

Mandurah Musings

October and November have been busy with Novice Course participants completing their 6th and last item on Monday 18th November. The Novice Course is run twice per year (if sufficient numbers allow) for six to eight participants. All join WAWA and Mandurah at the beginning of each course. A demonstration is provided, walking through each wood turning operation to the finished item. Each Novice then receives one-on-one tuition for each item. The items - Tool Handle, Rolling Pin, Towel Holder, Trivet, Bowl and Platter incorporate many of the basic skills required as a basis of woodturning.



Melville Mutterings

20th Nov – As we draw ever nearer to the end of the year and a well-earned rest, our fare today was demonstrated by none other than Ian Ludford, whose presentations rarely fail to stretch the little grey cells and this was no exception as he produced a demo on FOURMING to create 4 whale sharks.

The technique used was as for inside/out turning with the difference being you needed to cut ALL 4 sides of the blank to shape the belly, back and both sides.

lan first explained the need for a detailed dimensioned plan and followed it to firstly turn the belly of the sharks before rotating the blanks 180 degrees to subsequently turn the backs, followed by both sides. A suggestion was made that having cut the profile of 1 side, that one of the blanks could remain in position to act as a template for the other 3 blanks to complete the turning of the second side before repositioning the template piece to cut the second side using the other 3 pieces as the template.

With the shape of the shark now quite recognizable, all that was left to do was to remove the waste material and use a scroll saw to shape the upper and lower tail fins or use a lot of abrasive and elbow grease to do the final shaping and smoothing.

As is typical of lan's demos, it was well thought out and presented and as always, his tool handling skills came to the fore. Well done and a great demo which will no doubt be replicated over the break in many a workshop.

27th Nov – Denis Tapley had the honour of presenting our final demonstration of the year with an example of the Christmas Challenge for the group to be done over the break which is any item which is simple and stylish with no other requirements.

In this instance, he produced a waisted shaped vase which will be embellished over the break to form his entry into the competition.

With no requirements on the form or size of the item, the abovementioned criteria were all that was necessary so it will certainly be interesting to see what appears on the entry table at the beginning of next year.

Having turned the outside shape to achieve the required profile, he proceeded to hollow the item to bring the wall thickness down to around 3 mm to enable him to complete the entry and showed a range of tools which could be used to complete the task.

As is normally the case with these sorts of challenges, the ideas and examples shown are likely to be incorporated into many of the entries,

The demonstration was followed by the judging by popular vote of the turned and scroll sawn ornaments placed in the competition and to be used to dress the new tree for this year and the prize for the best turned ornament went to David Milton while Bob Hawkins scooped the pool winning the best scroll sawn and best overall prizes with his space station designed ornament almost certainly being the most eye catching item on display.

Finally, before getting into a sausage sizzle to top off the year, the items on the S&T table were presented by Russell Nash consisting of entries in the last WeWs where Jeff Stapylton won 1^{st} in Novice and 2^{nd} in Most Popular, Mark Landwehr took out 2^{nd} in Novice and Janice Meakin's entry was unlucky not to win a prize.

Noel French's entry in the Royal Show was then presented and discussed taking out 2nd prize in his category while the remaining items included cup and ball gifts, a spinning top, whale sharks from last weeks demonstration, a bowl, bud vase and lidded box by one of the students in our

last class and some 3D printed lizards that will join the gifts for next weeks Christmas Gift Presentation which is showing all the hallmarks of being very well supported again. Congratulations to all concerned.

The final job for the day was to fill some 120 lolly bowls and 35 sleighs with normal and sugar-free sweets respectively for presentation to Silver Chain for their clients. The sweets were generously donated by the IGA and Pharmacy from Winthrop Gardens respectively and their continued support is greatly appreciated.

8th Jan 2025 – First and foremost, a very Happy New Year to all our members and the readers.

The New Year was kicked off this morning with one of our regular quarterly meetings and once the formalities had been dispensed with, we got down to the fun part of the morning when we were regaled with a talk on the working life of Ron Shelley whose qualifications are numerous but in the main related to mechanical engineering and management in the mining and services worlds.

It is fair to say that when you meet a new member of the club, sharing a common interest in woodturning creates an immediate connection but it isn't until you hear the full background story of the people that you really get a feel for where they come from and the way they are likely to approach a given set of circumstances.

This held true with Ron whose working background is about as diverse as the membership of the club and it was great to get an insight into the man and what makes him tick. Thanks, Ron, for an informative look at what has brought you to where you are now.

The final item on the agenda for the morning was the popular judging of the Christmas challenge which was to create something that was "Simple but Elegant".

When all the votes had been cast, Denis Tapley took out the top prize followed by James Murray, Eric Hartley and Russell Nash. It was quite evident that a lot of work had been put into some of the entries and congratulations to all who entered.

15th Jan – As is so often the case with a James Murray demonstration, you need to think outside the box to get a feel for the finished product and this week was no exception.

James took on the task of demonstrating his take on the upcoming WeWs competition item of a recognizable human form to be turned with offsets (paraphrased).

After showing several versions of the item done as practice pieces, he explained his process and the offsets he planned to use in the demo before producing a marked up blank. This version was simple turning as it was a matter of turning beads and coves - the trick was to put them in the correct places to come up with a recognizable form.

The blank was mounted between centres using steb centres at both ends on the centreline to turn off some of the excess material but bringing the head and neck down somewhat for access to the remainder of the areas needing to be reduced in size at the top end of the form and removal from the lathe. It was then remounted on the required offset to form the front of the form, removing excess material with a variety of tools.

Once the front profile was shaped, it was time to, again, remove the blank and remount it on the opposite offset so the back of the form could be shaped and with this done, we were looking at refining the shape and finishing off the details.

Due to time constraints, that is where we had to finish the demo but the remainder of the process was explained in some detail. As usual, a very well thought out demo with lots of info and definitely food for thought for the rest of us. Great demo James.

Russell Nash then volunteered to present the S&T consisting of number of lolly bows to kick start the collection for this year's requirements, some boxes, an embellished vase and a practice piece for last week's challenge with an explanation of how it had been done and what had been done to hide the join in the finished product. Well done all.

Segmenters Story

The Beginners Training Course will commence on Sunday, 9th February, 10:00 am at Melville club rooms. Expressions of interest have been received from David Milton, Terry Steep, Kerry Nilan, Geoff Stapylton, Geoff Winton, and Colin de la Nougerede.

Participants will start making a simple segmented bowl, like the jarrah bowl pictured. They can then progress to a more complex one by incorporating a feature ring. Later he will deal with design, either by computer programs or hand drawing on graph paper, and how segments are cut and cramped into rings.




Mike brought in a laminated table lamp that he made a few years ago. This might make a good project for us to do at hands-on.



Change to Beginner Competition Entries

Beginners may only enter the item specified for their category. If a Beginner presents with the more difficult item, he/she will be given the option of self-promoting into the Novice category and entering the item into that category; or the option of staying in the Beginner category but not entering the item into that competition. Self-promotion to Novice is irreversible.


February 15th - Melville

A figurine of recognisable human form incorporating at least two offset axes. All parts to be turned. Maximum height 300 mm.

Beginners – As above, but no offset axes.

March 15th - Manjimup

Wee Willy Winkie candle holder (Google for an image). Must have metal insert. Max diameter 150 mm. Max height 75 mm. Must have a handle, the handle may extend beyond the maximum diameter. No embellishment.







Lindsay Nicholson

April 12th - Swan (note 2nd Saturday in April)

A Wooden Hat of any description. e.g. cowboy, top, bowler, cap, ladies. Hat does not need to be made in one piece. Size between 100 mm and 300 mm wide. Can be embellished but must show a section of the wood texture and grain.

Beginners - As above, but any size.

AAW Forum sieversbob

May 17th - Mandurah

A lidded box or lidded bowl turned in side grain orientation, with a contrasting coloured lid, featuring a finial of attractive design and proportion. Minimum diameter 125 mm. Different timbers may be used, or colour added to provide contrast to the lid. The finial may be a different timber, or colour. The base and lid should be turned in side grain orientation or of burl or segmented construction. The finial can be turned, carved, constructed or embellished from any suitable materials.

Beginners - Any side grain turned box.

REMINDER!

The points accumulation for competition commenced September 2024 and will run until August 2025.



Lyn Metcalfe

June 21st - Collie

A fruit bowl, diameter 190 mm-210 mm; height 90 mm-110 mm; bowl thickness 5 mm. Beginners – A fruit bowl, max diameter 150 mm, height proportional to diameter. No other restrictions.

July 19th - Gosnells

A quaich cup, no other restrictions.

Beginners – Bat wing bowl diameter 100 mm-200 mm.



Barbara Jennings

Open 31st July - 3rd August (if at Craft Alive)

Exhibition & Open Competition-Plain and Artistic categories.

August 16th - Bunbury

A yarn bowl, diameter 100 mm-200 mm, height 50%-100% of diameter.

Note: by definition, this item must be embellished as it will have the "hook" cut in after the turning is completed. Since this postturning change is related to the functionality of the yarn bowl, the bowl will be judged using the General criteria.

Beginners – A hand-held darning mushroom with some embellishment.



September 20th – Wandi (AGM)

Doll (or dolls) in the kokeshi style; that is, without arms and legs and each doll consisting of at least two turned pieces. Maximum height 200 mm. Colouring, decorating, or other embellishment are optional (General judging criteria).

Beginners – Same item.

October 18th - Northern Suburbs

A vase form either suspended or on legs with no embellishments and no size restrictions.

Beginners - Same item.



November 15th - Busselton

A pedestal, 600 mm-800 mm high, top diameter 250 mm-300 mm. Stem may be done in sections for those with shorter lathes, similarly top and base may be laminated/joined/segmented to make up size of blanks (General judging criteria).

Beginners - Same item.
