders can get stuck into the renovations. As a consequence, the next few months will be full of interesting and possible challenging situations that we will need to overcome but the pain will be short-lived and the benefits will be enormous.

Without putting too fine a point on it, we were all in a spin as the demonstration provided by Milton Rundle, one of the founding members of WAWA, was on spinning tops. Over the course of the morning, he showed us many examples of tops he had made over the years and challenged us to try to beat the current records at our spin-off which is coming up shortly.

He started by giving us a brief history of tops and their use as toys, gambling implements, etc. before marking the centre of the blank to be used and mounting it on the lathe using a friction chuck made from a very course abrasive disc backed with a piece of plywood and held in place by the tail stock so the blank could be rounded and roughly shaped while forming a spigot to go into his scroll chuck.

The blank was then reversed and the upper section of the top was formed to produce a recess for the pull cord and then drilled to accept a dowel post in the top. Once glued, the item was reversed again and held by the post and cord recess lip so the base can be finished before drilling

a hole through the recess to accept the pull cord. A knob for the cord and a holder is then created to support the top while initiating the spin. We were all amazed at the variety of tops which could be produced and many of the gathering have accepted the challenge to produce a top for the Christmas gift drive for this year.

The demonstration was followed by S&T presented by yours truly and consisted of mainly lidded boxes with finials from the last WEWS in a wide variety of shapes and sizes - from the small box with a spinning-top lid to a large box some 300 mm diameter. The most noteworthy was produced by Eric Hartley (shown right) who was the only member of the club to receive a prize by winning the Beginners category with a superb effort by a new turner.



Other items included some steam punk jewellery produced by another of our newer members which was exquisite and a car carrying semi-trailer with six cars that will make some child's day come Christmas.

Finally, many thanks must go to the organizing crew and workers who have done such a magnificent job of clearing out our clubrooms and setting everything up so we can continue in temporary accommodation during the building phase of our new rooms.

31st Aug 2022 – The irony of the last couple of weeks was not lost on our members having had our last demonstration in the old clubroom last week done by one of our most senior turners, this week we had a demo by a beginner turner, Eric Hartley, making a ginger jar as the first in our temporary digs.

After a brief history of ginger and its associated jars, Eric mounted his blank with spigots on each end and marked the positions of the critical points before forming the neck of the jar and parting off the lid and cutting the shoulder section then the bottom section of the jar.

Excess material was then bored out with a Forstner bit before hollowing the base to the required thickness using a variety of tools then remounting the lid section in the chuck to make the opening to accommodate the base and doming the inside of the lid leaving a small landing to be used to remount it on a jam chuck to remove the spigot and finally shape the lid.

Finally, the base was remounted on the jam chuck to remove the spigot from the base and finish it off. A great demo which had the audience enthralled and commending Eric on his abilities as a new turner.

The S&T was conducted by Bernard Boycott featuring mainly items from the recent WAWA open competition and many of our exhibitors were awarded prizes in various categories including Dennis' 3rd place in Advanced Artistic for his beautiful burl plate, Rob's 3rd place in Advanced Plain for a burl clock, Dave F's 3rd place in Intermediate Plain with a burl bowl and Chris Chai who scooped the pool with 1st places in both Artistic and Plain for intermediate with a carved snake bowl and lidded box with finial respectively.

Other items included an ornate carved vase by Dave M, segmented bowl by Syd and a smaller segmented bowl by Sylvio, an egg shell box with finial and a series of ornamental "Castles on the Hill". Yet another example of the many and varied talents of our club members. A hearty well done to all concerned.

5th July 2022 - With Keith unfortunately having a bit of an accident with his table saw, Bruce Shephard stepped up to the plate today and demonstrated turning an Irish Viking Bowl similar to the one from Fishamble Street, Dublin. He turned a spigot and shaped the base using a bowl gouge and scraper. Reversing the bowl, he then turned out the inside, keeping the tailstock up for as long as possible and using a bowl gouge and carbide tool with the outrigger for stability. Bruce refined the shape of his bowl using a scraper and would take it home to sand and finish. Thanks, Bruce for an interesting demo today.

In S&T Mary had a go at several balls using various techniques, there was a three-cornered bowl, a lidded box with finials and a bowl embellished with gold leaf and airbrushing. Bruce showed us a chieftain stick he'd been commissioned to do. He's making two ceremonial sticks for the army in Vanuatu and PNG, from jacaranda from Vanuatu. The original stick is currently in the Australian War Museum. A very interesting and special commission for Bruce. Well done.

12th July 2022 – Neil brought in the wig stand we'll be attempting as teams for the KitKat Challenge next week. These stands will be made with a view to donating them to a worthy cause.

lan Moss demonstrated next month's competition item of a lidded box with finial with all pieces to be from different woods. Ian showed us a few of his other beautiful lidded boxes. With the definition of a finial being a vertical termination capping another form, it was agreed a finial can be any shape or form you deem suits your lidded box. Ian proceeded to turn his box body from a piece of jarrah and the lid from jacaranda. He embellished the top of the body using a Sorby texturing tool which produced an interesting design. Next, he made the finial to locate in a hole drilled in the lid. As ever lan gave us a very informative and well executed demonstration, inspiring us all on to turn our own lidded boxes for next month's competition.

With a good proportion of members voting today the competition results for the platter were as follows:

Advanced – 1st Robert Drinkwater, 2nd – Elison Corstorphan and Bruce Shephard, 3rd – Brian Kirkby

Intermediate – 1st – Mario Baldaccino, 2nd Martin Burke, 3rd – Martin Burke

19th July 2022 – Today was KitKat Challenge day, organised by Neil George. The challenge was for the 5 teams of 3 to turn a wig stand (drawing S41). The teams were given a little extra time to finish the stand, with a couple taking theirs home to apply the finish. With the usual banter and competitiveness all teams worked hard and produced a finished item worthy of being donated to Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital. The judges reckoned it was a close-run thing with Stan P., Robert D. and Tracy R., taking home the KitKats - if Neil had remembered to bring them! It was another fun afternoon. Thanks to Neil for organising it all.

Noel brought in a stunning segmented bowl out of sheoak and finished with Osmo oil. Stan also showed us his segmented bowl made from Jarrah and Pecan while Neil showed us his natural edged bowl from a Marri root ball, also finished in Osmo oil. Bruce produced a lovely Jarrah platter with a lattice rim embellishment. Peter S. turned a smaller version of Brian's square clock out of Vic Ash. Tracy and Ron both had a go at the wig stand through the week. No wonder Tracy's team won! Thanks to all who brought something along for the Show and Tell table this week.

26th July 2022 – Today there were a total of seven wig stands finished and ready to be presented to the Cancer Foundation at Charlie Gairdner's. Thanks to everyone who took the time to turn and finish them.

Tracy R. replaced Keith B. today as demonstrator as he's out injured, and showed us how to turn spoons or a ladle from a split blank of hairy oak. After turning a spigot at one end Tracy held the blank in the chuck and turned it to round before turning a sphere on the tailstock end. Once the sphere was turned it was sanded then the handle shaped before parting off and splitting. The spoon was then fixed into a homemade jam chuck and hollowed out, with the sanding and shaping finished off on a sanding disk and by hand. Thanks to Tracy for a very interesting and informative demonstration. Everyone should now be turning their own spoons and ladles.

There were four very well executed lidded boxes of varying designs today for show and tell. Well done!

2nd August 2022 – Rather than making a snake, which consisted of turning about a dozen wheels, Brian decided to make a very cute looking "mango moggy", the ideal pet!! No need for feeding or walking! First, he turned the body, leaving a 10 mm spigot for the head to sit on. The blank for the head had a pre-drilled hole for the spigot to fit. Next Brian turned the head, sanded and parted it off before turning it around to finish. He drilled the holes to house the eyes and nose, which had a hole drilled for the whiskers. The ears were turned from a small paper joined blank. To finish off his little moggy Brian would cut out the tail using a scroll saw and router, finishing the shape with a lot of sanding. Great demo, Brian and an interesting project for us all to try, thank you.

Show and Tell this week consisted of a lidded box with a very intricate humming bird inlay and a very nearly finished segmented bowl.

9th August 2022 – Don Clarke demonstrated the next competition item, a ginger jar, using an easier to turn piece of Ponderosa pine. For the competition the jar has to be between 150 mm and 200 mm high. Don parted the top from the base then shaped the base according to his template, then hollowed it out using an extension bar and Forstner bit initially. He left a bit of meat on the base to give support while hollowing using a Sorby hollowing tool and one with an outrigger, showing there are many ways to skin a cat! Using a laser, he made sure he didn't make the wall

too thin. For sanding the inside, he used a Vermec attachment. Next Don turned the lid to fit. Thanks to Don for a very well executed and proficient demo.

Malcolm gave us a quick chat on how to use face plates effectively.

There were a couple of moggies, including Brian's finished one from his demo last week. Mario brought in a cork putter-inner from olive, Brian M. had been busy making potpourris, coasters and a bud vase, out of banksia nuts. There was also an airbrushed bowl for Show and Tell this afternoon.

There were 8 entries for the competition, a lidded box with finial from three different woods. The results were as follows:

Intermediate: 1st – Neil G., 2nd – Martin B., 3rd – Mario B.

Advanced: 1st – Brian K., 2nd – Bruce S., 3rd – Ian M.

16th August 2022 – Before Robert D. started his demo on turning cabriole legs, he showed us a few different types of bead turning tools, which are very handy for turning multiple beads identically. Robert stressed the initial marking out of the legs has to be very accurate. He started by turning his blank between centres, marking the centre with a skew, then turned to round using a roughing gouge and skew, turning a couple of beads on the foot before going off-centre. Robert then used the same tools to turn the final shape, and a spindle gouge to refine the details. The blank was then returned to between centres to remove the bottom of the foot. Finally, flutes were added for a bit of decoration using a router. Thanks Robert for a very informative demo. I think we were all a bit in awe of your skill with the skew.

There was only one item for show and tell today, a "moggy" made from sheoak. Malcolm demonstrated how to find the centre of a piece of wood without using a ruler.

23rd August 2022 – Congratulations to Mary for coming 4th in Intermediate with her lidded box at the Bunbury Weekend Workshop. Well done!

Today Brian M. demonstrated a little pull along toy with wheels, made from lots of small pieces of wood. Before turning the body-section Brian had drilled holes for the axle for the wheels and where the string used to pull the toy would go. The dimensions of this project are not critical, just to be done to suit the wood on hand. Brian turned all the components using a spindle gouge, with the spherical elements getting gradually smaller towards the tail. The two wheels were then turned. Finally, all the pieces were threaded onto the string. What a great way for us to use up all those little offcuts that kick around the shed, and a great Christmas pressie for the kids.



There were a few different designs of lidded boxes on display this afternoon, including the one Brian K. is getting the teams to produce next week for the Timtam challenge. Also, on the table were a few very delicate little bowls and one turned from a very gnarly looking burl. Ian M. showed us his finished platter which he'd airbrushed at a recent workshop. Looked great!

Wig Stands for Charity - Swan Woodturners

The end results are judged by a team of expert turners although this is not taken too seriously and only entitles the winning team to bragging rights. Not only did our club members participate enthusiastically in the team challenge and produce five wig stands on the day, but individual club members also produced another seventeen on their own lathes at home.
